Illegal Kills Keep W. Texas Wardens Busy

AUSTIN — Law enforcement duties in the West Texas area have Ranger College. picked up considerably since the first of September, according to the director of law enforcement of the Texas Game and Fish Commission. Within a week's time, 42 ases were 'made against hunters in the West Texas area, who killed curlew, plover, and quail out of season. The shooting of curlew and plover is a Federal offense as

well as a State offense. Although there seems to be a bountiful supply of doves through-out the State, shooting in some areas has been somewhat errutic. Weather changes started the bird weather changes started the bird movement and wardens of some counties report slow hunting. Wa-ter hole shooting has been slowed in many areas because of rains. On the other hand, a bountiful grain crop has provided so much food in other areas that doves are set inclined to leave
