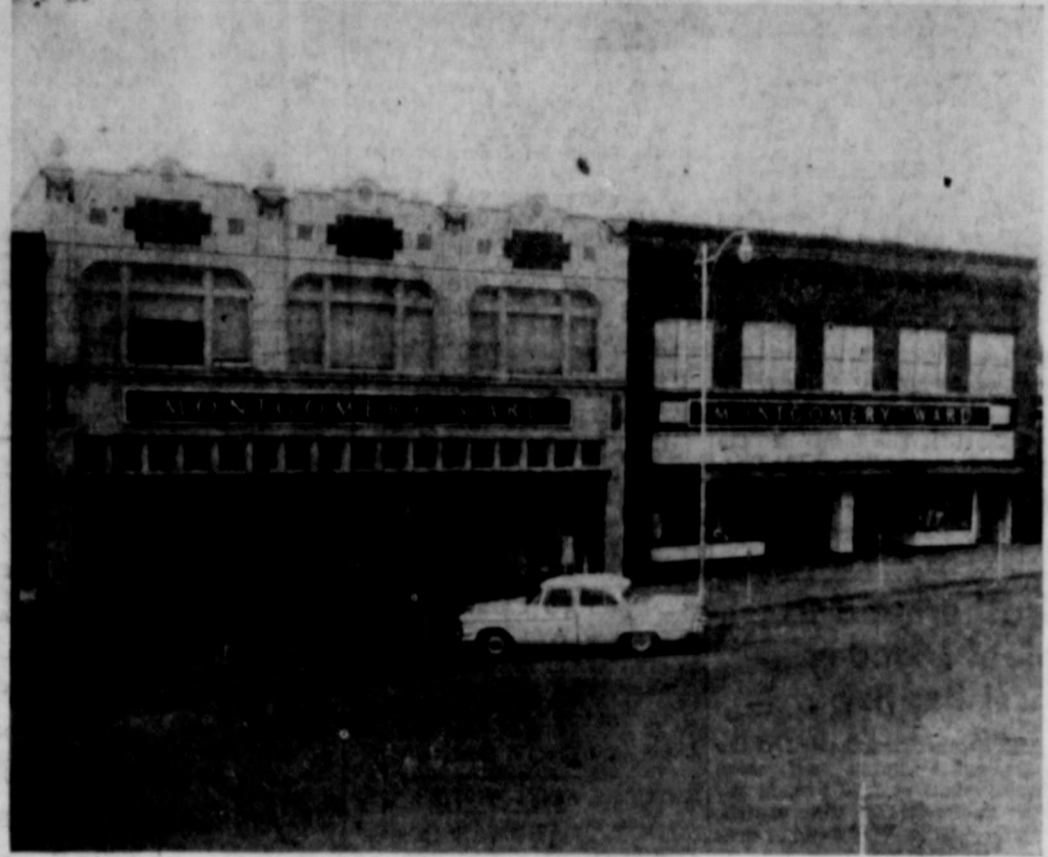

New Telephone Directories Are Placed In Mail

Ranger's new telephone directories were mailed to subscribers here Wednesday. Wm. H. McAnally, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company manager announced today.

"The new directory contains about 2000 alphabetical listings," McAnally said.

"A number of extra copies are printed as replacements for those used in public telephone booths and other places where much use occurs," McAnally explained.

Bicyclist Stops in Ranger Thursday

A cross-country bicyclist, Bob Clark of California, spent Thursday night and Friday morning with Mr. and Mrs. Lowe Wallace in Ranger.

The Ranger couple met Clark at a roadside park near Coolidge, Ariz., two weeks ago while they were on vacation.

Clark is a school teacher who plans to travel all the way to New York City. He averages between 100 and 200 miles a day on his bicycle, he claims.

Clark will return to California by bus.

Politics entered the final week here, today, with the Democratic primary election coming up Saturday, and the heated county judge's election has claimed the local spotlight.

Two strong candidates, Judge John Hart and former Judge Clyde Garrett, have been busy all week exchanging shots in the county judge's race, after the campaign was broken wide open by Garrett's charges Monday before the County Commissioners Court that Hart was making a "political football" out of the Surplus Food Program.

Latest development in the affair is Hart's press release stating he planned to ask the FBI to investigate the charge that the surplus food program is being used to further his campaign for reelection.

Garrett immediately replied, in a statement released to county and regional newspapers, that "... such an investigation on the part of the FBI is wholly outside their jurisdiction."

Judge Hart told a reporter representing the Eastland Telegram and The Ranger Times that he hadn't called in the FBI as late as Friday, but that he was taking steps to do so.

