





Dissolve yeast in warm water. Stir in biscuit mix, beat vigorously. Turn out soft dough onto surface well dusted with biscuit mix. Knead until smooth, about 20 times. Divide dough in half, Roll one half into oblong 11" x 9". Brush lightly with soft margarine or butter, Cut into seven equal strips about 1½" wide. Spread six strips with deviled ham and sprinkle with cheese. Stack strips one on top of the other with plain one on top. Cut into six equal pieces about 1½" long. Repeat with second half. Place cut side up in greased muffin cups. Cover. Let rise in warm place about 1 hour. Bake 15 to 20 minutes at 400" F.
