They say the wheels of progress keep turning all the time. But do all things keep up with the wheels of progress? Years ago when we had the narrow highway between Ranger and Cisco with the sharp curves and rough shoulders, the speed limit was 60 miles an hour. The four lane highway was built, and the speed limit remained 60 miles an hour. It looks like if 60 miles an hour is safe on a farm-to-market road, ten miles an hour on a four-lane road would be safe. Linda Drennan Wins Homemaking Contest

The 1960 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow in Ranger High School is senior Linda Margaret Drennan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Drennan.

She received the highest score in a 50-minute written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating senior girls. She will receive an award pin, manufactured by Jostens and representing the slogan, "Home is where the heart is." Her examination paper will be submitted for competition with other high school winners to name the state Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The test, which was prepared and judged by Science Research Associates of Chicago, was taken by a record number of 379,018 girls in 12,597 schools, an increase of 29,868 girls and 337 schools over last year.

Total enrollment in the six-year-old \$110,000 scholarship program sponsored by General Mills has neared the two million mark (1,800,152 girls). Alaska and Hawaii are participating for the first time this year.

Each state Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip April 22-29 with her school advisor. The tour will include New York City and Colonial Williamsburg and will culminate with the American Table Banquet in Washington, D. C., on April 28, at the Statler Hilton hotel where the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced. The runner-up in each state will receive a \$500 scholarship; the school of each state winner will be given a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

The scholarship of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be increased to \$5,000. The second, third and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will receive \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships, respectively.

FB Leaders to Attend State Meet Thursday

Several Eastland County Farm Bureau representatives will be in Waco Thursday attending the membership rally which is statewide. Some 400 county and community membership chairmen and county presidents are expected to attend the one-day rally kicking off the Texas Farm Bureau's 1960 membership campaign, according to information from the office secretary, Mrs. Lee M. White.

The following Farm Bureau leaders are expected to attend from Eastland County: Glenn Justice, president, and A. W. Wright, membership chairman. Other community chairmen are also invited to attend the day's sessions.

Concentrated efforts for membership enrollment will be during Feb. 14 - 20. This has been designated by Gov. Price Daniel as "Farm Bureau Week" in Texas. Some 125 counties are expected to hold county-wide drives to enlist members during this special week.

J. H. West, president of the state organization, will be the keynote speaker. He will address the assembly on "Membership Requirements of Modern Farm Bureau." Banquet speaker for the occasion is T. C. Peterson, director of program development for the American Farm Bureau Federation.

The Texas Farm Bureau is striving for 4,000 members over the 79,414 enrolled last year. County membership quotas will be set in order to help reach the \$3,000 for 1960.

Eastland County Farm Bureau has set a quota for 1960 of 828 members. The date for the membership will be announced later.

Newspaper Meet Will Be Held in Colorado City

Newspaper families from all over West Texas are expected to converge on Colorado City February 13-14 for the mid-winter meeting of the West Texas Press Association. The Baker Hotel will be headquarters for the event.

Dr. Norris G. Davis, professor in the School of Journalism of the University of Texas, will be speaker for the noon luncheon on Sunday.

The luncheon will climax a full morning of panel discussions or problems and interests common to the newspaper field. James Roberts of Andrews, second vice president and program chairman, announced.

Rates and what they include for aspiring candidates will be discussed by Joe Fourns of Pecos, Neil Vanzant of Sanguera, Ed Harris of Graham, and C. W. Roberts, Sr. of Andrews.

Another group, composed of Jimmy Gillentine of Hereford, Jim Corbush of Post, Curtis Sterling of Brownfield, and Paul Austin of Breckenridge, will talk about year-round circulation.

Virgil Moore is chairman of the Better Newspaper contest this year. Serving with him are Fred Miller of Dublin and Don Coppedge of Brownwood.

Amendment to Federal Food Law Approved

State health authorities are taking a long look at a vital amendment to the Federal food, drug and cosmetic law which becomes effective in its entirety less than a month from today—March 6.

The amendment puts on manufacturers and producers the burden of proving that chemical additives to foods and drinks are safe for human consumption. Formerly the government, through its Food and Drug Administration, had to prove additives were injurious to health before the courts would issue cease and desist orders.

The use of additives to alter the taste or appearance or preservative qualities of foods has assumed major proportions over the years. Controlling the practice is an extremely involved process. The story will have to be told in several installments. Let's begin with why a food and drug law is necessary in the first place.

Don't be misled into thinking the snowy white color of flour in your canister is natural. It may have been bleached with nitrogen peroxide, nitrous oxide or chlorine. Flour absorbs such chemicals like a sponge absorbs water and becomes almost instantly white.

Those luscious red tomatoes, those delectable-looking green peas and that juicy roast may have been chemically treated to give them that mouth-watering appearance.

Food processors know most shoppers buy on appearance, other things being equal. And, since there are additives available to enhance food flavor and color and texture, processors naturally use them to full advantage. There is nothing unwholesome or illegal in the practice when done in conformity with the laws governing pure food and drink.

There are four classes of substances used to color foods: mineral dyes, vegetable dyes, aniline or coal-tar dyes and ethylene for ripening and coloring. Those dyes specifically permitted by law are harmless but since they create artificial appearance it is well for the public to realize their use is in vogue now as never before.

