... something its merit, necessar... must involve consideration of the source of money to pay for the program. I propose to do everything possible to assure our State's continued progress and prosperity without additional tax burdens, but I assure you I will not shirk my responsibility in seeking a solution to the financial aspects of our State.

"As an insurance man specializing in casualty insurance. I am well aware of the impact upon the insurance-buying public of the merit rating plan recently adopted by the Texas Insurance Commission. As a legislator, I want to assure you that this plan was not conceived nor enacted by

the Legislature of Texas. Article 5.01 of the Texas Insurance Code provides that the Board of Insurance Commissioners shall have the sole and exclusive power and authority, and it shall be its duty, to fix premium rates and to promulgate rating plans designed to encourage the prevention of accidents. If the plan conceived by the Board of Insurance Commissioners is unfair to the people of my district and to the people of Texas, I feel that the Legislature of Texas should devote maximum effort toward seeking a solution to the problem.

"As in the past, each vote that I am called upon to cast for the people of my district shall be made only after due consideration of the welfare of my constituents. I shall continue to measure legislation by sound business principles in order to effect a financially stable government for our people.

"My record of service as your representative for three terms appears in the journals of the Leg-

islature. I have always done my best to represent the people of the 76 District to the fullest extent of my ability and feel that the experience I have gained will enable me to continue working in the best interest of my district. Any constituent has a most cordial invitation to discuss any part of my legislative record with me at any time.

"I will be very grateful to each of you for your consideration in the May 7th election, and I sincerely appreciate the confidence placed in me by your votes in the past three elections."

Brashear pledged himself to continue efforts to maintain and strengthen the 91st District Court of Eastland County. He said he would oppose any efforts to move the Court of Civil Appeals from Eastland County.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

JURIES OLD AND NEW Speaking before juries—the beginning of jury trials—goes way back to Greek colonies about 600 B. C. in lawsuits over lands seized by tyrants.

Soon afterwards Athens itself took over such oratory, but seems never to have worked out rules of evidence or control of the trial by a judge.

Jurors often booed or cheered the parties, talked together, and shouted at speakers. What one man knew or thought he knew about the case he told his neighbors.

All evidence could go: Personal knowledge, hearsay, prejudice, and a juror's opinion.

The Athenian juror had power: Each "dicast" (a juror chosen by lot) was both juror and judge. Jurors sat in many courts; the smallest had 201 dicasts, the largest one such as tried Socrates had 501. (The odd man broke ties.) The jurors heard and decided their cases out in public, often amid swarms of citizens and foreigners.

One day to each case; and the accused—like Socrates—had to prove his innocence.

Each juror earned one obol a day—about three cents.

Each juror swore: "I shall vote according to the laws of the Athenian people and the Council of the Five Hundred; but as to things about which there are no laws, I shall judge as best I can without favor or enmity. I shall judge as to things at issue and shall listen fairly to both the accuser and the defendant. These things I swear by Zeus, by Apollo, by Demeter. May there be blessing on me if I keep my oath; but if not, let there be ruin for me and my family."

Today as yesterday our juries are under fire. Some say juries waste time, people won't serve; jurors make stupid mistakes. Let experts do justice, critics say. Such things hold true only if citizens forsake their right to serve.

Only a free people can enjoy the privilege of jury duty. A Greek thinker once said that the mark of a citizen, as opposed to an alien, was his right to share in administering justice.

When jury duty calls, think of yourself as seeking truth, hearing all the evidence, heeding the court's instructions, following the lawyers' arguments, and laying

LAW DAY PROCLAIMED For the third consecutive year, May Day has a special significance in this country. By proclamation of President Eisenhower, May 1st is again to be observed as Law Day U. S. A. This is a special day dedicated across our nation to observance of the fact that we have a government of law instead of men. It is particularly appropriate that Americans set aside this day each year to demonstrate to the world—and to ourselves—that our belief in individual freedom under law remains strong and unshakable.

Why is it that some men are able to live in freedom while others cringe under a rule of tyranny? We owe our rights and freedoms to our state and national constitutions, our laws, and our courts. In other lands, there are no rights and people are subjected to the edicts and whims of individuals unhampered by legal restraints.

Most of us tend to take it for granted that an individual is free to think for himself and that his rights are protected by law. We know without actually admitting it that our whole way of life is governed by this rule of law.

Law is the intangible force guaranteeing all of us freedom, peace and progress—ideals which have been, and are, dependent upon the adequacy of our legal system and the protection awarded the individual by our courts.

On May 1st, then, this year and every year, with the nation's attention focused on Law Day U. S. A., it behooves us to rededicate our belief and faith in this rule of law that is the birthright of all Americans.

It is this liberty and equality under law that distinguishes our system of government from communism. Without laws and the courts, these freedoms we take so for granted would be meaningless. Our respect for law is vital to

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continued growth and strengthening of our nation; our thoughtful observance of Law Day U. S. A. in a real sense distinguishes America from those who today live under tyranny; it is our answer to communism. Law Day U. S. A. is the American way.

New Boll Weevil Control Program Being Tested

New Method For College Station, A late season chemical and cultural control program at College Station in 1959 showed promise in reducing the overwintered population of boll weevils. This reduction appears to be great enough to delay the start of boll weevil control programs the following year to effect substantial savings in insecticide costs.

The program consists of chemical treatments just prior to and during the harvest period to prevent the weevil from going into diapause, the physiological condition in which they survive the winter. These insecticide treatments are followed by stalk destruction if harvest is completed before frost kills the cotton.

Results obtained to date indicate this practice may be an effective eradication measure, according to Dr. J. R. Brazzel, associate professor, Texas A & M Department of Entomology, who worked on the project. He said the chemical and cultural control program was used in an isolated 18-acre cotton field,

about four miles from a cotton field of five acres and more than 10 miles from large acreages of cotton. Insecticides used were methyl parathion, toxaphene, DDT and pentachlorophenol. They were applied over a two-month period, at five day intervals during the growing season and every seven-nine days during the late-season before defoliation.

This experiment will be continued in 1960 and if the final results are as favorable as the data obtained to date indicate, this chemical and cultural control program late in the season may offer a means for eradication or greatly reducing the boll weevil population.
