Dairy Feed Subsidies on whole milk and Butterfat will be made on Jan, Feb, and March production after April 1, 1945 until May 31, 1945. Proof of sale received in County office later than above date will not be accepted, unless applicant was unable to send or bring his tickets to the office during this time due to causes beyond his control. If tickets are accepted later than the above dates, the State Committee will have to approve the application before payment will be made.

All C. C. C. loans will mature on April 30, 1945. All loans that are not redeemed by that date will automatically become the property of C. C. C. but will remain the producers responsibility to deliver the same grade and quantity of grain to the delivery point at the request of C. C. C. but not later than June 30, 1945.

JACK N. GEORGE WRITES OF EXPERIENCES

Following is an excerpt from a letter received recently by Mr. and Mrs. C. W. George, from their son, Jack N. George, 3/2 R. D. M., who is with a destroyer crew in the Pacific:

Dear folks: The censorship rules have been lowered and I can tell you where I have been up to thirty days ago. I have been to about every port in the Aleutians. I like Dutch Harbor the best, it is more like the U. S. only not so hot, it snows a lot there and if it is not a blizzard or willwa it is something unusual. We have made several raids and bombardment runs on the Jap Islands in the Kuriles, Matsua and Paramushiro, and have been as close as any fleet to Japan proper. The rough seas are worse than anything. On a Masua raid the waves were 70 feet high, had to lash myself in my sack to stay there. I have some clippings I will send later.

SGT. INMAN REPORTED BACK IN STATES

Mrs. Ralph Simmons received word on March fourth that her brother, 1st Sgt. Paul W. Inman, of the 90th Division under General Patton's Third Army, was back in the States. He was one of the 56 combat veteran heroes of many battles, who will tour war factories in the Western states as personal emissaries of General Eisenhower's command. Sgt. Inman was wounded in Normandy and sent back to England for about a month, then he rejoined his company where he has been in combat until recently.

Rail Official Represents Area For Industry

Discussions are being held in Chicago this week in furtherance of the Burlington Lines' survey of industrial possibilities in Texas along the lines of Fort Worth and Denver City Railway and the Wichita Valley Railway.

Y. E. Juge, general freight agent for the Burlington's Texas Lines, Fort Worth, who is in charge of industrial matters in Texas, is attending the Chicago meetings. On his return, he will make a complete survey of the industrial sites and possibilities in all cities and towns situated along the route of Fort Worth and Denver City, and Wichita Valley Railways, whose operations extend, in effect, from the port cities of Galveston, Houston and Texas City northwesterly across Texas embracing most of the South Plains and Panhandle area. Extensive studies are to be made of the trend toward the decentralization of industry and the prospect of locating branches of many large industrial concerns throughout Burlington Lines' territory.

"It is remarkable," Juge said, "how much interest is being displayed in our territory, and how many inquiries are being received from forward looking Texans who expect to take advantage of this movement."

Anticipating much industrial development in Texas post war, Juge expects to contact chambers of commerce and other local business leaders throughout Burlington Lines' traffic territory in Texas within the next few months.

Denis Huseman of Nazareth, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Huseman, exhibited the Grand Champion litter of all breeds when his litter of 8 Poland Chinas was selected as the best in the show. To top all this fine record the group of 25 hogs from Castro County won first which showed that Castro County had the outstanding hogs in the show. This record made by the boys is outstanding stated County Agent M. U. May who supervised the feeding of these hogs, in view of the fact that a Castro county Club boy did not own a registered hog four years ago, when county agent May came to Castro county.
