PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

The Congress has proposed an amendment to the Constitution of the United States which reads as follows.

Section 1. The Eighteenth Article of Amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2 The transportation or importation into any state, the relief lists. More money will therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

> Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in these several states, as provided in the Constitution within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the State by the Congress.
