## Ranger College Presents Group in Musical Evening

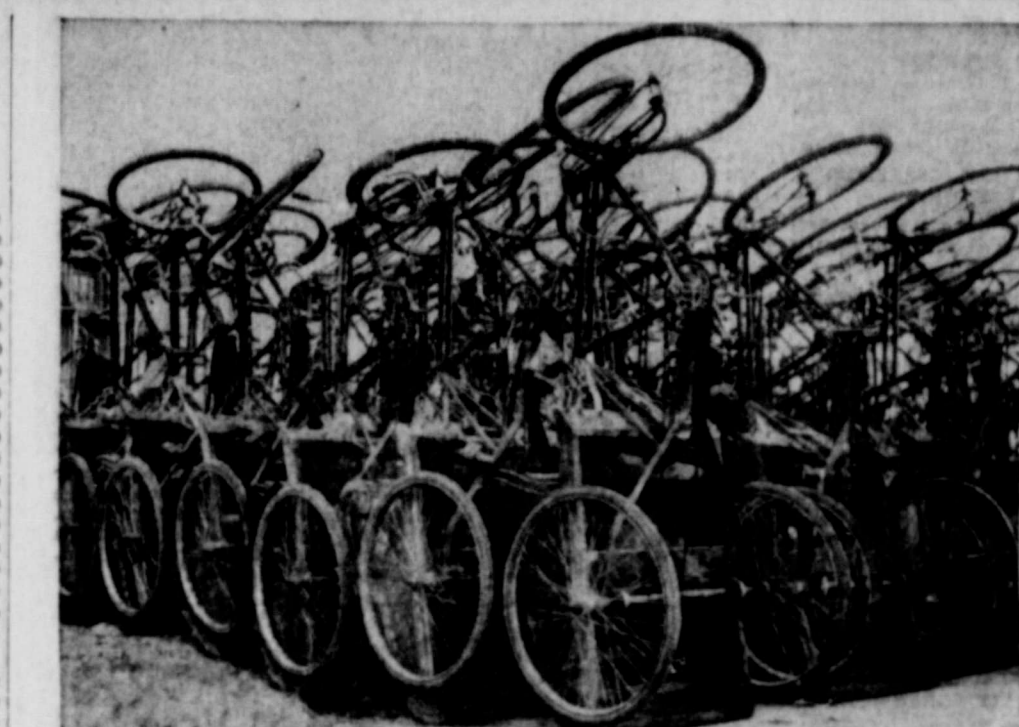
Ranger College presents an ensemble of musicians in a musical evening Thursday, April 28, at 8 p.m. in the college auditorium.

## Commemorative Stamp for Water Conservation

No other resource so directly affects the welfare, comfort and happiness of all the people as does water. In view of this great role water plays in our lives, the first water conservation stamp in history was released April 18 in Washington, D. C. The four-cent stamp is the latest in the series of conservation commemorative postage stamps.

This stamp should impress on every American the value of water conservation. We know there is only so much water on the earth, and this supply remains constant. The only way we can meet the vital and rising demands for water is by reducing needless waste and pollution, by protecting the watershed upon which our water falls as rain and snow, and by finding more efficient methods for its use, Pittard said.

## Brucellosis Meeting Is Slated for May 5

Dr. James B. Henderson, DVM, Texas Animal Health Commission Austin will discuss provisions of the new Brucellosis law at a livestock meeting at the Eastland Auction Co. Barn, Highway 80 east, May 5, according to an announcement today by County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper.

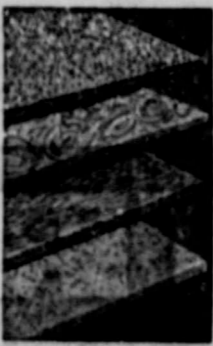

These are canned blackberries, canned freestone peaches and cranberry products.

Stocks of each are more than ample for ordinary trade needs according to figures of the Agricultural Marketing Service. Food shoppers can anticipate special sales on these items in Texas markets this month.

Large No. 10 cans of blackberries, ideal for restaurant and institutional use, are especially plentiful. Most of these are from East Texas canneries.

Stocks of frozen scallops from last season's record-large supply of this popular seafood are still plentiful.

### Misquites Rob Land of Moisture

Mesquite robs 55 million acres of Texas rangelands of precious moisture and plant nutrients each year. Often it is necessary to control mesquite in order that the ranch achieve and maintain the highest production.

The ranchman seeks the most economical control of mesquite consistent with highest livestock production, and at the same time conserving natural resources. A variety of chemical and mechanical methods or a combination of them can be used to solve individual problems.

Mechanical methods for mesquite control include hand grubbing, rolling choppers, root cutters, anchor chains, bulldozers, shredders, atgers and root plows.

These methods should be practiced during the season when existing turf can make the fastest recovery and obtain the highest degree of

### Tomato Diseases Can Be Controlled

Tomato diseases can be successfully controlled if recommended practices are followed carefully. "Tomato Diseases," a new extension leaflet, lists the location of tomatoes should be rotated each year, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Tomatoes should not be grown in the same field oftener than once every five years, and should not follow peppers, Irish potatoes or eggplant.

Avoid planting tomatoes in southern blight, nematode or bacterial wilt infested soil. You can test for presence of these pests by growing a few plants in a representative soil sample.
