EASTLAND COUNTY bond sales (E & H Savings Bonds) in the first half of this year rate second only to Taylor County in this district.

Per centage-wise, however, the county has achieved more of its goal—80.6 per cent—than any other in three districts containing 28 counties.

Altho' statistics were not available, this per centage is probably one of the highest in the state.

Rangerites are certainly doing a fine job in keeping these figures as high as they are.

CADDO ROAD construction is well underway, and the road is in for a lot of improvement. This is only part of the road and street improvements noticeable in the area.

Buying Power Of County Is Ranked High

How does Eastland County stack up with other West Texas counties as far as buying power is concerned?

This month's issue of "West Texas Today," official publication of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, shows the county is an important area in this respect.

Using figures from "Sales Management Magazine," the article shows that in 1957 Eastland County sales totaled \$23,253,000. That compares to sales of \$23,204,000 in 1956.

That means that Eastland County ranks 27th in total sales in the 132 counties surveyed. And the competition was rough. Some of the counties making above Eastland were Tarrant, El Paso, Lubbock.

County Bond Sales Total \$54,040 in June

Eastland county's total E & H Bond sales for the first half of 1958 have reached a total of \$408,632, representing 80.6 per cent of the year's goal.

This is a higher percentage than three other Texas districts, with 28 counties.

June sales in the county totaled \$54,040 in savings bonds, second only to Taylor County, with \$93,000.

Sales in Texas for the first six months of 1958 were \$88,580,546 which was 3.4 percent greater than the same period in 1957.

Rating third in District 16 sales was Nolan County, with sales totaling \$50,718.

The Fort Worth area sales in June rank second to the Houston area, but rank highest in the state, percentage wise. Area sales total \$2,318,741 — representing 53.8 percent of the year's goal. Houston area sales total \$2,620,835, or 49.6 percent of the goal.

June sales in Texas totaled \$12,764,026. The state has now achieved 50.6 percent of its 1958 goal of \$175,000,000.

P.T. Smith Farm Once Landmark

One of the oldest farms in the county, the P. T. (Paul Truman) Smith farm is the probable scene of several legends of the past.

David Mahaffey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Mahaffey, is the winner of two free passes to the Majestic Theatre in Eastland for identifying Tuesday's Mystery Farm as the P. T. Smith farm, about one and one-half miles southeast of Ranger.

David was one of the last 12 persons to identify the farm this week. When he called, he had the impression that the first person was—but now he knows that all names are drawn to determine the winner.

Located southwest of Ranger the farm once stood as a landmark in the county, known as the Old Human Place. People from all around would come to the spring and carry away barrels of water. Pioneers and early settlers would pass by and some would stop awhile to visit.

Giants Appear League Favorites

Giants & Indians Race for L L Title

Giants gained a stronger hold on the Little League championship Thursday night by downing second-place Indians, by a wallop—14-3.

Dodgers over-ran the Yankees 8-1 in the first game. As a result of the games, the Dodgers and Indians are tied for second place standings in the league.

Next Monday night will determine a great deal in the close race. The Giants will play the Dodgers and the Indians take on the Yankees at that time. Should the Giants lose and the Indians win, the deciding game in the league will occur on Thursday, July 31. But should the Giants win and the Indians win (or lose), the League championship will go to the Giants.

The Indians must win the rest of their scheduled games, with the

Eastland County voters apparently stuck to the incumbents in Saturday's Democratic primary election, unofficial and almost complete results show.

County Judge John Hart won re-election in a close race with Clyde Garrett, District Clerk Roy L. Lane defeated Richard C. Cox by a big majority, and County Clerk Johnson Smith swamped his opponent, Arlon E. Smith.

The county also picked the winners in the state-wide election. Carrying the county were Gov. Price Daniel, Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and Senator Ralph Yarborough.

In the county judge's race, which drew the most attention, Judge Hart won by a margin of 2767 votes to 2522 for Garrett. That includes all but one complete precinct, Eastland Court-house, and includes 561 of the 657 votes cast in that precinct.

