

In order to keep the program self-supporting, tax increases are provided in the law each five years beginning with 1960 through 1975. The increase in the en ployee and employer will me 1/2 percent until a maximum of 4 1/4 percent is reached in 1957. The increase for the self-employed person is 3/4 percent until a maxium of 6 3/8 percent is reached

Social Security taxes, as are all federal taxes, are collected by the Internal Revenue Service. They are then placed in the Social Se urity Trust Funds. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, total tax collections were approximately €.5 billion dollars. Interest on the approximately 23 billion dollars in the funds amounted to \$561 mil-

From the trust funds are paid the Social Security benefits and the costs of administering the program. Payments from the trust finds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, were approximate ly 6.5 billion in benfits and \$150 nillion for operating expense This latter figure represents about 2.2 per cent of taxes collected. 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
