New Law Passed On Disabled Vet Compensation

An award of "service connection" which has been in force for 10 or more years in veteran disability and death cases will be protected under a new law signed by the President.

This was reported by Edward O'Connell, manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas, who explained that the new law becomes effective on Jan. 1, 1962.

The only exceptions under the law (Public Law 86-501, signed June 10), O'Connell said, would be cases in which there is a showing that the original grant of service connection by the Veterans Administration was based on fraud, or where it is clearly shown from military records that the veteran concerned did not have the required service, or lacked the proper character of discharge from service.

"Service connection" is established by the VA when it is found that a veteran's injury or disease occurred in or aggravated by service in line of duty during wartime or peacetime service. Establishment of service connection necessary before disabled veterans can become eligible for monthly disability compensation and also gives wartime preference for admission to hospitals, as well as eligibility for service in line of duty during wartime or peacetime service. Widows of deceased veterans will be protected under the same provisions of the new law in all cases where the widow's benefits are based on the service-connected disability of the veteran.

Young Mother Dies In Crash

Funeral services for Mrs. Margaret Hartman Doss who was killed in a one-car accident Tuesday between Eastland and Cisco on Highway 80 were held Thursday at 10 a.m. in the Rust-Hammer Funeral Chapel in Cisco.

The Rev. John G. Elser, pastor of Grace Lutheran Church, officiated and burial was in Evergreen Cemetery at Ranger.

Pallbearers were Harold Reich, W. W. Smith, K. Jackson, Bob Barker, C. O. Redwine and Jerry Westfall.

Mrs. Doss, 24, was the mother of three small children. Highway Patrolmen who investigated were not certain just what happened, but it is believed that she went to sleep at the wheel of the 1954 Ford she was driving.

The car veered sharply off of the divided highway, ran into a ditch and then smashed into a culvert.

Scene of the accident was six miles west of Eastland on Highway 80. The accident occurred at about 12:20 p.m.

A passenger in the car, Donna Ruth Hartman, 14, of Wichita Falls, is in fair condition in Eastland Memorial Hospital. Donna Ruth and Mrs. Doss were sisters.

Mrs. Doss and her sister were returning from Ranger where they had attended the funeral of their grandfather, E. O. Johnson, earlier Tuesday morning. They planned to stop in Cisco to visit Mrs. Doss' husband's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. Doss.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Jimmy, 4 and Gene, Matthew, five months; a daughter, Karen, 2; her mother, Mrs. Ted Eckert of Wichita Falls; two sisters, Donna Ruth Hartman and Dorothy Lois Hartman, both of Wichita Falls; and her grandmother, Mrs. E. O. Johnson of Ranger.

Mingus Youth Injured In Diving Accident

Ronnie Green, 15 year old Mingus youth, was seriously injured in a swimming accident in Palo Pinto at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday.

Green was swimming in the Palo Pinto creek, and dived into the water where his head hit a rock. He was rushed to the Ranger General Hospital, where emergency treatment was given.

He suffered a spinal cord injury, resulting in paralysis of the lower part of his body. He also suffered a serious laceration on his head.

Green has been transferred to a Fort Worth hospital.

Miniature Phone Developed By Bell Telephone

"The Princess," a new small, lightweight telephone, will be introduced in Ranger by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company on July 1, Archer Marx, Jr., telephone company manager, announced today.

The result of five years of research effort, the new phone is a compact, oval-shaped instrument that reduces by more than a third the space needed for current desk-top telephones.

"The new Princess phone is only 8 1/2 inches long, 3 1/2 inches wide and 3 1/2 inches high and weighs only 42 ounces," Marx pointed out.

Created for use in any room location in the home, the new space-saving telephone will be available in five different decorative colors—white, beige, pink, blue and turquoise.

A special feature of the new phone is a dial that lights when the receiver is lifted, or that glows with a soft night light at the flick of a switch.

The Princess phone is the first major home telephone change in a decade and is the 15th major home telephone change since Mr. Bell's original invention in 1876.

"Miniaturization—a big word that means making things smaller—is very much a part of our lives today," Marx explained. The trend toward the tiny has been cropping up all about us of late, in objects like radio and television sets, automobiles, and appliances of all types.

"Now, with the introduction of our new Princess telephones that 'miniaturize' our basic communication tool, millions of American households will have an effective reminder that in many ways our world is growing smaller," Marx added.

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T. C. Wylie Re-Elected President of S P S A

Eastland County Man Heads State Peanut Shellers

T. C. Wylie, vice president and general manager of the Ranger Peanut Company, was re-elected president of the Southwestern Peanut Shellers Association in Galveston last Friday at the conclusion of the 17th Annual Convention of the organization.

