Student Loan Fund Established At Ranger College

Dr. Theodore Nicksick, president of Ranger College, announced today that the College has \$12,422 on deposit in the National Defense Student Loan Fund. The Federal Government gave the College a check for \$11,179 for this fund. The College, under federal regulations, had to put with this sum, one-ninth of that amount which was \$1,243, which makes a total of \$12,422 in the loan fund. The National Defense Student Loan Fund was set up by the government to aid students who were planning on entering the science or teaching field. Any full time student is eligible to make application for a loan. A student can make application for a loan of as much as \$1,000 dollars a year, and may borrow this amount for a period of five years if that is the number of years it takes to get the particular degree that he is working for.

A student who gets his degree by the time he gets his degree to pay back the loan plus interest, beginning with the first year following his schooling. There is a three per cent interest charge on the loan. The loans are made to students according to their needs, and are primarily for room, board and tuition.

Applications for loans to attend Ranger College may be made to Harold Little, head of the business department at Ranger College.

Tons of Area Soil Lost During Storm

We were reminded of "dust bowl" days last Tuesday, and that wind erosion remains a serious hazard for us to contend with. Many tons of soil were lost from peanut fields in our own area. We knew that damage was severe in West Texas by the dust cloud overhead without even reading our newspaper or listening to the broadcasts.

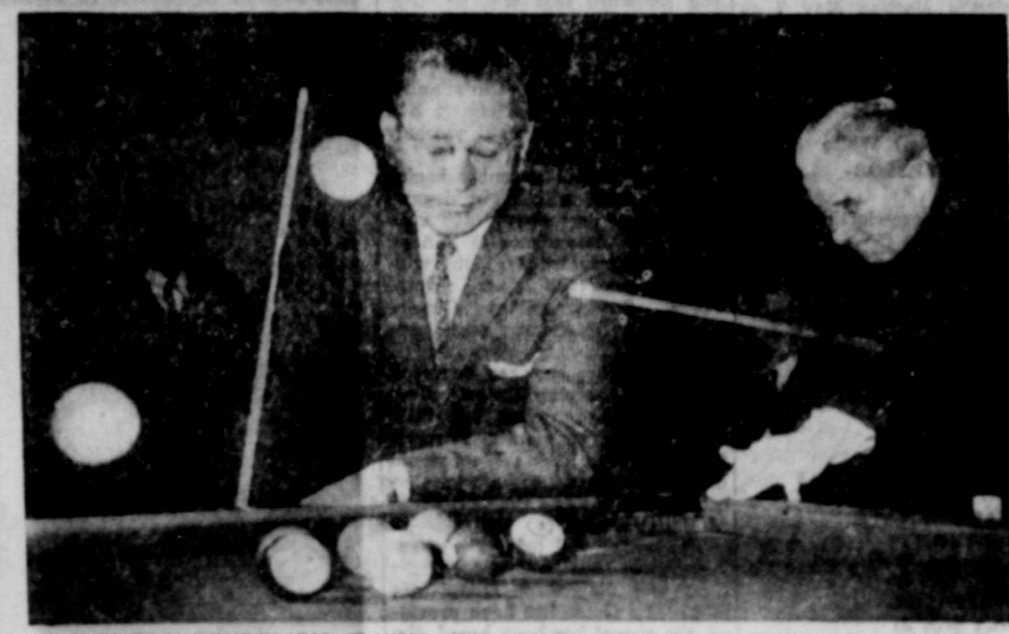
Our only weapon for combating this hazard in our vicinity is to shelter the soil from the wind. We can always expect high winds in early spring so it is essential we keep our fields covered in this period.

The three weapons used and proven successful for sheltering peanut fields are winter cover crops, strip crops, and leaving peanut hay or other crop residue on the surface of the soil. These three practices should be used together in peanut farming as each supports the other in effectiveness.

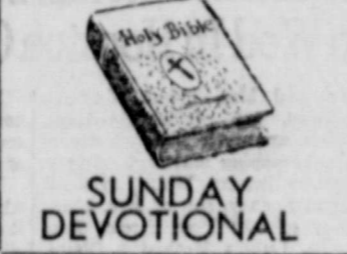
The effectiveness of these weapons was very obvious to anyone driving through the peanut county last Tuesday afternoon. Fields green with a vigorous rye cover crop were not blowing. Fields without rye but which conformed to...

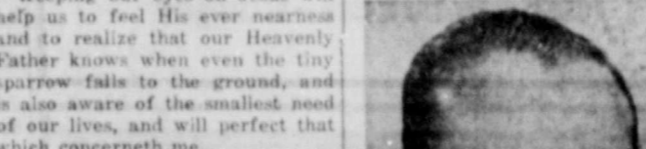

Lyndon B. Johnson backers from the eastern half of the 17th Congressional District met in Eastland Tuesday to map out plans to carry the District for Sen. Johnson during the coming Democratic convention.

Twenty-five supporters of Johnson for President met in the commissioners' courtroom to hear reports by Clifton C. Carter, a member of the Johnson-for-president state headquarters staff in Austin, Virgil Music, District 17 chairman of Abilene, and Mrs. Gu Velaz, District 17 women's leader of Abilene. French Robertson of Abilene, a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee also spoke to the group.

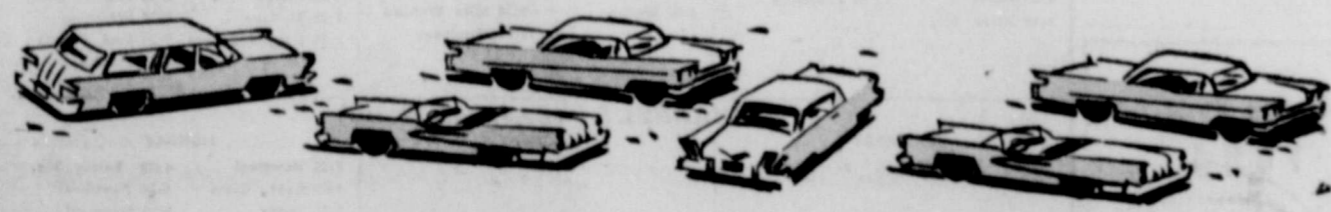
