Mrs. Robinson To Tour Europe

Mrs. Lillie Robinson, English teacher in Ranger High School, plans to leave for New York July 30 to join a group of teachers who will tour and study in Europe during July and August.

Mrs. Olive D. Schaefer, an English teacher from Cisco will accompany Mrs. Robinson on the tour.

They will fly from Dallas to New York by jet airplane and will leave from New York on July 1 and fly to Channon, Ireland by KLM Royal Dutch Airlines.

After visiting in Belfast and Dublin, they will enroll in a course (8 days) "The Teaching of English Today" at the University of Southampton.

They will visit schools in England, homes of many important writers, attend plays, and see many places of literary interest.

On July 24 they will enroll for a Seminar in London University (five days) where they will listen to outstanding literary figures talking on the art of writing, in which they have acquired fame.

The novel, the short story, poetry, the English stage and literary criticism will be discussed.

In Scotland they will visit York, Edinburgh and Glasgow. While touring the British Isles they will visit 17 cities of interest.

They will then fly to Paris and while on the continent they will visit Geneva, Munich, Vienna, Venice, Florence, Rome, Brussels and Amsterdam, and other cities, a total of 14 in all.

They will attend the Olympic Games and the opera in Rome and the "Passion Play" in Oberammergau.

Among some of the places they will visit will be the houses and tombs of some of Europe's most famous figures. Such names as

WACO—(Sp)—A touring delegation of Texas farmers and ranchers and their wives can expect a royal welcome when they visit Mexico July 14-24 on the Texas Farm Bureau goodwill tour to the romantic land south of the border.

The group will fly to Mexico City on July 14 and arrive back in the Lone Star State by air July 24. Mexican Minister of Agriculture Julian Rodriguez Adame has extended an official invitation for Farm Bureau members in Texas to visit Mexico on this combination goodwill, educational and pleasure trip.

RANGER (RNS)—Mrs. Julie E. Bray, postmaster at Noodle and at Funston during the early 1900s, died at 6:20 a. m. Friday at her home at 907 Oddie St. here. She was 94.

Born Sept. 25, 1865 in McMinn County, Tenn., Mrs. Bray moved here in 1918 from Roscoe, where she had lived for 19 years. She was postmaster at Funston from 1901 to 1905, and postmaster at Noodle in 1905 and 1906. Both towns are in Jones County.

Survivors include a son, R. Owen Bray of Abilene; two daughters, Mrs. H. G. Adams and Mrs. W. T. Smith, both of Ranger; three sisters, Mrs. Jennie Gordon of Cleburne, Mrs. Mary Johnson of Stamford and Mrs. Sallie Rowland of Anson; four grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

She was a member of the Baptist Church, placing her membership in the church 77 years ago. Funeral will be held Sunday at 4 p. m. in the First Baptist Church here. The Rev. Ralph E. Perkins, pastor, will officiate. Interment will be in Evergreen Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home.

The Cost of True Discipleship

1. Conditions of Discipleship: A. Self-denial and crossbearing. "Then said Jesus unto His disciples, if any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross and follow me." Mt. 16: 24.

B. Renunciation: "If any man come to me and hate not his father, and mother, wife, children, brethren, sisters, yea, and his own life also, he cannot be my disciple." Luke 14: 26.

C. Leaving All: "So likewise, whosoever he be of you that forsaketh not all that he hath, he cannot be my disciple. Lk. 14: 33.

D. Steadfastness: "Then said Jesus to those Jews which believed on Him, if ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed." Jn. 8: 31.

E. Fruitfulness: "Herein is my father glorified, that ye bear much fruit: so shall ye be my disciples." Jn. 15: 8.

2. The Twelve Apostles—Their Martyrdom. A. The inner circle: a. So called because they were accorded special privileges. Peter. Among many other saints, the blessed Apostle Peter was condemned to death, and crucified, as some do write, at Rome. Mege-sippus saith that Nero sought matter against Peter to put him to death: Which, when the people perceived, they entreated Peter with much ado that he would fly the city, Peter, through their importunity at length persuaded, prepared himself to void. But, coming to the gate, he saw the Lord Christ come to meet him, to whom he worshipped, said, "Lord, whither dost thou go?" To whom he answered and said, "I am come again to be crucified." By this, Peter, perceiving his suffering to be understood, returned into the city, Jerome saith that he was crucified, his head being down and his feet upward, himself so requiring, because he was unworthy to be crucified after the same form and manner as the Lord was. James.

The account given us by an eminent primitive writer, Clemons Alexandrinus, states that, at Rome was led to the place of Martyrdom, his accuser was brought to repent of his conduct by the Apostle's extraordinary courage and fell down at his feet to request his pardon and resolving that James should not receive.
