The second command is to have a part in spreading the Gospel. Jesus said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations."
Let each of us be assured that we have these two marks to identify us with our Lord. May we humbly confess our sin, trusting Christ to forgive us, and may we join ourselves with a body of believers with whom we can cooperate to spread the Gospel of our Redeemer.

work together to build a pride in our community and to make that pride sincere, rather than false. Once we have done that, many more things may be accomplished. If everyone has the attitude that—Well, I'll take care of my own property, but this other property is the responsibility of John Doe, and he can see about that—then we are no better off than we are at the present time. The aim of our organization would be to promote cooperation among, and participation by all of our citizens.

Other topics covered in his talk were the requirements for joining the organization. The RCDM will require no dues. It is not to be made up exclusively of businessmen, although it is desired to have many as members. It should actually be a family organization. The only requirement will be that all will have to work and cooperate to help out each other.

The first and foremost project of the organization is to clean up the town. The appearance of the town shows the traveler what the town is and how the citizens feel about it.

The organization feels that if Ranger is going to grow and prosper, it needs to clean up its own house and get it in order, then it will be ready to do something about attracting new business and industry. This can be done through a city-wide clean-up campaign.

The organization wants every citizen of Ranger for a member. They want everyone to make suggestions to the organization. Suggestion boxes have been placed in the post office and utility company offices. Every suggestion received will be given consideration and will be filed for future action if the members of the organization see fit to consider them for action.

TOMATO SOUFFLE STAYS HIGH AND LIGHT

This light, fluffy Tomato Souffle makes a delicious Lenten luncheon. Quick-cooking tapioca helps keep it feathery light and high while milk and eggs make it a nutritious main course for the whole family. The perfect accompaniment to the souffle is avocado wedges filled with tuna fish salad.

Tomato Souffle

2 teaspoons grated onion
 2 cup thinly sliced celery
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 4 tablespoons Minuta
 Tapioca
 1 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 1 1/2 cups milk
 1/2 teaspoon thyme
 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
 1 1/2 cups thin tomato wedges, well drained
 4 egg whites
 4 egg yolks

Saute onion and celery in butter in saucepan for 5 minutes, or until tender but not browned. Combine tapioca, salt, pepper

and milk; add to celery mixture. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to a full boil. Remove from heat and add thyme, Worcestershire sauce, parsley, and tomato wedges. Allow to cool slightly while beating eggs.

Beat egg whites until stiff. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add tapioca mixture to egg yolks and mix well. Fold into egg whites.

Spoon into 2-quart baking dish. Place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until souffle is firm. Serve plain or with crisp bacon or cheese sauce. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
