Relief Bond

In many counties in Texas the Federal government is now spending more every month for relief work than those counties would have to pay back in a year...

"It is primarily a matter of bread and meat for the hungry," said Mr. Strauss. "It is unthinkable that Texas will let its women and children go hungry. But some people may want to know what Texas will get for authorizing a bond issue that may go up to \$20,000,000 if the legislature finds that much is needed."

"In the first place, there is hardly a county in Texas that can care for its own destitute through local taxation. If they could the burden of taxes would fall on homes and farms and be tremendously heavy. By issuing state bonds the burden is taken off homes and farms, for the taxes to fund these bonds cannot be raised on real or personal property. If all the bonds are issued the tax per capita will not average over 41 cents a year for 10 years. Actually it probably will be some special tax that will fall heavier on city people and be lighter than on rural citizens."

"In Lamb County the Federal government in the past ten months has spent for relief work \$26,160. The county has asked for \$6,400 to carry on the work during August for the benefit of 3500 persons on its relief rolls."

Overcoming The Depression

Most of the talk during the past few years and especially during the past few months has been centered on or about ways and means to overcome the depression and "round the corner" to prosperity. Under the regime of President Roosevelt it seems that we are at last on the road. But while we may be on the road by his help, there are ways that we can help ourselves and everyone else to move a little faster.

B. C. Forbes, one of the nation's leading economists, has the following to say in a recent article in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

"President Roosevelt could make one timely suggestion which, if widely followed, would have immediate tonic effect upon business, namely, that every individual, family, firm, company, corporation and institution in a position to do so immediately pay every bill due."

"I know of households and business men who have purposely, needlessly delayed settling accounts. They have had the wherewithal, but a feeling of uncertainty prompted them to hold on to cash rather than make reasonably prompt payments. Almost any merchant and tradesman, to say nothing of such professional men as doctors and dentists, could tell you of unpaid accounts against people able to pay."

"All of us are effected by such failure to square accounts. One delinquent tends to start an endless chain of delinquents."

"High-brow economists declare that the depression has been aggravated not by any actual scarcity of the volume of currency in the country, but by serious slowing down in the 'velocity' of money. They mean that money has not been turned over as fast as formerly."

"Let everyone who has the means make it his or her business to liquidate outstanding debts forthwith, and the 'velocity' of our supply of money and credit will be speeded up, with incalculably beneficial results all around."

Another item of interest to us was a statement of Harold L. Ickes, Secretary of the Interior and Federal Administrator of Public Works. In it he said that the government was intending to help the public by planning pay rolls instead of relief lists in administering the gigantic public works program.

In this way everybody will be helped instead of merely those on the relief lists. More money will be in circulation, more goods bought, more money spent, and business much better. And another thing about this plan is it will give the man who really wants to work for a living a better chance than the man who has lived off the government and charity so long that he has lost all desire to work. We believe first, last and always in helping those who help themselves.

Here's Ballot Lamb Voters Are To Decide

Here is a sample of the official ballot for the state-wide election August 26, showing how Texans will be called upon to vote on four state constitutional amendments, and on delegates to the state convention which will ratify or reject the Twenty-First amendment to the federal constitution, which would repeal the eighteenth or prohibition amendment.

OFFICIAL BALLOT

FOR the amendment to article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding section 3, providing authority for the adoption of a Home Rule Charter by the voters in counties having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more, to effect more efficient and economical government within such counties, and to authorize mergers of separate governmental agencies within such counties as may from time to time be authorized by vote of the people therein.

AGAINST the amendment to Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding section 3, providing authority for the adoption of a Home Rule Charter by the voters in counties having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more, to effect more efficient and economical government within such counties, and to authorize mergers of separate governmental agencies within such counties as may from time to time be authorized by vote of the people.

FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature may authorize the issuance of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed Twenty Million (\$20,000,000.00) Dollars, for relieving the hardships of unemployment and for the necessary appropriation to pay said bonds.

