Nazareth Baseball Team Won Bi-District Last Week

The high-flying Nazareth Swifts came from behind last Wednesday to defeat the Whiteharrel Wares, 6-4, and take the bi-district championship. The victory in Lubbock's Hodge Park gave the Swifts a perfect record of 13 victories and no defeats.

Due to short baseball seasons in Class B schools, the bi-district championship is the highest honor a team can win.

A high wind hampered the championship game, but both teams turned in excellent performances. After pitcher Leroy Hoelting gave up three runs in the fifth inning, the Swifts found themselves trailing for the first time this year, 3-4.

Hoelting held the Wares at bay in the sixth inning, however, as he made it plain that he had given up his last run. Two hits, a perfect squeeze play by utility fielder Jerome Guber, and a throwing error by the Wares netted three big runs for the Swifts in the sixth to put them out ahead again. Dennis Hoelting replaced his younger brother in the last two innings and pitched scoreless ball to preserve Nazareth's two-run lead.

Leading run producer for the year was center-fielder Danny Schmuicker, the only senior on the Swift roster. His brilliant ball-

hawking, long throws from center, and high batting percentage made him a mainstay in the Swift line-up.

The squad includes 13 players, mostly sophomores and juniors. Coach J. M. Slavik's Swifts battled out victories over Plainview High School, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Adrian, Hart, Bovina, and Springlake. All but the latter two of these teams fell before the Nazareth battery twice during the season.

The Nazareth American Legion will sponsor the Swifts as its local entry in the Legion's summer baseball program. Coach Slavik announced this week.

The Dimmitt Produce Company received its certificate of incorporation Friday and has begun accepting bids for construction of a vegetable processing plant in Dimmitt.

Acting as incorporators of the new company were Joe Cowen, Dimmitt Mayor; B. M. McLean, secretary-treasurer of the company; and B. M. Nelson, company president. Cowen and Nelson presented the articles of incorporation to the secretary of state in Austin Friday and received the charter for the company.

Members of the stock company plan to have a processing plant ready for operation by vegetable harvesting time, Nelson said Wednesday. Harvest is expected to begin in mid-July and continue through October.

The company's charter, adopted by the corporation and approved by the secretary of state: **Dimmitt Produce Company Articles of Incorporation** "We, the undersigned natural persons of the age of 21 years or more, all of whom are citizens of the State of Texas, acting as incorporators of a corporation under the Texas Business Corporation Act, do hereby adopt the following Articles of Incorporation for such corporation:

ARTICLE ONE "The name of the corporation is Dimmitt Produce Company.

ARTICLE TWO "The corporation is organized for the following purposes: to purchase, lease or otherwise acquire, sites for the operation of plants to process, prepare for market, and market agricultural products; to improve said property with suitable buildings and to equip said buildings with necessary machinery and equipment; to operate processing plants and market vegetables and other agricultural products; and to lease and let said sites and plants to persons, firms and/or corporations engaged in the business of processing and marketing vegetables and other agricultural products; with authority to own all property, real and personal, necessary and convenient to said purpose, and to engage in any business incident to said purposes and that will promote said purposes.

County Schools Graduate 89

Dimmitt, Nazareth, and Hart high schools will graduate 89 seniors in commencement services Friday night. Sixty-three will receive diplomas from Dimmitt High School, while Hart and Nazareth schools will graduate 13 each.

Dimmitt's graduating class will be the largest in the history of the school. Hart and Nazareth classes will be "average size," according to school authorities.

Valedictorian of Dimmitt High School is Mary Coke, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John M. "Pete" Coke of Flagg. Miss Coke has a four-year grade average of 94.9, and is an honor student in English.

Salutatorian of Dimmitt High School is Nancy Neumayer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. Neumayer of Dimmitt. She compiled a 94.4 grade average in all high school subjects and is honor student in biology, typing, and commercial subjects.

Ten DHS students have grade averages of better than 91.

A pair of twins, Evelyn and Ethel Drerup, won high grade honors at Nazareth High School. Their four year grade averages were separated by .02 of a point—Evelyn is valedictorian with a 95.55 grade percentage, while Ethel is salutatorian with a 95.53 average.

Daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Drerup, Evelyn and Ethel are honor students in mathematics, and have both won top honors in ULL math competition. Both are members of the Children of Mary Sodality; Evelyn is the News correspondent for Nazareth.

