## Area Draft Board Cautions Men Against Registering Late

The Hereford draft board, which has jurisdiction over Castro County, as well as Deaf Smith, Farmer and Randall, feels that "too many" young men are registering late from Castro County.

This was made public here this week by J. E. Burch of Dimmitt, Castro County's representative on the four-county board.

Mr. Burch pointed out that the federal draft law requires all males to register with a draft board on their 18th birthday, or within five days thereafter.

Dimmitt has an official registrar for the convenience of Castro County young men so they can discharge their responsibility without having to travel to Hereford.

The registrar is Mrs. Jennie G. Burch, whose office is at the Chamber of Commerce in Dimmitt.

She serves the board without pay as a public service.

"When men register late they cause additional work at the board," Mr. Burch said. "Furthermore, they risk delinquency under the law."

Maximum penalty for infraction of the law, upon conviction, is \$10,000 fine, or five years imprisonment, or both.

Mr. Burch urged parents, teachers, and others, to remind young men to register in the time required by the draft law.

"We hope this situation will be corrected by young men," Mr. Burch concluded, "without any official action on the part of the board other than this public reminder."

## Cotton Prospects Good... If Weather Will Cooperate

Castro County farmers are hopeful of a bale-to-the-acre crop this year if everything breaks right—in the hair-line timing of High Plains cotton crops; it all depends on the weather.

Last year hail, rains, late-planting and other troubles plagued cotton farmers and they wound up with little better than a half-bale cotton average, producing 33,475 bales off of about 55,000 acres.

Plains Cotton Growers have estimated the good-luck production of 1960 at 52,000 bales, although a fog could happen to sink this prediction.

At present cotton production is lethargic, with only a random bale

here and there being brought into town. The first bale was brought in Sept. 14, by Don Moley from his farm about seven miles north of Dimmitt and he was paid a total premium of \$335 by local ginners and merchants plus 50 cents a pound paid for the cotton by the North Gin.

The first estimated production total of the Texas High Plains 1960-61 crop for the 23 member counties of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., was announced as 1,899,000 bales.

If produced, such a crop would be the second largest crop in the history of the High Plains, being topped only by the more than two

## Bobcats to Host Muleshoe In Homecoming Game Friday

The Dimmitt Bobcats, owning a 500 season record so far, face their bleakest prospect of the season Friday night when they take on the Muleshoe Mules at Bobcat stadium beginning at 8 o'clock.

The reason things look so rough for the local team is that Muleshoe last week tied the Hereford Whitefaces, 6-6, one week after the Hereford team trounced Dimmitt, 28-0. On the surface of it, Dimmitt is apparently a 28-point underdog, based on that game alone. However, the whimsical finger that selects the "hot" or "cold" team of the evening could easily ruin any pre-game pickings.

Dimmitt definitely was not the "hot" team Friday night, as their evenly-matched opponents, the Floydada Whirlwinds, pushed over a lone touchdown to take a 6-0 win with only 45 seconds left in the game.

The win came after Junior Coffey — hard-worked all during the game — dropped the ball and Floydada recovered. It took the Whirlwinds ten plays to reach paydirt. Dimmitt drove to the Floydada 1 in the third quarter, but were unable to muster a scoring play. Floydada's only other scoring threat came when they were within 32 yards of the goal posts in the first period.

Friday night's game against Muleshoe will be before Dimmitt's homecoming audience.

## Anthony Urges Participation In Grain Sorghum Group

Mr. C. W. (Wee) Anthony of the Big Square community was elected president Wednesday night of the Castro County Grain Producers Association.

To assist him in his work for the coming year will be Charles Martin, vice-president, of Hart and Edd C. McLeroy of Dimmitt, secretary.

In pointing out some of the Grain Sorghum Producers, Mr. Anthony said this week that "We as grain sorghum growers are sitting right in the middle of the fastest growing part of our country and maize is a natural for us."

"We know that our grain sorghum is still our largest resource of any commodity. We are living in a day of organization. Industry is organized, labor is organized, the cotton farmer has an organization (and, by the way, look what they are doing for themselves) and the corn growers are very effectively organized."

"We grain sorghum producers are at a stage where no one but ourselves can help us—and we know that as individuals we can not accomplish this, but as a unit we can."

"In a way, grain sorghum producers are fortunate. The surplus in maize is much smaller in proportion than some of our other commodities. The estimated national production this year is 159,000,000 bushels and it is also estimated that we now have a potential demand for 157,000,000. This is only 2,000,000 bushels of surplus which would last us only a few months in case of a major crop failure (Ed. note: This national surplus is equal to about one-sixth of Castro County's production).

Faul Venhaus, also of Nazareth, exhibited the reserve champion Brown Swiss bull, Silver Foxie.



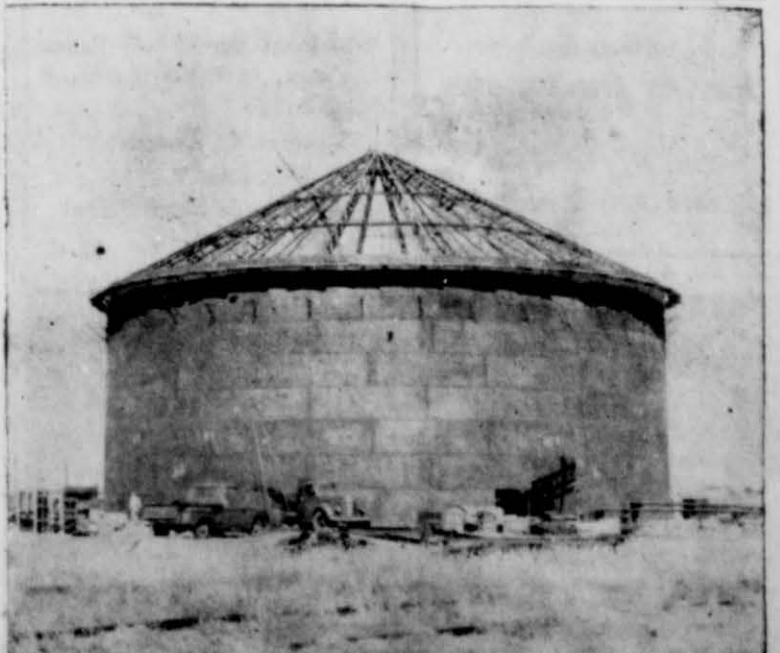

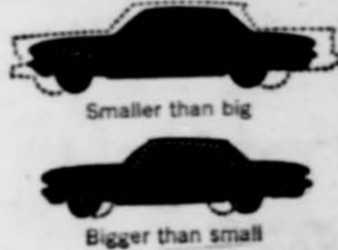

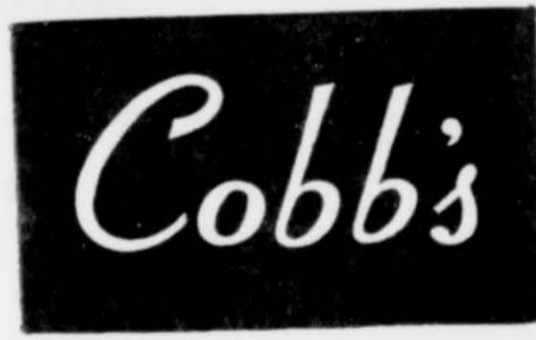

Doors open wider for easier entrance and exit and interior room has been increased despite the fact that the overall width has been reduced two inches. LeSabre models are mounted on a 123-inch wheelbase and have an overall length of 213 inches, nearly five inches shorter than last year. The new, improved turbine drive transmission has been made standard equipment on all LeSabre models in 1961.
