You go to Moon Hill, through a gap, until you see a tree marked with crosses, take 72 steps to another marked tree, and the treasure lies in that vicinity. Other markers were an old tomb in the ground and a flat rock (now removed).

The site is situated near a pond on the land of Mrs. Dave Wagley, half-way between Gunsight and Wayland. The late Mr. Wagley used to charge \$5 a day for treasure-seekers, who could dig with shovel, bull-dozer, or anything else, Robertson said.

The gang is known to have buried some of their loot. Whether or not they ever recovered all of it will probably remain a mystery for some time.

## TALES OF LOST TREASURES IN AND AROUND EASTLAND COUNTY

Packsaddle Mountain. There it stands! Just as inanimate and immovable today as it was in 1756 when the great spanish explorer Don Bernardo de Miranda first viewed it during his trip through Central Texas.  
What a mysterious mien the lofty peak presented to Miranda and his followers, there on the bleak plains of what is now Llano County. So Spinx-like and mute in appearance in fact that Miranda named it Cerro del Mudo in the beginning only to change later to the more fitting title of Cerro del Almagre or Almagro Hill because of its like resemblance to red hematite (red ochre) found to be distributed profusely over the mountain's elevations.  
Just what the Spaniards found there (if anything) is of no concern to us in regard to this article however, as we are mainly interested in what benefits the mountain may hold for John Q. Public as of today and according to the ever-persisting legends confronting us now we find there is "plenty."  
First, legend supports a very rich lost silver mine which it has a name known as "The Lost Blanco Mine." The mine's entrance is somewhere on Packsaddle Mountain. Just where, exactly, no one knows, for if they did the mine would not be there for the readers consideration in the first place.  
Secondly, and within view of Packsaddle Mountain, is a small stream whose bottom is composed of a myriad number of gold nuggets. The stream was found and their lost by two greenhorn prospectors who failed to mark the place with surrounding landmarks.  
Third . . . A group of early miners are said to have concealed their take of gold ore near the mountain in preparation to an imminent Indian attack during which "not a living white-eye was spared."

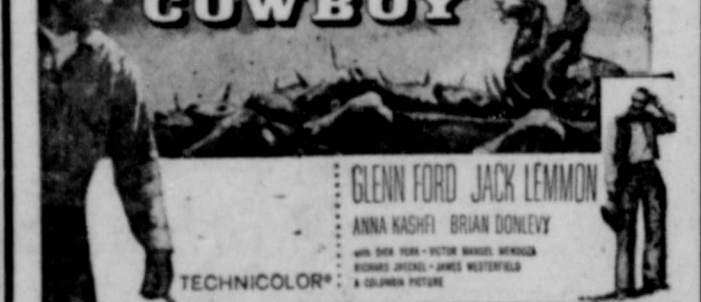

### Wilmer B. Hunt Will Run For Re-Election

HOUSTON (Spl.) — The importance of the functions and responsibilities of the state's highest court was emphasized Wednesday by District Judge Wilmer B. Hunt.  
Judge Hunt is a third generation Texas lawyer seeking the Position One post of Associate Justice of the Supreme court of Texas to be vacated December 31 by St. John Garwood of Houston who is not running for re-election.  
"The impact of decisions of the Supreme Court of Texas now and in the years ahead are of increasing vital concern to Texans in every walk of life," Judge Hunt said.  
"It is therefore important that Texas voters weigh carefully the qualifications of those candidates seeking election to this high post," the veteran jurist added.

The veteran Jurist presides over the 133rd District Court in Houston where he has been re-elected three times since 1948 without opposition.  
He was first elected a special district judge in 1946 in a special election held by the Harris County Bar Association to name a temporary successor to the late Judge Roy Campbell who was ill at the time.  
In 1947 Judge Hunt was appointed judge of the newly created 133rd District Court by Governor Beauford Jester.

Hunt received his BA degree at Georgetown University in Washington and his LLB degree from the University of Texas Law School.  
He is a member of the State Bar of Texas, the American Bar Association and chairman of the legislative committee of the Judiciary section of the State Bar.  
He was engaged in the private practice of law for 19 years prior to becoming judge of the 133rd District Court.

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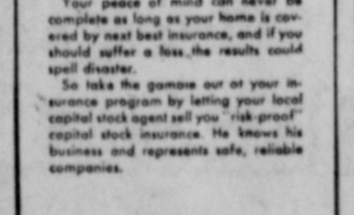

**Yarbrough Asks Grant for Public Junior Colleges**

Senator Ralph Yarbrough (D-Tex.) has introduced in the Senate a bill to authorize an annual grant of \$200 million for five years to help states cope with the emergency in higher education presented by skyrocketing enrollments. The bill would provide for Federal assistance in the construction of public community junior colleges. Speaking on the floor of the Senate, Senator Yarbrough said, "Testimony I have heard before the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee indicates the number of potential college students in the United States will be doubled by 1970. Unless immediate steps are taken to construct buildings to accommodate them, the children of the Veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict will be denied opportunities to attend college, simply because there would be no room for them. "Many high school graduates are being denied an opportunity to go to college today simply because the colleges say they are full and have no more room. This is a denial of the American dream of a college education for every boy and girl who wants it and is capable of mastering the courses. "This bill would provide grants for extension of existing public junior college facilities, or the establishment of new facilities. It provides for the development of State and local junior colleges, with special priority to those areas in need of higher educational facilities. States whose plans are approved would receive a flat Federal grant, with additional funds to be matched by the States. "This bill leaves control of these public junior colleges wholly under the States. There is no danger, under this bill, of Federal control of junior colleges. "The failure to provide adequate facilities for the young people of America is leading to the waste of the greatest of all our resources, our human resources.