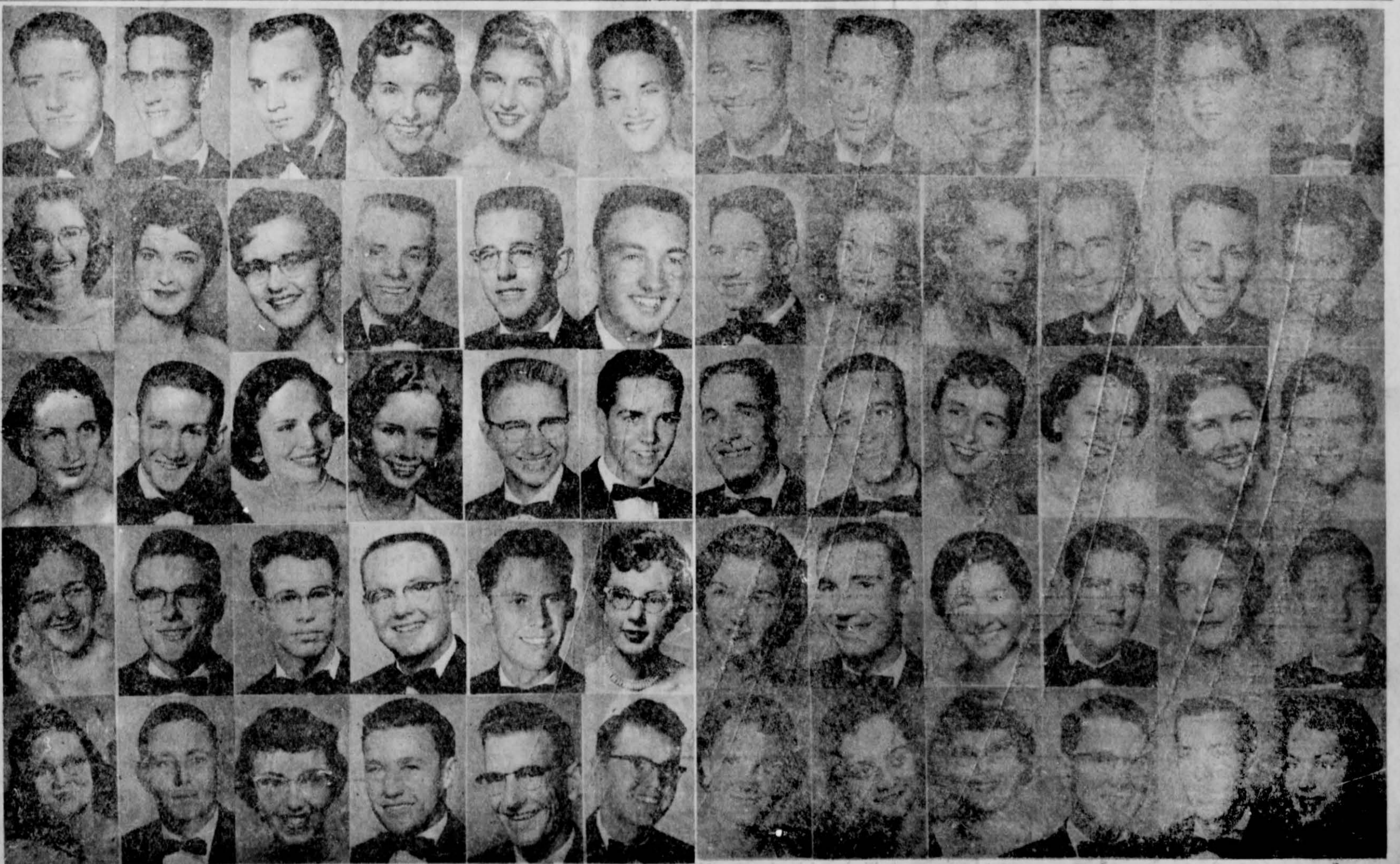

Grain Sorghum Was My Project

I took Grain Sorghum as a project for the first time in 1956. My project consisted of 4.28 acres. The land was prepared before planting by cutting stumps, tilling, harrowing, listing twice, chiseling twice and watering.

