D-Hour Is Set For 1:01 A. M. Locally

Tonight (Saturday) prior to 1:01 a.m., residents of Ranger will hear the familiar "number please" as they raise their telephone receivers.

The past few days James Townzen, Aaron Howton and Jack Gibson have been busy until late each night checking and rechecking all the last minute details that have gone into the installation of the new dial equipment at Southwestern Bell Telephone office building.

Tonight after a last minute check of the switchboard to see if any emergency calls are in progress, a signal will be given and Ranger will be on the dial system communication wise.

Quicker than it would take to tell about, the conversion will be made. One minute the operators will be watching the switchboard for lights to indicate incoming calls and the next minute the mechanical instruments will be clicking off the numbers as you dial your telephone. Many months of preparation has gone into what will be climaxed Sunday morning at 1:01 a.m.

To usher in the new dial system Mayor W. F. Creager will be on hand to make the first dial telephone call. It won't be limited to

a local call. He will be able to call anyone, anywhere in the United States.

Whittington Tells Lions

Planning Committee May Be Answer

Dr. Jim Whittington of Eastland talked to the Ranger Lions Club Thursday on "1960 the Year of Decision."

His talk was centered around the declining population of Eastland County, and what would happen if something is not done to increase the population of Eastland County.

Dr. Whittington illustrated his talk with a chart showing the rise and decline of the county population since the beginning of the census report in 1850. The chart showed that Eastland County hit the peak of its population increase in 1925 with 38,565 people in the county. Since that time the county population has steadily decreased until now the estimated population of 20,400 is equal to what it was in about 1905.

Dr. Whittington said that a unit the size of Eastland County and with the population of Eastland County, working together as a unit, could do something about its population decrease, but the same unit split into nine districts as Eastland County is, couldn't be as effective as the unit working together.

The idea of a county-wide planning committee has been submitted to Eastland County civic leaders. There has been some opposition to the idea from some of the towns in the county. A committee of representatives from Ranger, Edinburg and Olden has been organized. It is hoped that the committee will be able to study the county's problems and pooling of ideas from the committee will be studied for the purpose of county improvement.

Dr. Whittington passed out pamphlets that were a reprint of an article entitled "We Can Have Better Schools." It is a summary of the statement of a national policy "Paying for Better Schools" issued by the research and policy

Ranger FFA Boys Enter 27 Animals

The Ranger FFA Chapter will contribute their share of entries in the Eastland County Fat Stock Show to be held March 25 and 26.

Sixteen boys from the Ranger chapter will enter 27 animals in the six divisions of the show. In the breeding sheep division Jerry Cole will enter two Suffolk ewe lambs and Douglas Rogers will enter two Rambouillet ewes.

David Rogers will enter one Hereford heifer and David Pickrell will enter two Hereford bulls in the Breeding Beef Cattle division.

Jerry Wilson will enter one Jersey Cow in the Dairy Cattle division.

In the Breeding Swine division one Yorkshire gilt will be entered by Millard Herweck.

Two fat steers will be entered in the show, one by Melvin Anderson and one by Richard Guest.

In the Fat Lamb division Johnny Wells will enter two, two by Johnny Bob Kinn, two by Tommy Joyner, one by Dwight Squiers, one by Roy Gene Ainsworth, one by Wendell Ingram, two by Charlie De Los Santos and two by the FFA Chapter.

Jackie Grissom will enter one

fat barrow and Jerry Wilson will enter two.

The Ranger FFA boys will be competing for approximately \$1500 in cash prizes along with FFA chapters and 4-H Clubs all over Eastland County.

A sale will be held at the Eastland Auction Company Saturday night following the show. Buyers from all over Texas have been contacted and the auction should be fairly competitive.

In addition to the entries by the Ranger FFA chapter, the Ranger 4-H Clubs have entered 14 fat lambs and seven fat barrows.

Result of Texas 1959 Corn Crop

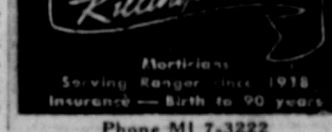
College Station, Texas 30, Harper 3 and Texas 28 produced average yields of about 70 bushels per acre to lead all hybrids in the 1959 Texas corn performance test conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

These hybrids showed a wide range of adaptation by ranking at or near the top in each of the individual tests.

The highest yielding white hybrid was Texas 17W. Among the yellow hybrids, Texas 34 and 30 were more resistant to insects and diseases and are therefore, recommended particularly for areas where insects and diseases cause serious damage to corn.

In the tests corn was planted at 20 locations under dryland and 2 locations under irrigation. Four of the dryland tests were lost because of unfavorable weather conditions.

Growers should consider the performance of the hybrids at the nearest test location, and also the (Continued on page two)

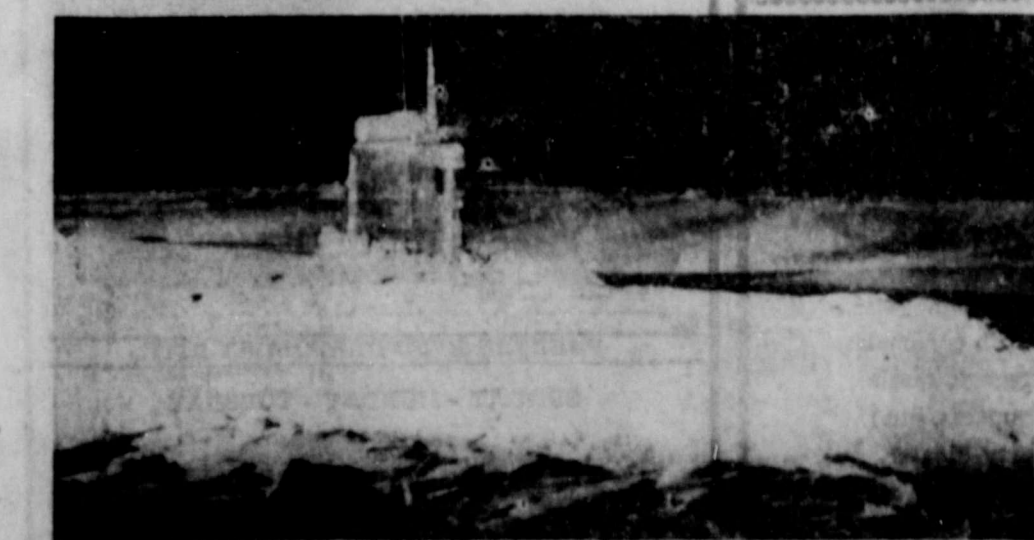

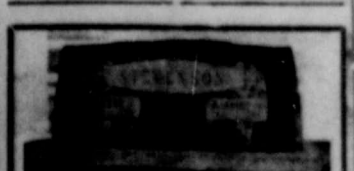

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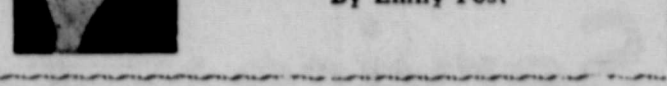