Lane polled 3737 votes to 1483 for Cox in the district clerk's contest to win easily, and Johnson Smith got 3651 votes to 1573 for Arlon E. Smith.

In the governor's race, Daniel got 2691 votes in Eastland County and at midnight Saturday he had 461,815 votes statewide. The votes apparently clinched him a second term. W. Lee O'Daniel ran second in the county with 1621 votes and also placed in that position in the state with 142,970 votes.

Henry Gonzalez had 308 votes in the county and 124,543 statewide. Joe A. Irwin got 120 votes in Eastland County and ran a poor fourth in the state race.

Yarborough was an easy winner in both the county and the state. He polled 2701 votes to 2014 for William A. Blakley in the county and had 421,149 votes to 309,137 statewide, when Blakley conceded at 11:30 p.m.

Ben Ramsey got 3273 votes in the county in the lieutenant governor's contest to 1392 for Nokes. Statewide Ramsey was far ahead at midnight, leading 444,455 to 240,450.

Ranger went to the polls Saturday and cast 765 votes in two voting precincts—At Young School Elementary and the City Hall.

A total of 442 votes helped Price Daniel to win the Governor's Post. W. L. O'Daniel polled 200 votes. Rangerites picked Ben Ramsey over George Nokes for Lieutenant Governor by 506 votes to 229.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough was favored over William Blakley by a 536-223 count. Paul Brashear was Ranger's choice for State Representative, winning 404 votes to 242 for Omar Burkett. C. H. Dawson received 97 votes.

Clyde L. Garrett won 159 more votes in the two precincts, than did John S. Hart, incumbent. Garrett received 459 votes to Hart's 300.

Roy L. Lane led in the District Clerk's race, with 494 votes to 287 votes for his opponent, Richard C. Cox. In the County Clerk's race, Ranger favored Johnson Smith with 549 votes, casting 183 for Arlon E. Smith.

A new Justice of the Peace was voted into county precinct No. 2, when Mrs. Ruby Springer defeated Charles Bobo, incumbent, by 402 votes to 336.

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Commissioners Races

Tabulations, if they stand up, show there will be two run-off elections for county commissioners. In Precinct 4 (Cisco), where six men sought the post, Clifford R. Phippen and Carl Lamb apparently gained the run off. Phippen got 283, Lamb had 246, Don Rupe got 283, Carl D. Gurr had 289, J. J. Honcia polled 152 and Clarence B. Dill had 290.

In Precinct 2 (Gorman) B. M. Bennett failed to get a majority by just two votes. He received 543 votes and his two combined opponents had 545. That will mean he will face A. M. Thurman, who ran second with 328 votes, in a run off. Buck Foster was third in the race with 217 votes.

Bill Alcorn got a big vote in his bid for Commissioner of the General Land Office. He polled 3888 votes to only 547 for L. J. Dimmitt, in Eastland County. Statewide he lead 398,381 to 167,198 at midnight.

John C. White was pulling gradually far ahead of his two opponents over the state in the commissioner of agriculture race. He had 324,929 votes to 116,202 for Glenn Kothmann and 162,915 for Tom Griffin, statewide. In Eastland Co. he received 3188 votes to 727 for Griffin and 569 for Kothmann.

Robert W. Hamilton got a big majority in Eastland County in his bid for associate justice of the Supreme Court, Place 1. He received 2942 votes to 542 for Wilmer Hunt and 866 for J. Edwin Smith. Statewide he had 291,591 votes, Hunt had 146,523 and J. Edwin Smith had 151,725.

In a nip and tuck battle, Joe Greenhill failed to carry Eastland County in the race for associate justice of the Supreme Court, Place 4, but led over the state at 12 p.m. He got just 2163 votes to 2306 for Sarah T. Hughes in the county, but over the state his lead was 324,950 to 304,009.
