Lone Cedar Club Work In Finishing Stage

Finishing work on the inside of the Lone Cedar Country Club will start Friday with Stamford Engineering Co. of Abilene in charge of construction.

Wiring and air conditioning systems are being installed at the club.

Work is expected to be completed on club facilities by August, Dr. James Whittington, president of the Lone Cedar Land Co. of Eastland, said.

A contract for construction of the club's swimming pool was awarded, earlier this week, to Associated Tile and Granite Co. of San Antonio.

The club will be equipped with a ball room, recreation room, kitchen, offices, lounge room, locker rooms for men and women, and a storage room.

Insulation will be placed in the building at a later date.

A 12-foot wide porch starts in back of the building and extends over off-way around the structure, which faces Lake Leon.

Redwood will be used in the ball room, and the lounge room will be finished in mahogany.

Landscaping of the grounds will be done at a later date.

About 65 shares to the land company remain to be sold in Eastland County, according to a late report.

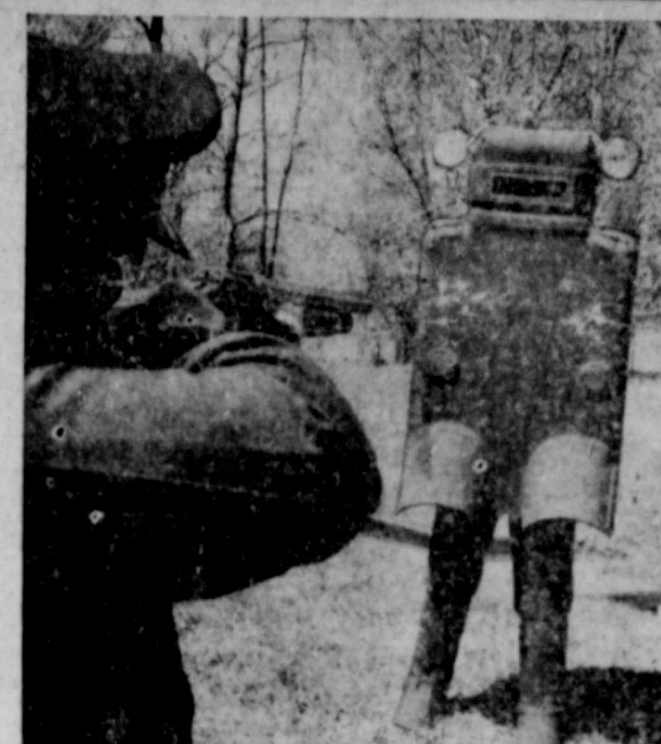

Olden Voters to Decide On School Tax Saturday

Olden Independent School District voters go to the polls Saturday to decide if the maintenance and bond tax rate of the District shall be raised from \$1.25 to \$1.50.

The School Board, in calling the election, said the higher tax rate is necessary to meet new state regulations in regard to the number of teachers and subjects offered.

A heavy turnout is expected. A spokesman for the School Board said the next tax would enable the school to offer chemistry and physics, which have not been offered in the past.

July Fourth Celebration Prize Money Is Increased

Prizes for participants in the July 4th Celebration contests at Lake Leon were increased during a meeting of joint committees of the Ranger and Eastland Chambers of Commerce in Eastland, Tuesday night.

A total of \$150 in prizes will be awarded.

Top prizes, of \$15, will go to the best trick skier and to the best all-around skier. Best performances on two ski will win \$10 each for the best man and the best woman.

Best single-ski performances will win \$10 for the man and \$10 for the woman. The oldest skier and the youngest skier present will also win \$10 prizes.

Children, under 15-years old, can win a prize of \$5 for the biggest catfish, the biggest bass, largest crappie, and largest string (judged by numbers and not by weight of fish). Adults will win \$10 in each division of the fishing rodeo.

Registration for skiing contests will start next week at Ranger and Eastland Chambers of Commerce.

In other action, it was decided by the group to turn the details of the boat parade over to the Lake Leon Boat Club. They will decide upon a starting and stopping place for the event and determine other arrangements. An area on the lake will be designated for boat entries.

Virgil Seaberry, of Eastland, presided over the session.

Joe Collins, of Ranger, indicated that a ski course would be marked out on the lake this Thursday night. Tire tubes will be used to indicate the course.

R. V. Galloway, manager of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce indicated that he would try to obtain two judges from Fort Worth for the skiing contest. If they are unavailable, area judges will be used.

Ronald Waters, assistant Explorer post advisor of Ranger, announced that the post has donated labor towards construction of a ski jump on the lake. It is hoped that it can be built before July 4th, he said.

A group of four men—two from Eastland and two from Ranger—will be present by the dam to weigh in fish from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on July 4th. Fishing will get underway at 12:01 a.m. that day. Ski entries must register before 2 p.m.

Ranger volunteer firemen will man the public address system to announce the names and numbers of entries.

Ab Richardson will maintain concessions that day.

### LEGAL NOTICE

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

That on the 11th day of June, 1958 the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Water Supply District had a regular stated meeting, passed an ordinance changing the rules and regulations for fishing and boating on Lake Leon, which were passed on the 12th day of July, 1955. The changes were in Article III and Article V. The new law will read as follows:

**ARTICLE III**  
It shall be unlawful in Lake Leon to catch or take any fish, or to possess any fish taken by any method, means or device, except by ordinary pole and line, rod and reel, fly rod, throw line equipped with no more than two (2) hooks, and trotline of no more than thirty (30) hooks. The use of trotlines is limited to one trotline per person and not more than two (2) trotlines per party of two or more persons. No metallic trotlines shall be used. No two trotlines or more shall be connected together in any manner; and no trotline shall be set, tied or placed within two hundred (200) feet of any boat dock or pier, bathing pier, beach or any place commonly used as a swimming area.