OFFICIAL BALLOT

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

The Congress has proposed an amendment to the Constitution of the United States which reads as follows.

Section 1. The Eighteenth Article of Amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any state, territory or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in these several states, as provided in the Constitution within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the State by the Congress.

INSTRUCTION TO THE VOTER

In the columns below are printed the names of persons duly nominated as delegates and alternates to the convention to be held in accordance with law for the purpose of ratifying or rejecting the above amendment. In the column headed "For Ratification of the Above Amendment" are printed the names of nominees for delegates and alternates nominated as in favor of ratification; in the column headed "Against Ratification of the Above Amendment" are printed the names of nominees for delegates and alternates nominated as opposed to ratification of the above amendment. Each voter is entitled to vote for any number of candidates whose names appear upon this ballot, not to exceed thirty-one (31) delegates and thirty-one (31) alternates. Each voter shall indicate his choice by drawing a line through or striking out all the names of such candidates other than the ones for whom he desires to cast his vote.

Will You Give Bread or Throw Stones?

(Extract from address delivered by M. E. Foster, Editor of The Press.)

I have opposed every proposition heretofore made to issue state bonds.

They tried to put a \$300,000,000 bond issue on us once for building state roads. It didn't get through the legislature and if it had it would have been killed by the people.

Despite my prejudice against state bonds I intend to vote for the relief bond issue on August 26. I am for that one, because it means shelter for the homeless, food for the hungry and fuel for those who face the winter.

I can't vote for state bonds that mean money to be spent for cement and construction, but I must vote for those that mean bread and meat for people who have no work, no money and who must exist on the charity of others.

There are over a million of such people in Texas. It's not their fault. They don't want a dole. They do not want to live on charity. They want to work and they hope soon to exist by their own labor.

No true man wants his neighbor or his friends to feed him, but no man or woman who has a heart wants to see any human being suffering for lack of food.

That's what will happen in Texas next fall and winter if we do not carry this proposal.

I could not sleep if I felt that my vote, or any word I uttered or wrote, caused the poor to be deprived of actual necessities that will come from this bond issue.

If I slept my nights would be made a hell by seeing in my dreams the pinched faces, the

thin bodies of little children who were underfed, undernourished. I would have nightmares in which sorrowful men would pass before my eyes looking hungry, homeless, in rags and poverty and they would shake their bony fingers at me and say "You did it; you by your vote took away the bread our great state and our great national government wanted to give us."

I would hear in my dreams the cries of some poor mother who could not find food for her children; I would see the ghost of some father who had hunted for work for weeks, who had spent his last penny and who shot himself in order that his family might have the little insurance he carried.

I would dream of being seated at some banquet table where fine food was served amidst the flash of beautiful china and fine silverware. Suddenly I would see the walls of that banquet hall disappear, and there would come before my eyes a mob of the poverty-stricken, the sick and diseased, the crippled and the emaciated, and I would hear them shrieking, "You did it, MEFO; you who claim to be a friend of the poor and the helpless; you are responsible. You failed to do your part."

That shall not rest on my soul. Those who wish may pick flaws in the amendment. Politicians may yell there is a better way. Some may cry it is a wrong step to take. Others may say let's wait awhile.

They can do it if they want to help the sick and diseased, to rest on their souls, but not this poor weak mortal.

I am going to vote for that bond issue and I hope you will, and that you will get your neigh-

bors to do the same.

What does it mean in actual dollars and cents to the average citizen? So little that one should hang his head in shame for the rest of his life if he failed to vote for the bonds.

In the first place, it cannot be a tax on any man's property. The legislative act says it must never be a tax on real estate.

It will be a tax on something of course. You can't have bonds without having taxes.

Perhaps the legislature will tax some luxury or luxuries. I am sure the women wouldn't mind paying a little tax on their rouge or face powder, or lipstick, if thereby they would be helping some other woman who is begging for milk for her babies.

The men might stand a little tax on chewing tobacco, or cigars if they felt thereby they were doing their part to give needed relief.

