TJCA Conference Re-Zones Schools

The Texas Junior College Athletic Conference underwent a reorganization and re-zoning program at the recent meeting of the Conference, held May 2 in San Antonio. Dr. Theodore Nicklaik, newly elected president of the Conference, announced today.

The re-zoning of the Conference became necessary due to the notice received at the meeting of several of the colleges in the western part of the state withdrawing from the Texas Junior College Conference to form a new conference in that area.

Schools that withdrew from the Conference were Amarillo, Frank Phillips of Borger, Clarendon Jr. College, Lubbock, Cleburne, Odessa, and Howard County. South Plains Junior College at Levelland expressed a desire to remain in the TJCA, but it is evident that they will also withdraw to join the other schools in that area.

The Texas Junior College Athletic Conference has been divided into two zones. Zone one will include Ranger College, Cisco Junior College, Weatherford Junior College, Decatur, San Antonio, Schreiner Military Institute, Lutheran Concordia at Austin, Temple Junior College and at the present time, South Plains of Levelland. Bill McClung, head coach at Weatherford was appointed zone chairman of zone one.

Zone two will be composed of Navarro Junior College at Corsicana, Panola Junior College, LeTourneau Junior College, Blinn Junior College at Brenham, South Texas at Houston, Allen Academy and Lee College at Baytown.

There is only four of the 16 schools in the conference that participate in football. These are Ranger, Cisco, Blinn and Navarro. This will form the football conference, although there is a possibility that the football conference might be expanded to include three more schools. Also, there is a possibility that San Angelo Junior College may withdraw from the

Conventions Favor Lyndon B. Johnson

Democratic Precinct Conventions held in Eastland County Saturday afternoon and night went off in quick order in most instances, with most of the precincts passing resolutions pledging the delegates to support Lyndon B. Johnson for President of the United States.

In Eastland Virgin E. Moore was elected permanent chairman and Mrs. Don Parker was named permanent secretary. The delegation, which will have 19 votes at the county convention, was bound by unit rule and passed a resolution pledging efforts to secure Johnson nomination and election as President.

In Ranger Calvin Brown was elected chairman and Helen Boen was elected secretary. Ranger also had 12 delegates vote. The Ranger delegation was also bound by the unit vote and Johnson resolution was unanimously adopted.

Cisco convention elected A. D. Addy as chairman and J. W. St-

inson as secretary. A resolution on

States rights and a resolution calling for Sen. Johnson to be a favorite son candidate for President was passed. Delegates were instructed to vote for Johnson at County convention.

Other democrats named Mrs. O. H. Dick as chairman and Gilbert Copeland as secretary. A Johnson for President resolution was passed and delegates were bound to a unit rule.

Gorman named Miss Buena VanWinkle as chairman and Herbert Craddock as secretary. No resolutions were passed and delegations were bound to a unit rule.





Dissolve gelatin in hot water; add orange juice and salt. Chill until mixture is nearly set. Beat cream cheese until soft; add lemon juice gradually, beating until smooth. Beat orange gelatin mixture until firm. Turn into a (6 1/2 cup) ring mold; chill until firm—4 to 6 hours. Unmold on platter. Cut grapes into halves; remove seeds. Cut pineapple into large wedges. Combine grapes, pineapple and bananas; mix lightly and spoon into center of ring. Garnish with small clusters of Tokay grapes. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
