Brotherhood To Have Covered Dish Supper

A. C. Wimpee will be the speaker Monday night at the close of the covered dish supper that begins at 7 p.m. for the entire church, and sponsored by the Brotherhood of the First Baptist Church.

The program includes music, movie films, slides, film strips and other school lessons. In the past two school terms Wimpee has spoken to over 850,000 students and teachers. He has been in every county in Texas, and every state in the Union, also 23 foreign countries.

Wimpee is a business man who went into the Army in 1943 as Instructor in the Medical Department in Visual Education. He was selected to tour the United States in the drive for Defense Bonds. He holds a citation from our government for his services as Bond Salesman; in the field of Athletics; as Instructor in Visual Education and Entertainment. Also he was No. One GI Bond salesman during World War II. He appeared in Madison Square Garden, Soldier's Field, Times Square, Hollywood Bowl and many other prominent places. Following World War II he became Public Relations Director for Baylor University where he served until he began this new work in Texas schools, Colleges and Universities, clubs, conventions and churches.

On January 10, 1951 while serving on the Baylor University staff he was invited by Billy Graham, personally to join the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association. He declined the offer as Baptist. He is now associate secretary of the Baptist Brotherhood of Texas, headquarters in the Baptist building in Dallas.

Wimpee has been acclaimed as an outstanding speaker, entertainer, and slight of hand artist. Several years ago he appeared in both our high school and college assemblies along with Glenn Cunningham, world famous athlete. He has spoken to the Cisco Association several times but this will be the first opportunity for the women and girls to hear and see this famous entertainer.

"Farm Bureau is a free, independent, non-governmental organization of farm and ranch families, united for the purpose of achieving collectively that which they cannot secure as individuals. It seeks solutions to agricultural problems on the basis of the issues involved — not partisan politics," he explained.

Farm Bureau is organized on the county, state and national levels. The 500 farm families presently enrolled in the Eastland County Farm Bureau are among the 79,414 families holding memberships in the Texas Farm Bureau. The Texas Farm Bureau, now fifth largest state Farm Bureau in the nation, is affiliated with the American Farm Bureau Federation, largest farm organization in the world with 1,602,117 members in 49 states and Puerto Rico.

Farm Bureau policies are made at the "grass roots" level with each member given an opportunity to participate in policy development. Policies are not made by taking a poll. Instead, they are adopted after discussions, debate and exchange of ideas at county, state and national conventions.

"Farmers and ranchers cannot afford to be disorganized. The Farm Bureau affords them a chance to promote and protect their interests through organization," the Farm Bureau president declared.

Employers to Get New Tax Forms This Year

Employers will receive a new type card-punch tax return, Form 941 (Social Security and Withholding Tax), and a separate paper schedule for listing employee wage information instead of the form printed on a single sheet of paper for the quarter ending March 31, 1960, according to A. E. Fogle, Jr., Administrative Officer of the Abilene, office.

Use of this punch-card tax return is part of the Internal Revenue Service mechanization program designed to provide better and more economical processing procedures. The Form 941 is substantially the same as the Form 941 previously used and employers should have no difficulty in preparing it, Fogle said.

This new type form will be mailed automatically to employers in preparing each quarter in the past. The first mailing is scheduled for the end of March. Included with the new form will be an announcement of the change and brief instructions for the use of the new form.

How American Cancer Society Dollars Are Spent In Texas

Ninety Cents of every dollar raised for cancer control in Texas is used in the state to support community programs for year-round education and service to cancer patients, as well as maintaining research projects at Texas research institutions, it was revealed today by A. D. Jenkins, president of the Eastland County unit.

"Actually," Jenkins stated, "the Texas Division of ACS retains 6% of every dollar and sends 4% to the national society for the national cancer research program and development of the total cancer control program."