Minnow seines not more than twenty (20) feet in length, dip nets and fruit jars with funnel attached are permitted for taking minnows and rough fish. Further, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to fish for, take, catch, or attempt to catch any fish in the waters of Lake Leon by the use of any net, seine, snag line, trap or other device not herein authorized; and the possession, within two hundred (200) yards of Lake Leon, of any tackle not authorized by this act shall be prima facie evidence of violation hereof.

### ARTICLE V

It shall be unlawful in Lake Leon to use for bait any game fish or fish commonly known as Gold Fish, except when they are cut up and used as cut bait. It shall be lawful to use for bait, when lawfully caught, acquired and possessed, crappie and perch.

This notice shall be published in the papers in Eastland County once a week for two consecutive weeks, said change of ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after June 26, 1958.

A full copy of the changes in this ordinance will be on file at the Chamber of Commerce in Eastland and Ranger.

A third type of benefit payable under the Social Security program is a disability payment. This is payable to a disabled worker beginning at age 50, or to a child receiving retirement pay under Social Security, or who died fully insured provided the child is disabled and has been since before age 18. The child must be dependent on the worker at the time he becomes eligible or at the time of the worker's death.

The law also provides that a worker may "freeze" his Social Security at the time he becomes disabled. This protects any future benefit rights that a worker may have so it is very important that any disabled worker establish his disability now with the Social Security regardless of the age at which he became disabled.

In order to be eligible for the "freeze" payments, a person must be so severely disabled that he is unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity. This applies to the childhood disability cases as well as the disabled worker.

The worker, in addition, must have worked under Social Security at least 5 of the 10 years before the established beginning date of his disability and also for the one-half year in the 3-year period before he became disabled. The disability must be a physical or mental disability that is medically determinable. The worker has to be disabled for a period of six months before the payments can become effective. A disability can have no effect on a person's Social Security unless he was disabled at least six months before age 65.

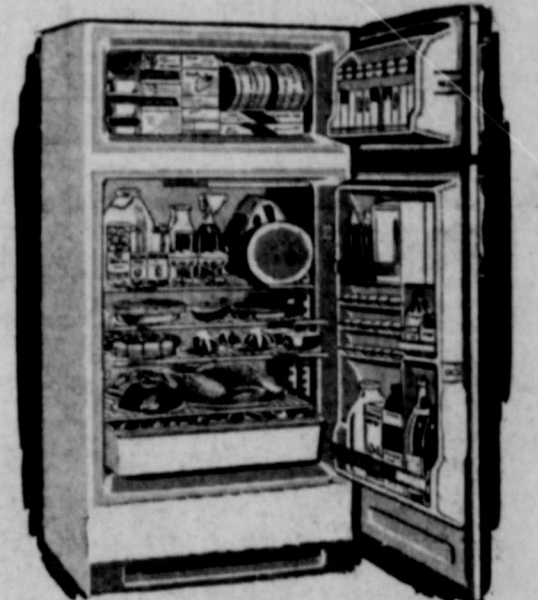

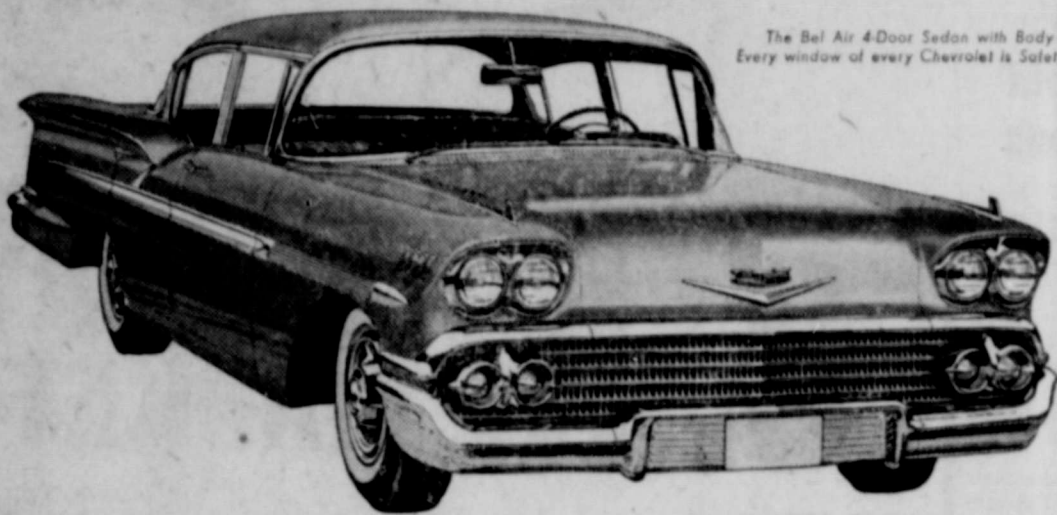

**Texans Urged To Write About Tax Reductions**

WASHINGTON — U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough today urged all Texans who believe a federal income tax reduction is needed to help end the recession to write his Washington office.

Senator Yarborough's request for an "expression from the people on this serious question" came after the Council of State Chamber of Commerce had also asked for "a public outpouring of letters" on the subject.

A move by Senator Yarborough to cut income taxes for all Americans by raising exemptions from \$600 to \$800 to help end recession was defeated in the Senate at mid-March.

"Since that time, several economists and many individuals have told me that they strongly favor the tax reduction I am urging. I think if we are to have a tax cut, it should be cut for all of the people and not another tax cut for a privileged few."