On May 19, I planted 7 pounds of seed to the acre on my ground. A good stand came up and on June 11 I knifed and fertilized it. I also hoed it once during the year and run out the middles. The land was watered three times. The grain was harvested on October 12, and made 28,500 total pounds of grain. I sold it on November 3 for \$1.80 per hundred pounds or \$503.50. The total expenses were \$106.10 so my profit was \$397.40.

At the Achievement Event on January 1, I won the third place grain sorghum trophy and a \$25 savings bond of which I was very proud.

I think the grain sorghum project is a good way to learn to produce more and better grain. I am making it as a project again this year and I hope to profit by the mistakes I made last year.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

The week of May 26 through June 2 has been declared Soil Stewardship Week, to recognize that the man who carries out soil conservation practices on the land he owns or controls is a good steward of the land.

Some two weeks ago, a group of farmers and others observed some good conservation practices while on a farm tour. Among those observed were a diversion terrace and waterway on George Bagwell's farm.

In about 1950, Mr. Bagwell became concerned about washes, or small gullies, running in his field. He contacted the SCS personnel assisting the Farming Water Soil Conservation District as a means of handling this situation.

It was decided that a diversion terrace and waterway would be best adapted to his operations. He was advised as to what shape and size of waterway to install, and was told that Western Wheat Grass would possibly be best to protect the waterway from washing.

He shaped the waterway and seeded it as was planned, but because of adverse weather conditions, the grass was not well established until 1953, when he again sought assistance from the local soil conservation district. A diversion was designed and laid out.

Mr. Bagwell is more than pleased with the results of these practices. If you have a water problem on your farm, feel free to contact the Soil Conservation Service for assistance.

FRESH TOMATOES BY JULY 4th!

The electric hotbed has answered the wishes of those who desire an early garden, but hesitate to challenge the unpredictable Spring weather. An electric hotbed can give your seedlings the necessary early start and healthy growth to produce nutritious, vine ripened tomatoes by early July. For that matter, you can have a full garden of any number of vegetables that can easily be transplanted, such as lettuce, eggplant, peppers, etc. Your hotbed installation requires only a small investment and it can be used year after year to give you early garden produce. One 60 foot

above 70 degrees at any time. Germination is in five to eight days. Transplanting to the open garden in late May can be done without loss of growth.

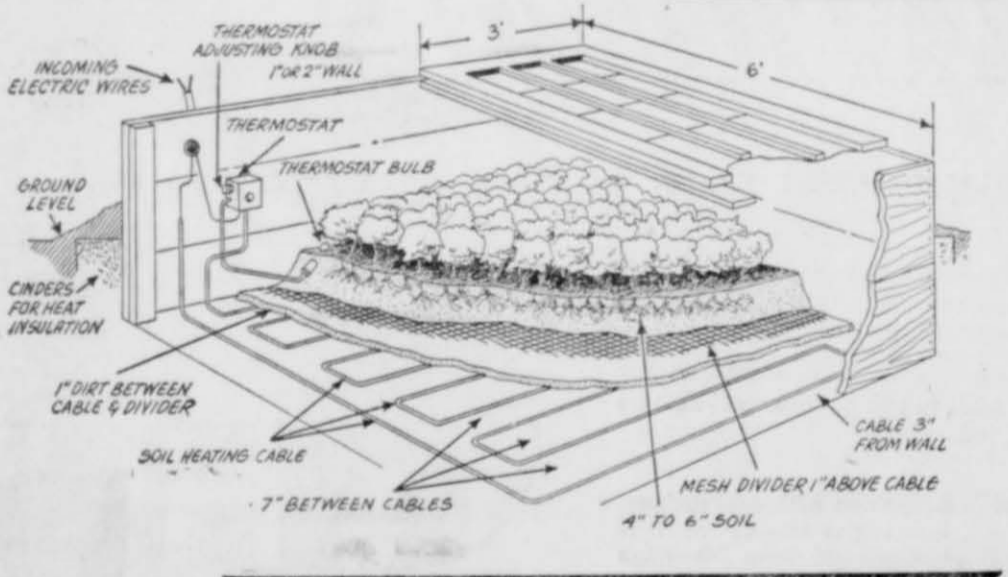
In locating your hotbed it is advised to select a sunny exposure on well-drained soil, protected from cold winds by shrubbery or by partial burying in the ground. Follow the hotbed instructions for each of the annual seedlings planted.

Your farm equipment dealer can give you any information you might need on hotbed installation and operation, or check with your power supplier.