I am sorry to say it is the easiest thing in the world to make new taxes. The legislature will find a way to pay the interest and retire the bonds.

But here's the comforting part of it. No matter what article, or how many are taxed, the average per capital cost will be only 50 cents.

That's all. Fifty cents a year for the next ten years per person in order to raise \$20,000,000 or what part of it that may be needed, to care for the hungry and homeless.

It will cost some of us more than that, of course, for we buy more and pay more taxes. Fifty cents is the average cost.

If we fail to vote for these bonds I do not know what will happen—neither do you.

But why paint a doleful picture? Why try to frighten? I have never seen the time

yet when an appeal to the hearts of the people was not more productive of results than an appeal to their fears. I do not like to frighten little children, nor try it on sensible men and women.

I prefer to appeal to minds that think—hearts that beat.

I love those words—FAITH, HOPE, CHARITY. Take away faith and man is helpless, hopeless.

Today we see in this country the greatest exhibition of faith the nation has ever known. We have faith in our great president. We believe in him and will stand by him, or back of him. When he says do your part, we will. We have faith.

We also have hope. That is what has sustained us during four trying years.

We hope unemployment will soon end; that all business will revive and the need to feed the hungry and clothe the naked will not be with us. It has been a long, long wait, but we will continue to hope and to have faith.

While faith and hope are beautiful and inspiring, the greatest of these words is charity.

Charity and love are synonymous. If you have charity in your heart you have love for your fellowman that rises above all else.

It is that love of your neighbor; the charity in the heart of the average citizen, that makes me believe we will vote the Bread Bonds. That's what they are—bonds for bread.

Are you willing to give the hungry man bread, or will you cast a stone at him?

If you vote FOR the amendment you are giving him bread. If you vote AGAINST you are putting a stone on his heart and yours.

ALLRED ISSUES WARNING TO THOSE WHO WOULD PROFITEER UNDER NRA.

Attorney General James V. Allred, in the face of rising prices of manufactured products which seemed out of all proportion to that of agricultural and other raw products, Saturday issued a statement in which he set forth the fact that neither national nor state anti-trust laws were repealed, and that if necessary action would be taken to protect the people against profiteering.

He says: "The primary purpose of the national recovery act was to put men back to work and increase buying power. To carry out this program it was proposed to shorten hours of labor and provide minimum rates of pay so that additional men and women could be employed of course, national administration must have contemplated that such a program would necessarily result in each concern individually adjusting prices for itself so far as to take care of necessary costs; the administration, however, did not intend or authorize getting together and fixing unreasonable and outrageous charges. The national administration in its appeal for cooperation, asked for sacrifice, not profiteering.

To Be Disappointed

"If, as I am told, some concerns have already gotten together and fixed prices without a code in the expectation that the president is going to approve their actions, however, honest some of them may have been. In my judgment they are going to be sorely disappointed. "Despite propaganda to the contrary, neither state nor federal anti-trust laws have been repealed. The federal laws have simply been modified so as to permit the making of what might be termed 'reasonable agreements' as to labor and unfair trade practices, but subject to the approval of the president and his right to revoke, modify, change, or rescind such approval at any time Attorney General Cummings has repeatedly stated that the anti-trust laws are still in full force and will be employed for the protection of the public. His statement applies with equal force to the laws of Texas and I am just giving fair warning."

Desires To Cooperate Allred said he wanted it "definitely understood" that he

has "every desire to co-operate with President Roosevelt."

"It may be that, in order to protect producers and the public some form of governmental price control will become necessary; price fixing by agreement, however, in my opinion, is illegal both under federal and state anti-trust laws," Allred stated. "Certainly it could not be contended for a moment that price fixing by agreement

is legal under any code, unless such code expressly authorizes it and even then it must have been approved by the president; and must be with reference to business engaged in or affecting interstate or foreign commerce."

He said that since he had returned from Washington he had been informed various concerns had "gotten together and fixed prices by agreement, some of them without even having sub-
