Petitions Ask For Repeal of Parking Meters

About 265 Signatures Affixed by Petitioners

Petitions asking for the repeal of Ranger's City Ordinance legalizing the use of parking meters have gained more than sufficient number of signatures from Ranger residents to call a local election on the issue.

About 265 signatures have been affixed to the petitions, being circulated by a group of Ranger people, according to a

report received from G. H. Townzen. Necessary to call the election would be one-fourth of the total number of qualified voters cast at the last regular city election (held in April of '57). About 577 people voted in the April election, which means about 144 signatures, who are qualified voters, would be sufficient to call an election.

Members of the City Commission are expected to call the election upon receipt of the petitions. A notice of at least 20 days must be given before a local election can be called, with a maximum of 40 days.

ROAMING THRU RANGER WITH RON...

BUSINESS is here—it's up to the merchants to go out and get it! That seems to be the consensus of opinion expressed at Thursday night's meeting which "kicked off" the annual Fall Campaign.

Know that downtown stores are doing the biggest business they have had for some time since the back-to-school rush. And they can expect more as more and more families arrive in Ranger.

Just don't know when times have looked so good.

The petition reads:

"To the Honorable City Commissioners of the City of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas:

"We, the undersigned qualified voters residing within the corporate limits of the City of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, and constituting at least 25 percent of the number of qualified voters cast at the last regular municipal election held in the City of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, hereby petition the City Commission to submit to the voters of said City, the question whether the City Ordinance provided for parking meters should be repealed. Said ordinance being attached hereto and made a part hereof."

Attached is a copy of City Ordinance No. V-10-235 which authorizes the use of city meters.

City Manager Les Crossley reported Friday that the City Commission would probably call the election upon receipt and examination of the petitions. A check of the petitions will probably be made to see if they are in proper order and contain signatures of qualified voters.

Crossley said that at the present rate parking meters bring in a revenue of about \$8,700 a year for the city. This amount varies according to the amount of parking done. Crossley added that this amount would probably increase as high as \$10,000 a year at the present rate of increase.

Receipts from meters in August totaled \$783.61. In July the receipts totaled \$629.18. June totaled \$567.63. Total receipts, within the last three months, are \$1,880.42.

Without the use of meters, property evaluation on city taxes would have to be increased about 12 percent to make up for the loss of revenue if meters were repealed.

This figure is based upon a \$6,702 loss of revenue to the city in a year—if parking meters were repealed.

Tax evaluations of \$270,000 would be necessary to make up for this deficit. Total evaluations in 1957 were \$2,097,279 in Ranger. Taxes, based upon 10 percent of this figure, show that an increase of about 12 percent would be necessary.

THIRTEENTH TRAFFIC FATALITY OF YEAR

Ranger Boy Dies In Crash Near Eastland

A 13-year-old Ranger boy was crushed to death Thursday afternoon when the pick-up truck driven by his mother overturned 2.2 miles north of Eastland on a dirt road.

The accident claimed the life of Royce K. Koerner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rubin C. Koerner of Route 2, Ranger (Eastland Hill). Mrs. Koerner was also injured in the one vehicle crash. She suffered "four or five" broken ribs, severe bruises and possible internal injuries. Eastland Memorial Hospital attendants described her condition today as "... as well as can be expected." Dr. H. J. Bulgerin, attending physician, said it would be several days before he could determine the full extent of internal injuries.

The accident occurred just 400 feet east of highway 6 on a country road. Mrs. Koerner was driving west in a 1958 Chevrolet. Tire tracks at the scene of the mishap showed that she hit her brakes, skidded to the left, and then smashed into a dirt embankment on the right side of the road. The pick-up then overturned.

Royce was thrown out of the vehicle and landed on the boy. An iron support post (headache bar) mounted just back of the cab crushed the boy's head.

The dirt road was straight and level where the accident took place. As Mrs. Koerner was being loaded into a Hamner Funeral Home ambulance she mentioned something about hitting a rock. Highway Patrolman Al White and Justice of the Peace C. E. Owen said they were unable to find a rock she could have possibly hit, however.

A partially full gasoline drum was in the back of the pickup and some observers reasoned it possibly could have caused the driver to lose control by rolling suddenly to one side.

The accident occurred shortly before 5 p.m. First persons on the scene said Mrs. Koerner was frantically trying to free her boy. Rescuers jacked the truck up to get the boy free.

The traffic death was the 13th of the year in Eastland County and the second in four days. Records kept since 1951 by this newspaper show that 1958 is now tied with 1955 for the grimmest record of most deaths. Only four traffic deaths were recorded in 1957. Seven died in 1956, 13 in 1955, three in 1954, six in 1953, 12 in 1952 and nine in 1951.

Funeral services for Royce were held at 4 p.m. Friday in the Killingsworth Funeral Home chapel in Ranger. Rev. K. C. Edmonds, pastor of the Ranger East Side Baptist Church officiated with burial in Gorman Cemetery.

Royce was born Nov. 15, 1944. He is survived by his parents; one sister, Mrs. L. A. Howell of Ranger; and his grandmother, Mrs. T. J. Sawyer of Ranger.

Pallbearers were Garland Davis and Tommy Sawyer of Robert Lee; Victor Hill, Billy Joe Koerner and Ray Hill—all of Brady; and a d. Frank Boggs of Ranger.

Coaches Weep Before Lions

Ranger's Lions Club heard four local coaches describe the football outlook for the Bulldogs this season at their regular meeting Thursday noon.