"But," Jenkins explained, "Texas is in a very advantageous position with a wealth of research facilities. More than 30% of each dollar is returned in the form of research grants to M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute and Baylor University College of Medicine, Houston; University of Texas Medical Branch, Galveston and the University of Texas Southwestern Medical School, Dallas and other institutions.

In addition to the 3% for research, the balance of the Texas crusade dollar, Jenkins stated, is spent as follows: 16% for professional education, 7% for professional education, 13% for lay service, 5% for crusade and 4% to support its cancer control program.

Jenkins pointed out that 40% of each dollar raised in Texas is sent to the National Society with 25%



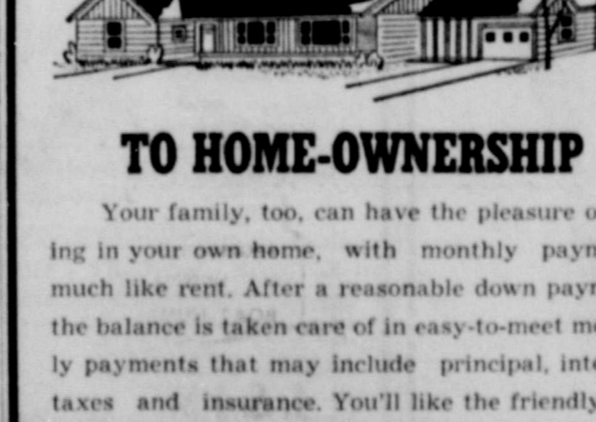

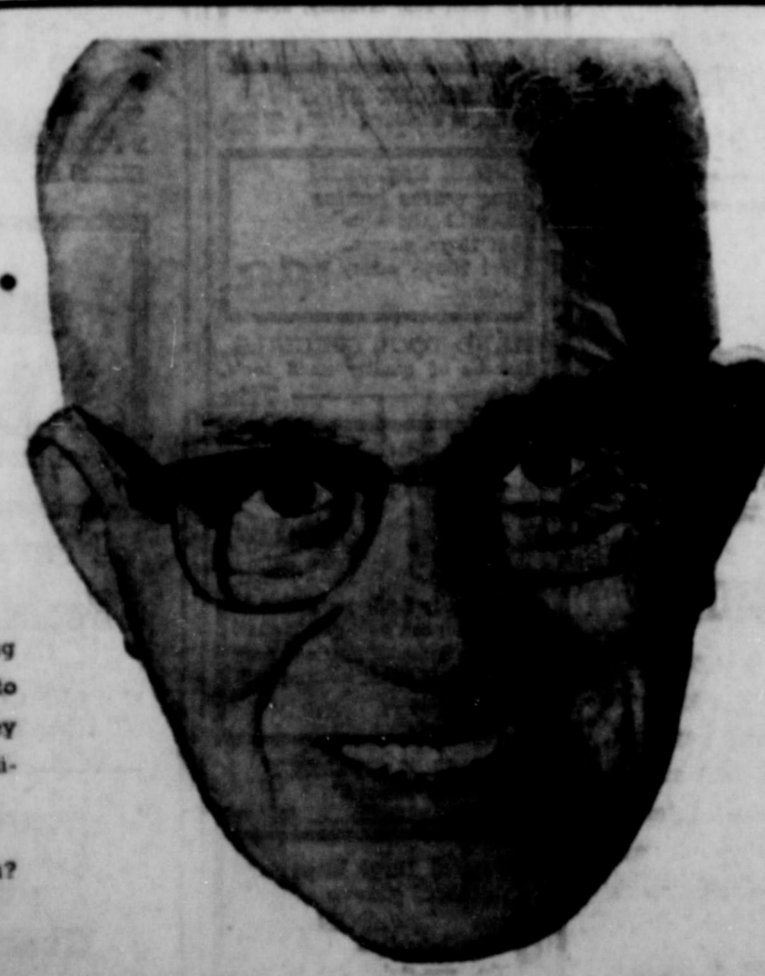
