PLAINS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING HELD TUE.

The second annual Plains Memorial Hospital membership meeting was held Tuesday night in the Dimmitt High School auditorium, with a representative number of members present.

Dr. R. E. Cogswell, chief of staff, introduced the guest speaker, Dr. O. T. Wood of Dallas, who gave a very interesting and informative address on preventative medicine and health practices and on the general operation of a hospital. Dr. Wood declared that, in many respects, citizens of this area had, in the Plains Memorial Hospital, facilities for health care on an equal with larger cities such as Dallas. He predicted that with the apparent normal growth of the local hospital that at least fifty beds and four doctors would be necessary to care for the increasing number of patients in the very near future. In commenting on the operating plan of the Plains Memorial Hospital, Inc., Dr. Wood declared that it was an ideal organization for the advancement of health conditions, and advised the membership and the public to use its preventative facilities to stave off serious illness before major illness develops.

Following the address by Dr. Wood, Mr. Morgan Dennis member of the board of directors, presided at a business meeting. Following a financial report by Mr. Ester Noble, business manager, three directors were elected for a term of three years, they were O. D. Dinwiddie, Sam Hunter and B. M. Nelson, all members of the original board of directors.

Beginners Age In School Law Given

Following is an excerpt from a reply by E. H. Boulter, Deputy State Superintendent, to a request for information by Judge E. L. Ivey, pertaining to State law governing beginning age of school children:

"Children who will be six years old in the month of September will not be eligible to go to school without paying tuition. No new bill was passed this year regarding pupils under six years old before September 1. In fact the law is just like it has been for the past several years."

Mr. Frank Dorris, whose farm adjoins the Arney School on the northwest, reports that he has completed the construction of approximately two and one-half miles of terraces recently. Construction of these terraces was done entirely with a one-way plow. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service designed and laid out the terrace lines and checked the terraces after construction. Mr. Dorris' one-way has done an excellent job of terrace construction, since the completed terraces have a height of fifteen inches above normal ground level and a width of approximately thirty feet between the borrow ditches. Such wide, flat terraces will easily permit the use of four-row farming equipment, states Mr. Dorris.

Mr. Phillip Acker, whose farm is six miles east of Dimmitt, also reports that he is nearing completion of terraces on his farm by using an eight-foot blade. Mr. Acker states that the ground is just a little to dry and hard to get the best results with this blade. He intends, however, to build them up higher after the next rain has made the soil firm enough to work again.

Other farmers who are planning the construction of terraces in the near future are M. C. Dobeimer, Leo Dobeimer, Marvin Jones, Lawrence Birkenfeld, J. G. Logsdon, Louis M. Smith and C. L. Thompson.

W.T.S.C. President Writes Letter to Castro Co. Voters

The following letter was submitted to the Castro County News for publication by Mr. J. A. Hill, President of West Texas State College at Canyon:

To the People of Castro County: Throughout the life of West Texas State College, Castro County has been one of her most liberal supporters. Hundreds of your youth have enjoyed higher educational advantages here and in turn have made their contribution to the life and interests of your county. We here at the college greatly appreciate your expressed confidence in us and desire to continue this happy and profitable relationship in even greater measure and improved service. To this end we earnestly request your support of the pending constitutional amendment to be voted on August 2. This amendment will provide a huge building program for the sixteen state supported institutions of higher learning to help take care of the throngs of our youth who are crowding the campuses of Texas. For example, West Texas State will receive almost two and one-half million dollars for building and improvements between this date and 1968. Other state schools will receive proportionately to size. All this great improvement will be made without increase in taxes. We readily admit that this sum is not large enough, but it is more than ten times what we have received for buildings between 1928 and 1948. We suffered terribly last year because we did not have adequate facilities and unless this amendment passes on August 23, we shall continue suffering through an indefinite period. We appeal with all possible earnestness to friends of education in Castro County and especially to all ex-students there to give this amendment your active support.

Tech. College Will Benefit By State Amendment

Lubbock, Tex.—Adoption of an amendment to the Texas constitution creating a special building fund for state supported colleges would enable Texas Technological College to launch a long-range building program, vitally needed to meet demands of increased enrollment and expanded services, college officials state.

If voters ratify the amendment at the August 23 special election, the fund thus created for a 30-year period would be divided among Tech and other institutions on a basis of enrollment. Tech would receive an estimated \$7,425,000, with one-third of this amount to be immediately available.

The entire program is to be financed without increasing taxes now authorized by law, college officials explained. The amendment proposes to reduce the maximum property tax levy from 35 to 30 cents per \$100 valuation and to assign to the building fund a five-cent portion of the presently authorized seven-cent per \$100 valuation property tax for Confederate pension purposes.

