## Cisco Boy Drowns In Swimming Pool

Eastland County's second drowning in 1958 occurred Monday afternoon when a 15-year-old Cisco boy lost his life in the swimming pool just below Lake Cisco dam.

Billy Wayne Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Taylor of Cisco, drowned in approximately nine feet of water in the deep end of the large pool. He was swimming with three other boys, his cousins Dennis and Ralph Lanham, both of Cisco, and Jack Snyder, who is visiting from Corpus Christi.

The four boys had been swimming for some time, they told officials, when they suddenly noticed that Billy Wayne was in trouble. The boy sank to the bottom of the pool and the three other youngsters screamed for help. Lifeguard George Henson immediately went in after the boy. He found the boy on the bottom, pulled him to the surface and took him to the water on his first dive.

The drowning took place at approximately 4:25. Billy had just completed his freshman year in Cisco High School and would have been 16 years old June 22. He was a member of the Calvary Baptist Church.

The boy's body was rushed to Graham Sanitarium and Henson administered artificial respiration all the way. The youth was pronounced dead on arrival at 4:45 p.m., however.

Funeral services were still pending this morning. The body is at Wylie Funeral Home in Cisco.

Survivors include the parents; two sisters, Mrs. Nancy Lenz and Evelyn Taylor, both of Cisco; and a grandmother, Mrs. Phama Travis of Cisco.

Blair eggs are sold to a number of retail stores in Eastland County, and he prides their high grade.

Blair lives on his 67 acre farm, which he purchased from Mae Harris back in 1931, with his father, Rev. H. D. Blair. Rev. Blair is a retired Baptist minister. He served as Associational Missionary for 25 years.

## High Winds Damage Ranger Area Sunday

High winds, approaching 50 miles per hour, hit Ranger Sunday night causing considerable damage, as about an inch and one-half of rain drenched the area.

A fence was blown down at Ranger Drive In, a sign was torn down, and tin carried across the highway.

Lights went out in different parts of Ranger at several different times, according to reports. At 1:35 a.m. Monday, the lights went out on Elm St. and at Main and Marston.

Shingles were blown off the roof of the house of Mr. and Mrs. Les Crossley, and several TV antennas were damaged. Slight damage to roofs was felt all over Ranger.

Turkeys on the farm of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Richardson were killed, and several tree limbs torn off. Reports indicated that wind damage was high in the Eastland Hill - Brockbridge highway area.

Lightning over the area caused no reported damage. A large number of birds was found dead in the yard of Mr. and Mrs. Duvaline Dennis, but the cause was unknown.

A TV tower was found, 18 feet from its normal position on the farm of J. D. Johnson.

## New Law May Force County To Build Jail

The Eastland County jail, like 99 percent of other county jails in the state, cannot meet new requirements passed by the 55th Legislature.

That is the opinion of Sheriff J. B. Williams, who like most Texas lawmen, does not believe that there are many jails in the state which can live up to the high standards provided for in House Bill 448.

Asked by a reporter if he thought the Eastland County jail would pass inspection, Sheriff Williams didn't hesitate in saying no. He said the jail would fall short in many ways. Lighting is not up to the new high standard, the jail doesn't have enough cell blocks and proper plumbing, according to the new code, isn't in the jail.

The Eastland County jail, which has seen some of the most notorious outlaws of the state come and go down the years, was built back before the turn of the century.

It was in 1897 that Eastland County boasted a new jailhouse. In 1934 the jail was remodeled, and little has been thought about it since. It is an old looking building, but is in fairly good repair.

"The Texas Lawman," spokesman for the state's lawmen, has bitterly opposed the new bill. "The Lawman" terms the new law "idealistic." The magazine editorially says the law "would work an insupportable hardship on most Texas counties—principally the smaller ones." The editorial also suggested that the counties' tax money could be spent better by "raising the lamentably low salaries of the officials than by seeing to the comforts of jail prisoners."

What is the answer to this county's problem? Sheriff Williams says that if the county has to live up to the letter of the law it will mean that a new jail will have to be built, or at least a major remodeling job will have to be done on the present structure.

The County Commissioners Court, tonight, hasn't worried itself about the new law. The county jail, so far, has not been inspected.

## Ranger may not be faced with a building boom, but it may have a "boomlet," according to recent reports from building contractors and lumber yards.

Building activity within the past three months has been picking up, as at least three new houses have been built and over 12 houses completely remodeled.

Reports were made by M. L. Lawson, contractor, by Ranger Lumber and Supply Co., and by Burton-Lingo Co.

Lawson summed up the situation when he said there is "More building enthusiasm right now than last year." He has built three new houses within the past few months.

Cross will conduct a workshop on Home Economics Course, Care of the Sick and Injured July 21-25. Monday through Friday, in the Home Economics Building, and the student may arrange to stay in the dormitory. Students may pay their own way or be sent by an organization for which they will teach.

East Texas State Teachers College, Commerce, in cooperation with American National Red Cross will also hold an instructor's training course in Home Economics, 429, August 11-15, in the Home Economics Building. Those taking courses for credit must meet elimination contests, both local and regional, the contestants have been narrowed to nine young ladies to compete in the finals.

A portion of the convention program will be devoted to a series of lectures in the form of refresher and post-graduate courses in order to permit practitioners to meet requirements of a new state law and qualify for relicensing.