Hart pointed out that the surplus food program, although administered locally by the County Commissioners Court, is handled in Austin by a State agency, which answers to the Federal Government.

A check shows that Eastland County pays all employees who handle the program on a local level, and also pays the cost of transporting the surplus food to Eastland for distribution. The only other cost is for rent of the lower floor of the Masonic Building. At the present time, some 1800 Eastland County citizens are receiving surplus food.

Here is Garrett's prepared statement:

"If my opponent were aware of the functions and duties of the various State and Governmental agencies, he would know that such an investigation on the part of the FBI is wholly outside their jurisdiction. The FBI would not concern itself with such. The FBI, under the Delineation Agreement of the U. S. Government concerns itself with the investigation and prosecution of the following acts: Treason, Sabotage, Subversion, Infiltration of Foreign Nationals in law departments, and Kidnapping (where there is evidence of interstate transportation of the victim, and where more than 24 hours has elapsed since the alleged crime), and other such related acts of violence against the Federal Government."

"Secondly, assuming that the FBI would consent to such investigation (which they would not without direct orders of the Department of Justice, Washington, D. C.), it would take them more than a week to make such investigation, and by that time the forthcoming election would be over."

### A Relish for Cold Cuts



Whether you prepare an occasional guest buffet or pack a daily lunch, the cold cuts need a prep-up, and for that matter, so do hot cuts. One of the best and newest is a sweet-sour American chutney type apple relish. Simple and inexpensive to make, it teams well with beef, pork and lamb. Pulls all right with game too. Any variety of apple may be used, but tart, juicy ones are always best for relishes.

**Here's what you need:**

2 quarts chopped apple	1 teaspoon ground ginger
1 fairly large Spanish onion	1/2 teaspoon dry mustard
1 clove garlic	1 cayenne pepper to taste
2 cups brown sugar	1/2 teaspoon curry powder
2 cups vinegar	2 cups raisins

**This is all you do:**  
Wash, pare, core, chop and measure apples—those new measuring marked jars come in handy for this. Chop onion. Mix all ingredients and boil until thick. Taste and add more seasoning if wanted. Pour boiling hot relish into hot half pint jars. Put lid on jar, screw band tight.

This coming Monday night at 8 p.m., awards will be given to the outstanding players of the junior and senior league.

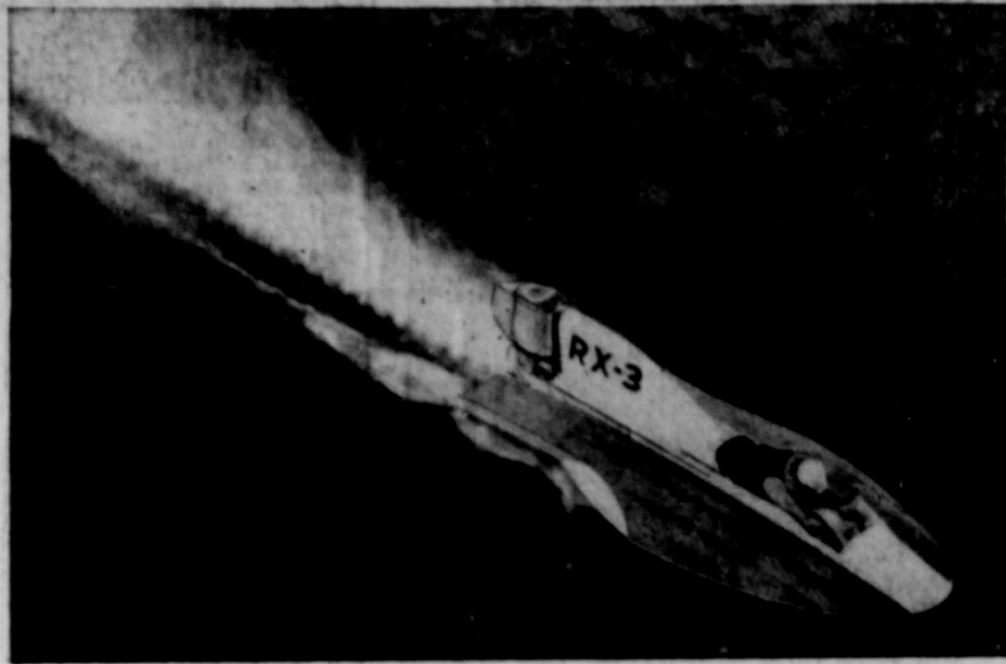
The outstanding player in the Teen-Age League will receive a trophy and the runner-up will receive a plaque.

were to make such investigation (which they won't), they would not release their findings for public consumption so that my opponent might use them also as a political football to try to influence voters.