On Being Bullied

Americans are recognized throughout the world for their good sportsmanship. And by the same token we all deplore the oppressions of a bully. This is true whether the bullying is being done by individuals or by nations. Time and again in our international affairs we have given aid and comfort to the smaller nations which are being subjected to indignities by a larger and apparently stronger power; in fact, in not a few instances this has meant war and its consequent tragedies and expenditure of our natural resources. We have just come out of such an era and theoretically peace through the world should have ensued.

But unfortunately this is not the case, and worse yet, we, the strong champion and protector of peoples, now find ourselves the subject of a bullying which is undoubtedly designed to make us lose our national dignity in the eyes of the world. Time and again since the war, and during it for that matter, our erstwhile ally Russia with her satellites has stepped on our toes to our detriment in the eyes of other nations. And don't think such acts are isolated and accidental occurrences. They appear to be a part of a fully thought out plan to weaken us at home and abroad. Notice how they generally occur at some point where we are trying to exert our influence for the restoration of a country's economy. Greece, Iran, Austria and Italy all have been countries where we have encountered acts which out-Hitler Hitler. Now this week we are told that three of our soldiers, while in line of duty in Korea, have been kidnapped by the Russians and have been held incommunicado since August 12, 1947 despite all protests of our commanding general in Korea. Can't you see why we have been urging all the interested powers to help write a peace for Korea and get it reunited under one government, but Russia has opposed. This act of aggression against a friendly people is purely and simply the act of a bully; also it is intended to make us lose face in the Orient. And the worst of it is they know they can get away with it for all we ever do is issue formal protests.

We are a peace loving people but even peace loving people can be pushed so far. If we permit such incidents to go unnoticed they will only increase to further embarrass us. We feel the case of these three soldiers should be our turning point; we would be willing to wager that if a regiment of soldiers were marched into the Russian zone of Korea not a shot would be fired and our self-respect would be restored. Today more than ever before we should listen to the words of Theodore Roosevelt: "Speak softly but carry a big stick"

Terminal Leave Bonds Cashable September 2

All terminal leave bonds that have been issued or applied for can be converted to cash on or after September 2, 1947. These bonds will be cashed at their face value as stated on the bond plus interest at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent per year from date of issuance. The date of issuance of each bond is stated to the right of holders name. All banks and other financial institutions which are empowered to cash postal saving stamps can cash Terminal Leave Bonds. Caution: If you are not personally known by the bank employees take your original discharge or separation papers with you. New applicants, those who have not previously applied for terminal leave pay, may elect to receive either cash payment or Terminal Leave Bonds.

The last date on which application for terminal leave pay may be made is extended for one year to September 1, 1948. This will permit veterans, guardians of incompetent veterans and next of kin of veterans who have died since discharge to make application for terminal leave pay.

When Senate Joint Resolution 123 was signed by the President on July 25, 1947, termination of the war, as far as the benefits of the GI Bill, was established. Loans to be guaranteed by the government, must be negotiated on or before July 25, 1957. Education and training courses must be commenced before July 25, 1951, and completed before July 25, 1956. Readjustment Allowance or "52-20", must be used by July 25, 1949, or date of discharge whichever is later, no payments to be made after July 25, 1952.

Final date for re-instating National Service Insurance by paying two monthly premiums has been extended to January 1, 1948.

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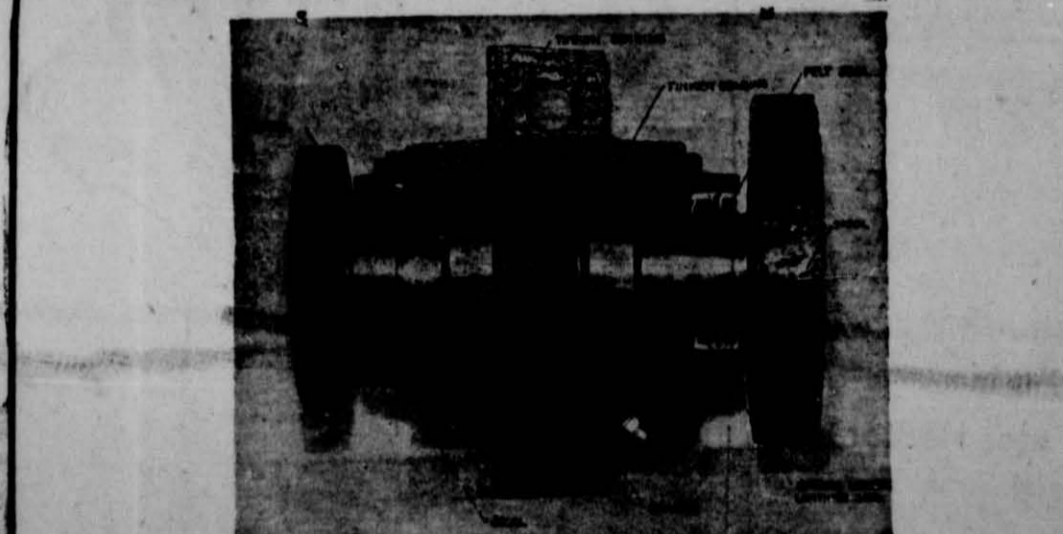

SUGAR IN FRUIT PRESERVES

Here's a tip for housewives on making preserves out of the fruit crop that's coming to market now.