Speaking briefly were Harold Barrett, head coach; O. C. Warder, assistant; Frank Bevers, junior high school coach; and Boone Yarbrough, who is scout and head basketball coach.

Barrett immediately set the theme by saying, "I'm not going to cry a bit today. We're past the crying stage. We're about dead."

He said the other coaches were "what makes us tick if we ever do tick," and then he introduced Bevers.

Bevers, who is serving his first year here, said he needed the cooperation of the school system, the business men and the students in his junior high school program. He added that a difference could be seen in a few years, resulting from their training.

Yarbrough outlined the strength of the team, by saying the Sophomores are "... about as big and strong as anyone else." He urged the Lions to keep their eye on the line, instead of the ball, to really see a lot of football. This will be the first time in 26 years Yarbrough will not be on the football field.

Warder, introduced as the coach who could get the maximum out of every boy, said, "We do have some possibilities. It's possible we might win one game, and it's possible we might not even win it."

The line-up contains some inexperienced Sophomores, Warder said, who have a long way to go and a lot to learn. But a lot depends upon them, he added.

Barrett concluded by saying that Ranger was picked fifth in the district at the state coaching school, "exactly where we should be." Then he added that Cisco and Coleman were picked first.

He explained that the new ruling on extra points by saying that a try for the extra points will commence on the three-yard line. A successful run or pass across the line will count two points, and a kick will count one point.

Going into their first game of the year, the Ranger Bulldogs looked impressive downing the Gatesville Hornets 26-12 Friday night in Gatesville.

A good crowd of Rangerites were on hand to cheer the Bulldogs to two touchdowns in the first quarter, one in the second and another tally in the fourth.

Particularly outstanding was a Ranger's backfield, stand-outs were Charles Wolford, right end, Lee King, quarterback, Jerry Anderson, halfback, and Jake Basham, fullback. Basham earned three of the Bulldog's touchdowns and Anderson the other. A run for the extra two points, in the second tally, saw Anderson carrying the ball.

Gatesville looked weak and unimpressive against the powerful Bulldogs. They passed all over the field, completing only a few of the many passes tossed off by Wendell Byron, quarterback. Several Bulldog drive attempts downfield were unsuccessful, particularly in the third quarter, as the locals failed to gain the extra "push and power" necessary to score.

First Quarter

Basham scored the first touchdown of the game, coming over from the Gatesville 15-yard line. A running attempt failed to get the conversion.

Three plays later the Hornets' quarterback who seemed to be all over the field throughout the game—Byron—stormed back with a reverse from the Ranger 30 to tie the score.

In fast and furious action, Basham tallied again on a 65-yard run just three plays after the kickoff. Anderson ran for the extra two points (according to a new ruling, effective this season) and the score stood at 14-6.

Second Quarter

The ball changed hands six times before the Bulldogs could make their threats to over-run the Hornets. But they finally upset the Hornets' nest with a beautiful reverse play and a 20-yard run by Anderson to take the lead 20-6.

Byron tried to retaliate by throwing three incomplete passes. In one attempt, he was swarmed by a host of Bulldogs and in the other two he failed to find a receiver.

Third Quarter

The game settled down to a "peaceful" battle in the third quarter as the Bulldogs kept possession of the ball for all five

Ranger merchants launched the annual Fall Campaign in a general meeting of the group Thursday night in the Chamber of Commerce, making plans for four promotions.

Definitely set by the merchants was a Nov. 29 arrival of Santa Claus in a helicopter (if arrangements can be made for the vehicle) and a free give-away of turkeys.

Also planned was a canvass of local merchants by members of the Trade Extension Committee to determine whether or not they would be willing to participate in a "Treasure Hunt" promotion. Another project will be planned by a trade promotion committee to be made up of Charles Milliken, D. C. Arterburn and Ray Lilley.

Candy for the kids will be distributed in the Santa Claus parade, planned on Saturday as are all other events.

Effective this Saturday, all parking meters in Ranger will be covered with a sack to encourage more trade, it was announced. The "sacking" of parking meters was approved prior to the meeting by the City Commission.

The "Treasure Hunt"—if it is approved—and the other promotion (to be named) will precede the turkey give-away, set before Thanksgiving.

5,575 Deaths Have Occurred In Texas In '57

(Editor's Note: The following story was received from the Texas Safety Association, Inc. We localized the first paragraph to bring the message home. This is a suggested editorial.)

What if a disaster wiped out every man, woman and child in Texas, a half dozen small Texas cities? Places such as Brady, Cisco, Quanah, Eastland, Alvin or Ranger.

Indeed, the entire state would be profoundly shocked.

Yet a total of 5,575 accidental deaths occurred during 1957, in Texas, according to the Texas Safety Association. Seventy-five more than the population of any of the above named cities of 5500 people.

Further, Texas accidents for the same period injured 6,93,045 persons. A number that is comparable to the present total estimated populations of Dallas and Galveston on combined, with 4,045 to spare.

Each year the accident-disaster strikes Texas. And each year we suffer an economic loss in excess of \$440-million, or about \$49 for each child and adult in the entire state.

What can be done about these tragic losses? Of course numerous efficient and dedicated organizations, both state and public, have been working on the problem for years. They have done an outstanding job of holding the line—even in making gains in the many fields of accident prevention. But the real answer can't rest with OTHERS.

If there is any panacea for our accident problems, it is the one given to us 2,000 years ago—the Golden Rule. The application of this simple guide for our behavior may appear futile, but it is the answer. Individuals cause the accidents and only individuals can stop them.