"There are State agencies (as well as Federal Agencies) whose primary functions are to investigate alleged irregularities within State and Federal agencies. In the State of Texas, for example, we have, among others, the following State investigative agencies: State Police (Texas Rangers) and Highway Patrol, Motor Vehicle Bureau, Adjutant General's Office, Bureau of Vital Statistics, Board of Supervisors of Elections, Department of Correction, Board of Medical Examiners, Department of Education, Industrial Accident Board, and the Public Welfare Agency that makes investigations in the malfunctions within the State Public Welfare Agency. The Federal Government's Surplus Food Program is also administered under a Division of the U. S. Government that makes its own investigations, when necessary. This Agency is not the FBI.

"For my opponent's information, I herewith list the various departments of the Federal Government, and their related investigative agencies: U. S. Armed Services (Intelligence Divisions, Unit Provost Marshals, Military Police, Criminal Investigation Divisions, Unit Personnel Divisions, Demobilized Records Branch); Treasury Department, (Division of Investigations, U. S. Customs, U. S. Coast Guard, Secret Service, Intelligence Unit, Internal Revenue Department, Bureau of Narcotics, Alcohol Tax Unit); Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Identification Division, Single Fingerprint File, International Exchange File, Technical Laboratory, Law Enforcement Bulletin Division, National Police Academy.

"And here are a few more, Office of Naval Intelligence, Office of Special Investigation, U. S. Civil Service Commission, Post Office Department, U. S. Maritime Service, Federal Communications Commission, Department of State, Census Bureau and the U. S. Marshal's Office.

### Texas Tourists Spend \$531 Million In 1957

AUSTIN — Vacation motor travel is big business in Texas, with nearly ten and a half million tourists spending \$531 million as they piled up four billion miles of driving during 1957.

These figures were mentioned today by J. O. Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, as he warned Texans of the many traffic accidents that occur during summer's peak vacation months.

"Every year, more and more persons take to the open road during the summer months," Musick said. "And each year, more and more of them manage to get themselves injured or killed in traffic accidents while on vacation."

He attributed such accidents to many causes, but listed the principal ones as being:

- (1) Excessive speed. Because many vacationers try to cover too much territory in too short a time, speed is an important factor. More than fifty percent of the drivers in rural fatal traffic accidents are traveling at excessive speeds at the time of the accident.
- (2) Alcohol. People on vacation are likely to be in a holiday mood and frequently their pursuit of a good time includes drinking. Drinking and driving motorists are involved in more than a third of all rural fatal traffic accidents.
- (3) Laws. Failure to observe traffic signs and laws exacts a high annual toll. About one-fifth of the cars smashed up in rural fatal accidents are found to have disregarded warning or stop signs.
- (4) Fatigue. Driving while fatigued is a foolish practice indulged in by vacationers, who won't take time out to get sufficient rest. On a national basis, about one out of thirteen drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are found to be in a physical condition that could be a contributing factor in the accident. "In about

### ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health. HENRY A. HOLLE, M.D., Commissioner

If you are the parent of a youngster who will start school for the first time this fall, you can help yourself and the State Department of Health by requesting a copy of his birth record now.

Most school systems require a birth certificate to prove the child was six years old on September 1. By making early requests for birth records, parents can save themselves needless anxiety, their children some missed classwork, and the Department a great deal of time.

Several hundred parents have already requested and received records of their children's birth, but tens of thousands of additional records will have to be processed between now and the time school doors swing open for the new term. If too many people delay until August—as they usually do—the resulting bottleneck could very well mean your youngster will be barred when that first school bell rings.

The reason is obvious: The limited staff of the Division of Vital Statistics—despite long hours of night and week-end work without overtime pay—can search just so many files, extract just so many records, and photostat just so many copies in time for school's opening.

Birth record keepers shudder when they think of the 247,500 children—an estimate supplied by the Texas Education Agency—who will be eligible to enter school for the first time this September. Many of them have copies of birth records and will create no problem. Others live in areas where school officials do not require proof of age before admitting the child to classes.

But the majority do not have certified proof of age, despite the fact that they live in areas where school authorities insist on such proof. This is the category that means sleepless nights for health department statisticians and n d clerks.

All parents have to do is give the child's name and date and place of birth, the mother's maiden name and the name of the father. That information, plus the legal fee of one dollar will buy anyone a copy of their birth record, providing the original is on file.

It's a good bet the original will be filed, since the Department keeps track of some 10 million birth and death records, some dating back to 1903.

There is just one more thing: If you don't care to write to the State Department of Health in Austin, check your local registrar or county clerk. Chances are he can supply the record.

In either case do it soon. That fall bird can get mighty tight.
