IT'S TIME to get ready to go back to school. Fall is in the air and cooler weather is already here. Downtown stores are doing a good business in back-to-school wear and school supplies.

### 71 Students Out For Band School

"Turn out for the Band Marching School has really been tremendous," said Director Dan Whitaker Wednesday.

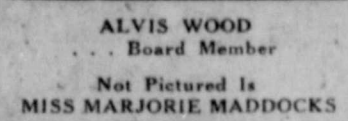

### Improved Facilities Await College Pupils For New School Year

Beginning with the registration of students at Ranger College, Sept. 15-16, the thirty-third annual session of the college will get underway.

For one-third of a century now, the college has provided educational opportunities for the young people of Central and West Texas.

Dr. Price Ashton begins his sixth year as president of this fast-growing institution of higher learning. This school year will get underway with greatly improved facilities. Attractive and modern dormitories for men and women boarding students, a modern cafeteria, and paved streets will contribute much toward making life on the campus more enjoyable.

Improved standards and a faculty intent on demanding constant improvements in the quality of work have done much to make an enviable reputation for the local college.

B. W. Musgraves, executive director of council for Public Junior Colleges, predicts a 10 to 15 percent enrollment increase for the thirty-one state-aid junior colleges this fall. Last year's enrollment showed a slight decline over the previous year, but the dip is considered only a temporary one. Many part-time students exhausted their war veteran benefits last year, but the number of full-time students increased.

Musgraves credits the expected increase to the high birth rate during World War II plus a rising interest in college education.

Thirty-one public junior colleges receive aid from the state of \$230 each, for the first 350 students and \$175 for each additional enrollment. In typical districts this represents about one third of the total cost. Local taxes pay for another third and tuition pays for the remaining third.

### Lack of Housing Is Posing Crisis

(Editor's Note: Usually I do not editorialize in these pages, but some circumstances—not yet fully felt in Ranger—make it necessary to do so at this time. Consider the following, then, as an editorial of the utmost importance.)

Most of Ranger is unaware of the approaching crisis.

To an extent—it is already making itself felt, but the first few weeks of September will see some rapid changes and hectic days. Just talk with "Rip" Galloway, manager of the Chamber of Commerce and the problem—in a nut shell—is this: lack of housing.

At the present time there are little or no furnished houses available for construction workers moving into Ranger next week. Already the chamber is faced with pleas for houses and apartments.

Soon—very soon—construction work in the county will start on a 16-inch gas line. According to reports, this job is expected to bring in hundreds of workers to the county.

Where are they going to stay? From present indications—most of these families will live in Eastland where more housing accommodations seem to be available. And—if this is the case—Ranger will lose a tremendous pay roll.

Merchants are out after trade, and they especially want to attract out-of-town trade. Are you and they going to sit by and watch Eastland nab this pay (Continued On Page Four)

## 100 Bond Fees Make Protest In Breckenridge

BRECKENRIDGE — Fevers in the bond issue fight are mounting, with the \$425,000 question to go before the voters of Stephens county Saturday.

Battle moves, so far, have included two protest meetings against the school board, a n c large newspaper advertisement booming for both sides.

The second protest meeting held Monday night in City Hall auditorium, drew about 100 people amid an atmosphere of calmness and deliberation—but determination.

The school board wants to build an 18-room grade school, consolidating both North Ward a n c South Ward pupils on the South campus. Counting the east side school, that would leave two city grade schools.

Opposition springs from the proposed elimination of the North Ward school, from the estimate 10 per cent tax increase necessary to pay off the bonds. Feeling on both sides is countywide, for the tax would be hiked at t h e county level, and county pupils at tend the city schools.

Recent newspaper broadside have been inserted in the Breckenridge American by oil operator C K West, onetime school board president, and by the school board West took a stand against building the new school at the present time and was commended at the Monday meeting.

Explaining its side, the board said finding a location was a big problem — that no central spot could be found without having to buy up a lot of homes to tear down.

The North Ward group, on the side of the "Progressive Citizen for Democracy in Education," committee, maintains that t h e school board could build two school cheaper than the one big school. The group estimates that two 9-room buildings would each cost about \$115,000, at the north and south locations.

Disagreeing, the school board avers two separate buildings would cost at least \$650,000—to take care of the same number of pupils as the one proposed building.

Heated opposition comes from north-side property owners who argue that the present plans favor a part of town where property values are already high, and discriminate against a part of town where values are already low.

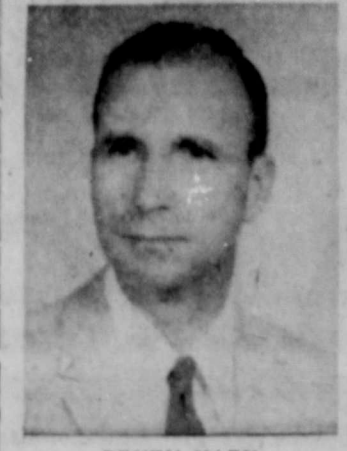
C. J. O'Connor, committee chairman, and another former board member, pointed out that locating the consolidated school in t h e south district will increase greatly the property values there—decreasing values on the other side.

He and others insist the town needs three schools.

L. H. Welch, attorney, briefly argued that the proposed building would be a mistake. He urged everyone to vote. He said the new school would benefit only the few.

O'Connor said, "We are not being told the full truth." Referring to West's ad, he quoted a report that the school board had to default on bonds back in 1945, later refinancing \$206,000.

"If we couldn't pay then, we can't pay now," he said. "Since 1945," he asked, "has our county
