



William Lee Cain, 23, of Marshall died in the Ranger General Hospital about midnight Friday following injuries received in a traffic accident one and one-half miles west of Ranger.

Cain was driving a truck tract-or for Pauletts Delivery Service out of Shreveport, La. The truck was leased to U. S. Van Lines.

The accident occured at 6:30 T.m. on the Colony Creek bridge. The truck hit the bridge abutment