Fruit preserves are successful only if the fruit holds its shape, yet is tender and translucent in the syrup, home economists for the U. S. Department of Agriculture say as they explain that sugar has a firming effect on fruit tissues but must be applied differently to various types of fruit.

Sugar is added "straight" to tender, juicy fruits like peaches, cherries and berries. If the fruits stand overnight in sugar, they become firmer and are less likely to go to pieces in cooking. The sugar draws out the juice and shrinks the fruit

Menace to Our Security Seen In U. S. Army Air Budget Slash

Hitherto unpublished figures show that an economy-minded Congress has cut appropriations for the Army Air Force to the point where it is impossible to continue with serious developments urgently necessary for the security of the United States.

For the first time the exact amounts slashed and the projects they affect are disclosed in an article in the August issue of Cosmopolitan magazine by Lt. Col. Ned Root, U. S. Army Air Corps Reserve.

Research and development are referred to as Wright Field (Ohio) as Project 611. The article states that the development of guided missiles, the designing of an airplane, the study of means to harness atomic energy to propel aircraft, the tailoring of personal flying equipment, the building of heavy bombers of greater range, the tailoring of armor and dozens more are classified under this catalog number.

"Chief of the project is Major General L. C. Craigie, a soldier with a brilliant war record but a man who, unfortunately is not so much for the fiscal year of 1947, General Craigie estimated that it would cost \$250,000,000 to keep our own Air Force in the running with the enterprising air arms of foreign powers. His request was cut three different times. When the government finished mailing him he got \$78,000,000—a little more than one-third of what he asked. Russia, in the meantime, appropriated well over \$1,000,000,000 for "scientific research" in the same period."

A breakdown of the slashes in the Air Force budget shows that the bomber-research budget was cut from \$20,000,000 to \$8,000,000; the transport program was cut from \$12,000,000 to \$5,000,000; the guided missile program was cut from \$13,000,000 to \$1,000,000; the aero-medical program got so little that it was all spent by March; and the Electrical Testing Unit from \$250,000 to \$60,000.

"Everything you have heard about the collapse of our Air Force is true," the article declares. "At a moment when the atomic age has given us a whole new set of equations from which to evolve a radically different philosophy of warfare, at a moment when other nations are spending money and time with little thought of economy to keep their fighting equipment technically abreast of new strategic concepts, the United States government has elected to close the doors of our research laboratories and quit."

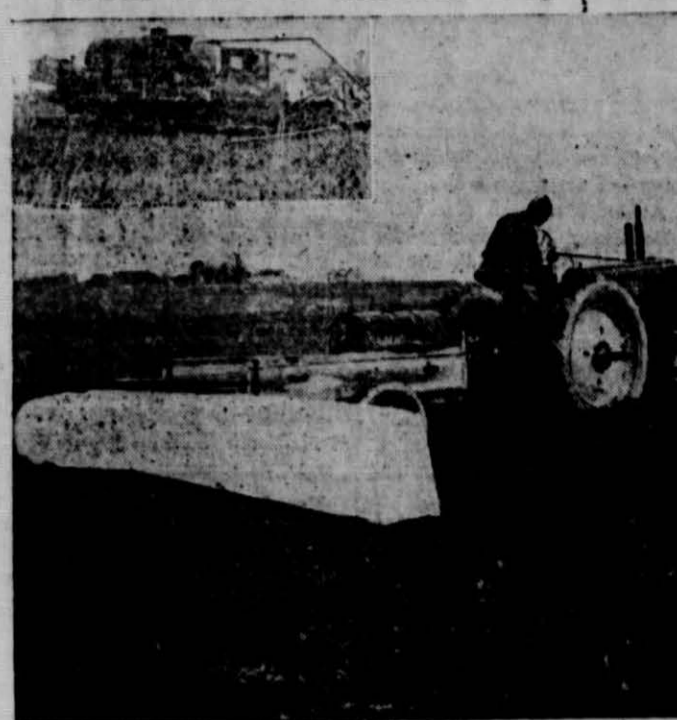

Weed Killer to Increase Crop Yields



CLEVELAND, OHIO—Farmers throughout the nation are welcoming a new practical and inexpensive method of dispersing 2,4-D, the chemical weed killer, as an aid in their battle to save crops beset by recent heavy rains that have threatened the nation's agricultural crops. Under the new application method, 2,4-D is dispersed in a fog-like spray, using a mixture that requires only two to five gallons of spray per acre. A new system uses small simple equipment (large photo) as compared to large bulky equipment (inset). Previous methods called for 100 to 200 gallons of water per acre. Showings by Williams Research specialists originated this new method of weed control, and are watching with interest for the greatly increased yields of barley, wheat and oats.
