

Bulldogs Test Hornets in Opener Friday

Workouts Trim Rangers; Scrimmage Set Saturday

Hard workouts at Ranger College, which got underway this week, may prove a little rough for some of the boys trying out for college football for the first time, but by the time the first game rolls around — the squad should be trimmed into good shape.

Workouts this week will climax in a scrimmage with the freshmen Cowboys from Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene Saturday at 2:30 p.m.

According to reports, some of the boys were already leaving Tuesday afternoon, and minor injuries were incurred by others. David Slaughter, new head coach, said that it was usual for former high school boys to come and go during their first workouts because many of them were undecided about their choice of schools.

Jim Clark, returning letterman from Newcastle, fractured his jaw in Tuesday workouts. He had seven stitches administered above his eye. Clark is a starter expected to play left end this fall. Clark was taken to a Fort Worth specialist Wednesday.

Rangers are still romping into action three times a day, concentrating on skill sessions, drills and scrimmages in the afternoon. In the morning, they participate in group drills.

Drayton Headen is the student trainer and equipment manager for the group. David Neal Purdue, a sophomore, is also a manager. This year's team of Rangers will be built around the returning lettermen, who show plenty of promise. There's Willie Wyman, a stand-out tackle from Austin and Dick Maxwell, quarterback, also from Austin. Lots of football will be expected from these boys.

On the line will be Clark; Doug Rouark, guard from Quanah; and Jerry "Red" Cantrell, end from Ranger. Playing center will be Jerald Cross from Guthrie and Keith Hodo from Quanah.

In the backfield—it appears it'll be George Boynton, half-back from Quanah; Marvin "Buttons" Crawford, halfback from Guthrie; Kenny Wells, Sudan halfback;

and Maxwell. These are probable positions, as all boys are trying out for spots this week and next—preparing for the first big game with Paris Junior College, there, on Sept. 13.

Quanah and Guthrie are supplying the Rangers with a good portion of their outstanding players.

A Mason man, arrested Sunday night, was charged with being drunk in a car. He paid a fine of \$30 in Justice of the Peace Court No. 1 and was released.

Holidays Keep Constable Busy

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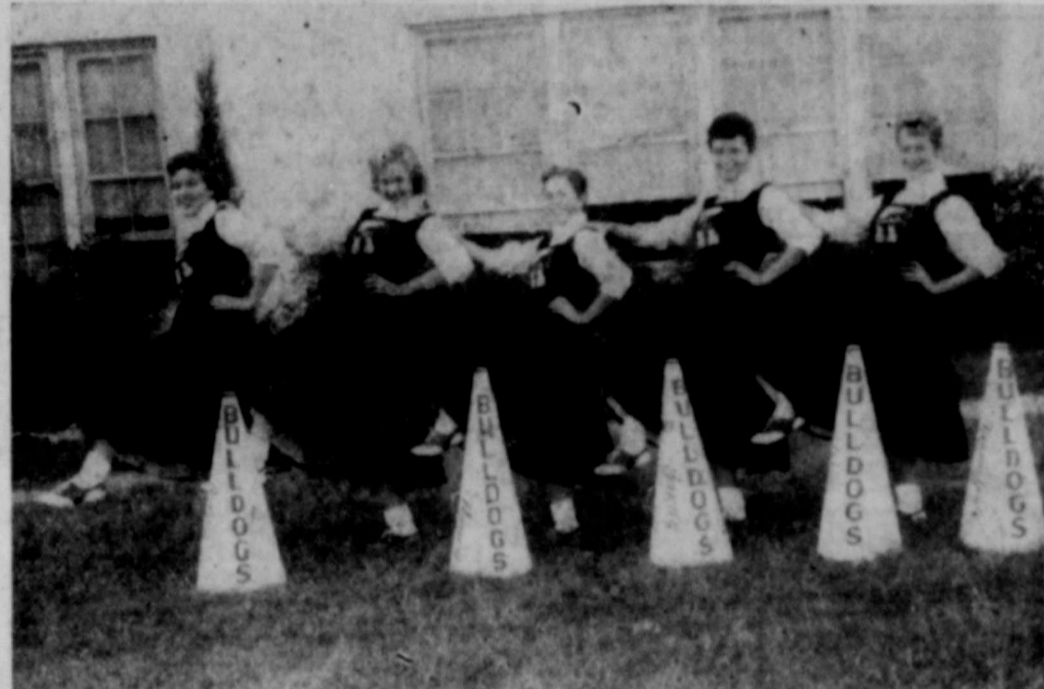

