Within this county of 23,000 a community of persons of all ages who are striving to lead happy, useful lives despite physical handicaps, Mrs. Les Strawn, chairman of the Easter Seal Drive, reminded Eastland Countians Thursday.

The 1960 Easter Seal appeal which opened March 17 is seeking \$500 to continue operations of the society in Eastland County. The campaign will continue through Easter Sunday, April 17, she stated.

"The Easter Seal appeal is a most worthy one. Funds raised provide many services to crippled children and adults in this area. We hope all citizens will share the responsibility for making the current drive a success."

"Some 500 sheets of 1960 Easter Seals that reached residents of Eastland County March 17 carried a "Please Help Us" plea from the crippled children they serve.

"The mailing, greatest in the campaign's history, was the first step in the month-long appeal conducted by the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority to continue and expand services for physically handicapped persons. The drive will continue through Easter Sunday, April 17.

"Conducted annually, the campaign provides an opportunity for each resident of the county to help make a difference in the lives of children and adults in our county. Simple and effective in its approach, it has proved its worth to hundreds.

"We hope that many more will receive the help they ask for from the Easter Seal campaign this year."
