RANGER in June of 1939—was a busy place according to a picture of a Ranger street scene in a special edition of the Times.

WATER CONNECTIONS to total 998 in 1938, an increase of over 100 since 1937. There were 897 gas meters at the time.

Scouting in Ranger is over 30 years old, as it was started by the Rotary Club in 1927. W. W. Housewright was the first work chairman.

SUN, snow and wind averages in Ranger in 1939—the sun showed itself 70 percent of the time, an average of two and one-half inches of snow fell a year, and winds averaged 10.3 m.p.h.

MILLS GROCERY was located at the corner of Walnut and N. Rusk Sts. Just completed a new Woods Grocery and Market, owned by ORVILLE WARD.

Under construction at the time was the Ranger Clinic Building, to be occupied later by Doctors W. L. and C. L. JACKSON. Offices of DR. W. L. DOWNTAIN were also being built.

"We have been here 20 years, and you can tell them we will be here 20 years longer," said PEARL SHELTON, co-owner with "Jiggs" Anderson of the Jiggs Cafe—in 1939.

The Pipkin Brothers—GRADY and JESS—were running the Piggy Wiggy Market at that time. President of the Commercial State Bank was O. D. DILLINGHAM, and HALL WALKER was vice president. W. F. CREGGER was a cashier and J. L. HANEY was assistant cashier.

Directors included M. R. NEWNHAM and Edwin George, Jr. More about this special edition will come later.

Ranger Lagging Behind In Shares to Land Co.

Ranger lags behind other towns in the area in paying for shares in the Lone Cedar Country Club Land Co., according to a statement from Dr. James Whittington, president of the company from Eastland.

Over 80 percent of Eastland stockholders have bought second shares, better than 60 percent of Gorman holders, over 50 per cent of Cisco stock holders, but only about 10 per cent of Ranger stock holders have purchased two shares in the company.

Work on the Lone Cedar Country Club is progressing nicely, Dr. Whittington said. Contract for the swimming pool was awarded Monday to Associated Tile and Granite Co. of San Antonio, which made a low bid of \$8,050.

Finishing work on the inside of the club will start Friday. Stamford Engineering Co. of Abilene is constructing the building. Workmen are in the process of wiring, and an air conditioning system is being installed.

Construction of the swimming pool will start next Monday, June 23, if Ranger stock holders purchase a second share, Dr. Whittington said. The pool will be 60 feet in length and 40 feet wide at the shallow-water end, with steps across the back. It will be 20 feet wide at the deep end, according to approved plans drawn up by Associated Tile.

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Three County Farms Add Terrace Systems

People in this area realize we must make better use of our land and the water that falls on it if we have continuous abundant agricultural production. Best land use means conservation farming to sustain the production from our land which is so essential to the economy of our area.

A conservation program as a whole for the area depends upon the application of conservation upon the land by individual land owners. Our two local Conservation Districts, the Upper Leon S.C.D. and the Palo Pinto S.C.D., use individual farm plans as a means of encouraging conservation and as a basis for the development of their conservation programs. No two farms are alike. In fact, no two acres of land are identical as to kind of soil, slope, and degree of erosion. Conservation programs for individual farms must be designed to fit the particular piece of land and the land owner's operations. To be of lasting benefit they are based on a scientific analysis of the land as shown by soil and range surveys. This area has made good progress this spring in conservation planning. Some 20 land owners have made complete conservation plans for their land in the past two months.

In keeping with a planned conservation program, steady progress is being made in the application of conservation practices. Three farms between Cisco and Eastland have recently installed terrace systems. They are J. G. Harlow, E. L. Boothe, and Aubrey Easter. Farm ponds have been recently built on the Ernest Sneed farm at Merton Valley, the H. E. Wagley farm southwest of Cisco, the E. R. Finley farm south east of Cisco, and the J. C. Harlow farm on Highway 80 east of Cisco. In addition, E. L. Boothe, J. G. Harlow, and Aubrey Easter each built division terraces to protect cropland from outside water. J. W. Overstreet, near Alameda, has also recently built a diversion terrace. H. E. Wagley, J. G. Harlow, and Guy Cooper, who farms near Ranger have recently shaped and graded grass on waterways for handling outside water and ter-

race water. Cost sharing on each of the above practices was made available through the local A.S.C. committee, with technical service in their installation furnished by the local Soil Conservation work unit.

To a friend of mine who is an executive in the field of finance, I made a remark about the Spanish prisoner swindle and to my amazement he said:

"I never heard of it."
"The scheme is one of the oldest. In its original form, the prisoner was in Spain; in more recent years, he is in Mexico but the 'con game' is still known to the authorities as the Spanish prisoner."

Briefly, here's the way it operates: An American who is well-to-do receives a letter. The letter declares its writer is a rich man who has been wronged by enemies—(sometimes political foes; sometimes grasping relatives who seek to deprive him of his property). Before he is seized (the letter

goes on) he had a premonition and was planning to flee, so he had placed a large amount of cash and jewels in a box. Only he knows where the box is hidden.

With his last money, he has paid a friendly guard who will smuggle this letter out and has agreed to let him escape on the payment of \$50,000 (or perhaps \$10,000).

"You may wonder at hearing from a stranger," the letter continues. "But I have heard you spoken of as a man of honor."

Then follows the plan: The American is to come to Mexico, of course bringing the cash with him. He is to proceed to such-and-such a city where he will go to the central park. He is to arrive at exactly ten minutes before 11 o'clock in the morning. Precisely four minutes later—(Ah, romance now enters the story!) a young lady will arrive at the statue beside which the American waits. She is the prisoner's daughter.

"I hope you will pardon a father's pride when I say that she is beautiful with the beauty of Old Castile," he writes.

Then he gives the code words which will be exchanged so that each may be sure of the other's identity. The daughter and the American will proceed with the plans for buying the man's release, after which they will obtain the box, and, for his aid, the American will be given half the contents. His share will easily be worth ten times the amount he provides.

The letter closes with the admonition that the utmost secrecy is necessary lest the prisoner's oppressors learn of the plan and move him to another stronghold.

"So say nothing to anyone but come alone—and at once. Time is of the essence." The letter is written in bold handwriting and the English is excellent although the phrases are in courtly Spanish such as one would expect from a well-educated Mexican.

If the American follows the plan, he is met by a lovely senorita who conducts him to two friends. The procedure varies but he is asked to show the money; he is then asked to wrap it in plain brown paper and tie it with red string, which they provide. Soon, they make an appointment to meet him at a little cafe for breakfast next day and from there they will proceed to the town where the prisoner is held.

Next morning, the American is at the little cafe but his new friends are not there. He waits half the morning still they do not appear. He returns to his hotel room, locks the door and opens the package. It contains pieces of newspaper. An already-prepared package had been substituted for the one with the money.

That, in brief, is the Spanish prisoner story.

If you receive such a letter, it is suggested that you keep it as a souvenir but that you also keep your \$5,000 even though this will mean that you do not get to meet the beautiful senorita.

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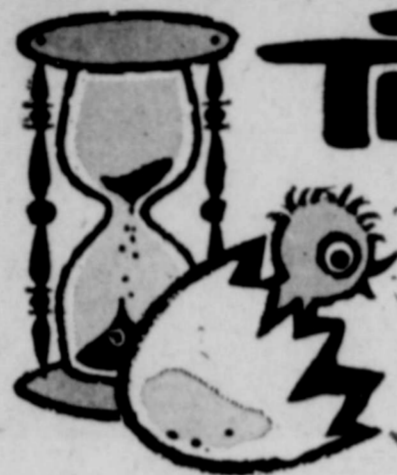