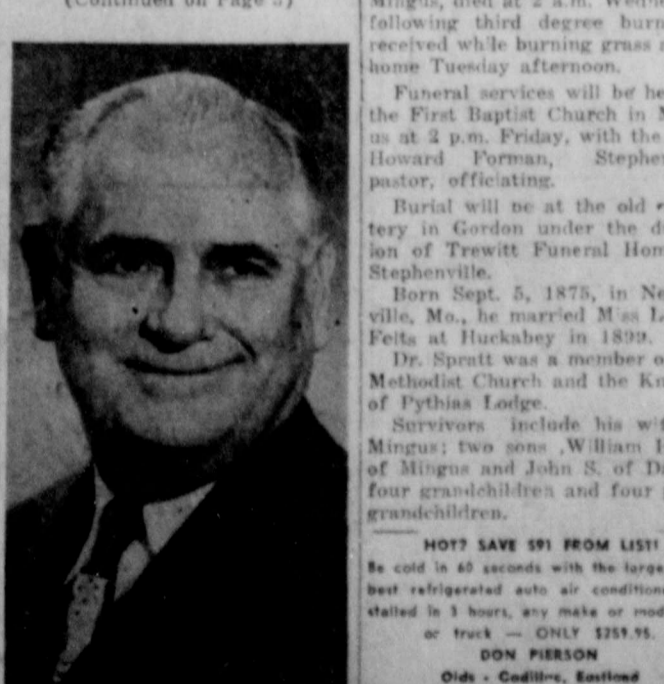
Ranger Band Day Planned Oct. 11

Ranger Bulldogs will romp into real live football action for the first time this season Friday night in Gatesville, meeting the Hornets in a non-conference game.

Harold Barrett, head coach, said "Get behind the Bulldogs." This is a "real crucial game and it's always best to win that first one," Barrett added.

Barrett emphasized the need of support from the town people. "If the boys make up their minds to win it. They got to keep their mind on the game."

When the Bulldogs hit the field Friday night, they will run up against a tougher bunch of boys than they probably expect. They will be meeting a new coach and a team that is used to losing in the past. But the Hornets can come up with a fatal sting and the Bulldogs have got to realize this.

From past indications, the Bulldogs have plenty of spirit, team cooperation and power. What they appear to be lacking is seriously realizing that they are about to play a football game of some importance.

Alternates are named in every case except for the position of left halfback, because the actual starters will not be known until the last minute—Barrett said. All boys trying out for each position are evenly matched.

Bulldogs will use the "Straight T" formation. Rangerites planning on attending the game can drive to Gorman, cut off on Highway 6 to DeLeon, take Highway 16 to Comanche, then stay on State Highway 36 through Hamilton to Gatesville—a distance of about 120 miles.

WELL I SEE—that Virgil Moore finally broke down and called citizens of Eastland Eastlanders. This I have been tempted to do but just couldn't force myself.

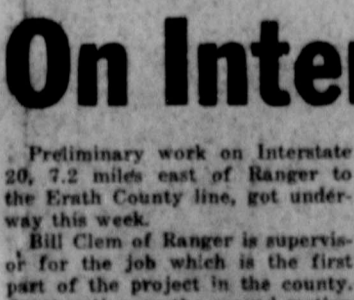

Car Crashes Into Tank And Ends Theft Spree

A '56 Chevrolet wandered off Highway 80 east, crashed through two fences by Don Kincaid's Turkey Farm and landed up in a cattle tank Sunday afternoon, ending a car-theft spree of three teenagers from Midland.

Don Butler, assistant chief of police, said that the driver of the stolen car was apparently asleep at the time of the accident. Upon investigation it was discovered that the three youths were driving a stolen car taken from a used car lot in Midland.

Earlier the group had taken several cars, driven around and left them within one-half mile of where they were taken, according to admitted confessions. They admitted taking two '51 Fords and one '50 Hudson.

Walter Murray Dies Tuesday; Services Today

Walter Murray, 70, former general manager of a chain of newspapers including the Ranger Daily Times and Eastland Telegram, died of a heart attack at his home in Dallas at 5:40 p.m. Tuesday.

Funeral services were to be held today at 4:30 p.m. at the Sparkman-Brand Funeral Chapel in Dallas. Burial was to be in the Hillcrest Mausoleum.

Murray had been confined for about two months with a heart condition, but Tuesday he was permitted to get out in the car. He returned home, and was resting on the patio when he complained of feeling "stuffy" and went inside the house. He died about 45 minutes later.

Dr. Spratt was a member of the Methodist Church and the Knights of Pythias Lodge.