Coal-tar dyes are inexpensive, and since they create brilliant pigments in foods they have largely replaced mineral and vegetable dyes. They are used extensively in sausage, confections, jellies and jams, meats and flavoring extracts.

Most of these products, while not adding to food quality, are defended on grounds that they make foods more appetizing. The danger arises when additives are used to obscure inferior products, or when additives themselves are potentially hazardous.

The Federal food and drug law amendment is wholesome in its implication of public health protection. After March 6, before the product is offered for sale, additives users will have to prove their safety. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, State Department of Health.)

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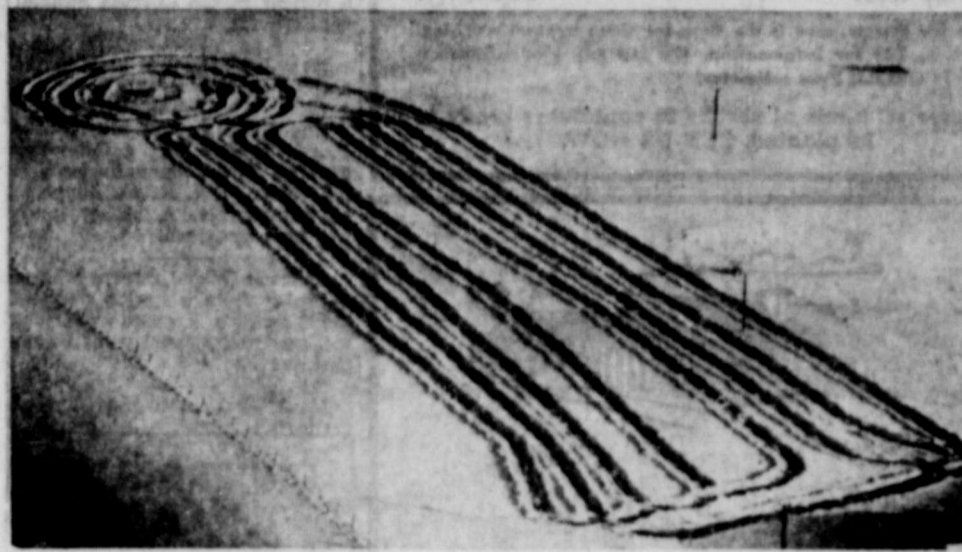

Ranger Host Coleman In Final Home Game

The Ranger Bulldogs will be trying hard to defeat the Ballinger Bears here Tuesday night in an effort to make a strong finish in District 7-AA basketball following an upset over the Eastland Mavericks in the Ranger Gym last Friday night.

This will be the last game the Bulldogs have scheduled on their home court. Friday night's action will wind up the 7-AA District race with Ranger going to Coleman for their final action.

The Ranger-Ballinger game here tonight will probably designate the cellar dweller in the district. Ranger and Ballinger each hold a 1-7 record in district play. Ballinger will probably be considered the favorite by holding a 52-44 win over Ranger in their last encounter. Ranger has showed much improvement since the last meeting.

James Henry is leading scorer for Ranger. He has scored 85 points in eight games, while committing 30 personal fouls. Dean Richey has scored 77 points in eight games, while committing 22 personal fouls. Charles White has scored 75 points and committed 20 personal fouls. Charlie De Los Santos has collected 30 points and has been charged with 19 personal fouls and Jerry Wilson has scored 20 points and received 21 personal fouls.

The eyes of basketball fans of the district will be following Winters and Cisco through their next two games. If they can both get through their encounters Tuesday night undefeated, the Friday night game between the two teams will be the deciding game for the district championship. Winters suffered their only loss to Coleman, while Cisco's only loss came at the

hands of Winters.

Cisco will meet Coleman Tuesday night and anything can happen in that game. Coleman has showed the power in several games this year that could down Cisco, if they have an off night. IT'S THE LAW in Texas
LAW PROVIDES ORDER

Some people find confusing our different state and national laws dealing with the same things. Income tax laws for an example. Surely, they say, you can have no real justice, unless there is some "one best way" to do each thing—to hold property, to manage traffic, to pay taxes, or to enforce contracts.

So it bothers them. Why should Englishmen drive on the left side of the street? Why should married couples hold title under community property laws in some states and not in others?

Is law merely a man-made contraption?

Is it true that like good manners, much law is man-made, growing out of custom or local problems? In card games you can play many different games with one deck. You merely change the rules. But as with cards and all games, the law goes deeper than convention into man's basic needs for order, for a grasp of the part he is to play, and for a way to settle disagreements.

Law provides an orderly way to do things so that people can make long-range plans and work together. Its rules help you to find out where you stand—your rights and duties. And last, law has binding ways of settling disputes if need be. First to keep the peace, and then win people over by dealing with them in ways that satisfy their sense of fairness.

You can find these traits of law in most groups from the most primitive to the civilized.

As man finds out more and more about himself and his world, as his experience and wisdom grow, the law may get better. For example, as the psychological laboratories find out more about man's reaction times, his fears and faults, our laws about driving, for instance, may improve.

And here is another purpose the difference of laws may serve. You may look upon such as a sort of experiment. Some turn out badly, and some well.

But in the give and take of public discussion, these efforts may yet bring us more nearly to the "one best way"—if any such thing exists.
