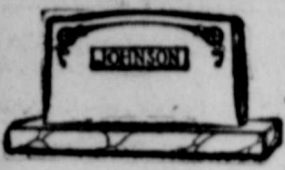

The citizens of Eastland County, along with other Texans, will soon feel the burden of the \$93,000,000 tax burden imposed by the State Legislature in the recent tax bill.

The tax load sets an all-time state high, with most of the revenue coming from private citizens through sales taxes.

Representative Paul Brashear of Cisco voted for the measure, as did State Senator Floyd Bradshaw.

The huge tax bill was finally brought about in the third special session of the State Legislature, and will get the most revenue from Tobacco sales, cigarettes, cigars, etc.

The Dutch Club Meets Thursday For Breakfast


The Dutch Club met Thursday, May 12, at 8 a.m. in King's Cafe for a breakfast and business meeting.