Survivors include his wife of Mingo; two sons, William Harry of Mingo and John S. of Dallas, four grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

779 Pupils Enrolled At Ranger's Schools

Official enrollment figures stood at 779 following late enrollments Tuesday at Ranger's public schools.

A total of 220 students are registered at Ranger High School and 114 in the junior high, according to Charlie Garrett, principal.

In a breakdown of these figures, the Seniors will have 41 members, Junior 58, Sophomores 65, and Freshmen 60. A total of 58 eighth graders enrolled and 56 seventh graders.

History of Ranger College Set In One Week

Enrollment figures at Hodges Oak Park were reported at 260 and Young School enrollment stood at 185.

Enrolled at the first grades was a total of 78 students. At Hodges, 81 first grades reported for school and 27 enrolled at Young.

The sixth grade at Hodges will be the second largest elementary class in Ranger, with a total of 48 students. They will be followed by the second grade, with 46 students. A total of 44 are enrolled in the third, 32 in the fourth and 39 in the fifth.

At Young School, the sixth grade constitutes the largest class, with a total of 36 students. Second grade enrollment totals 35, the third grade 27, fourth, 29, and fifth, 31.

Enrollment figures at all schools stood close to the totals at this time last year, however, an increase was expected with the transferring of construction workers.

First Stages Start On Interstate 20 Route

Preliminary work on Interstate 20, 7.2 miles east of Ranger to the Erath County line, got underway this week.

Bill Clem of Ranger is supervisor for the job which is the first part of the project in the county. Construction on the second section from the Callahan County line to Cisco, will begin shortly after the present job is completed, according to E. M. (Boss) Pritchard, assistant district engineer out of Brownwood.

A third stage project will bring the limited access highway from Cisco to one-mile east of Eastland, Pritchard said.

Dollar Day Set Monday

Studies have shown that one life per year for every 10 miles of super highway will be saved. That would mean four fewer deaths a year in Eastland County and 290 in the state. (Nine persons have died this year on the 8.5 mile section of Highway 80 which is now being constructed.) Traffic experts agree that all of the deaths possible would have been avoided on the new super highway.)

Pritchard also pointed out that the average motorist will save one cent a mile in car expenses traveling the new route. That will stem from the fact there will be no stop signs and no traffic signals.

One of the big expenses of the new highway will be signs, the highway engineers told Lons. Motorist, not having to worry about crossroads and oncoming traffic, will look ahead and not notice the side of the highway as much, surveys show. That means that new type signs, larger and overhead, will have to be used. Signs on one intersection on the Eastland County project, let last month will cost some \$8000, Pritchard explained.

Highway signs will also get a new modern look. Interstate 20 markers will be red, white and blue.





Charles Hathcock Has Farmed for 29 Years

(Editor's Note: Labor Day and school activities delayed the appearance of this story. The Charles Hathcock Farm was the Mystery Farm which appeared here Aug. 26. Winner of two passes to the Majestic Theatre for correctly identifying the farm is Mrs. Bill Squyres.)

Farming for 29 years has been the occupation of Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Hathcock, who own a 400-acre stock farm about four miles west of Ranger, near the Colony Cemetery.

On the farm, the Hathcocks grow about 160-acres of oats which is harvested and used as feed for about 30 head of white-face cattle.

It was purchased from B. L. Danley in 1929, and is still some times known as the Danley Farm. Recent changes have included the building of a shop, northeast of the house, for storage.

The Hathcocks have five children—J. C. "Pete" Hathcock who owns a farm nearby; Mrs. Tommy (Mary Ann) Guest of Ranger; Mrs. Joy Key, John T. and Buster C.—all of whom work for Con-Var in Fort Worth.

Filling the land in sand a d tight soil, the Hathcocks have farmed in the same area for 29 years, and hope to farm for many more.

Hathcock's hobbies include hunting and fishing—which he formerly pursued in his spare time.





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

In 1936 he purchased the Marsh-Fentress interest in the chain, and operated the papers for a number of years before selling all but the Mineral Wells Index, which he still published at the time of his death.

Helping to organize the Eastland National Bank of which he served as president for a number of years before selling his interest, he also had been president of the Cleburne National Bank since 1949.

Prior to moving to Mineral Wells, Murray had made his home in Ranger for a number of years. After moving to Dallas in 1950, he returned weekly to Mineral Wells to actively supervise the publication of the Daily Index.

He married the former Ella Mae Callaway at Dallas in 1940. 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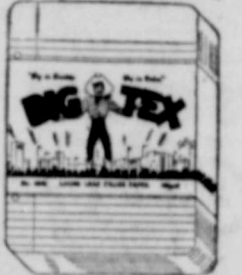