Wylie was elected president of the organization in 1959 at the Mineral Wells convention and will serve another term or until June 1961.

The convention site will be moved to San Antonio in 1961. Approximately 225 persons attended the week long convention at the Galveston Hotel.

Wylie has been with the Ranger Peanut Company, holding his present title, since 1944 when the company was granted a charter. The plant was built during the war years in 1942-43 when material of all kinds was scarce and a priority was needed to secure practically every item. Much of the installation of Ranger Peanut Company has been replaced since that time by up to date machinery.

The company buys in excess of 5,000 tons of peanuts each fall, then shells and sells to users throughout the United States. In past years many shipments of peanuts have been made outside the United States. The company employs over 30 employees during the shelling season.

The Ranger Peanut Company seed has become well known in the peanut producing area of the United States.

Granidge Corp. Official Dies In Breckenridge

William Earl (Buster) Walker, 49, vice-president in charge of gas production of Granidge Corp., died Wednesday after becoming ill in Eastland while here on business at the Eastland Granidge plant.

Mr. Walker became ill and asked two friends to drive him to his home in Breckenridge. When it became apparent that he was seriously ill a doctor was summoned and he was rushed to Stephens Memorial Hospital where he was dead on arrival.

A member of the First Methodist Church in Breckenridge, Mr. Walker was born Aug. 17, 1910 in Bangs. He had been a resident of Breckenridge since 1930 and was an active Mason.

Services were held Thursday morning in the First Methodist Church in Breckenridge with Rev. Leroy Brown officiating. Burial was in Breckenridge Cemetery with Masonic graveside services.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Robert; a daughter, Sherry Ann; and five sisters.

A memorial college fund has been established for his two children and contributions will be sent to Breckenridge public schools or Satterwhite Funeral Home in Breckenridge.

Grade A Milk Can Now Be Reconstituted

Recent State Board of Health action is expected to be a strong factor in assuring Texas of adequate Grade A milk supplies, despite seasons of short milk production.

The board last week adopted specifications which will permit the reconstitution of Grade A dry milk solids into Grade A fluid milk. The specifications are contained in a supplement to the standard milk ordinance and code which some 150 Texas cities—including all major population centers—have adopted.

When the new specifications are assembled in printed form they will become formal regulations and will have the full weight of the Texas milk grading and labeling law behind them.

In effect, the Board of Health action says to the milk processing industry: "Now you can dehydrate your surplus Grade A fluid milk as prescribed by these new regulations and store it. Then, in those seasons when milk production is low, you can add fluids to those dried solids and offer it for sale as Grade A fluid milk, provided each container is clearly labeled as being reconstituted."

Excepted from the "reconstituted" label is cultured buttermilk which by definition consists of soured skim or reconstituted milk, and fortified milk which must be labeled with the percentage of

solids added to the original fluid product.

Prior to adoption of the specifications, milk processors had to dispose of surplus by turning it into by-products. The practice was unavoidable wasteful, particularly when viewed during last seasons when whole fresh milk production dropped off for one reason or another and supplies had to be shipped in from out-of-state.

Refinements and standardization of the milk drying process now makes dehydration and storage without refrigeration practical.

Three major dry milk processing plants now operate in Texas—at Ruak, La Grange, and Muenster.

Only Grade A milk can be sold in communities which have adopted the standard milk ordinance and code. The new specifications will permit importation of Grade A dry milk products into these communities after city councils pass them as ordinances.

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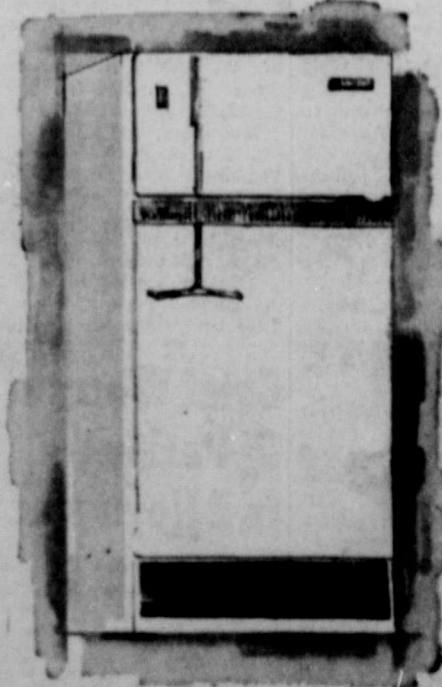

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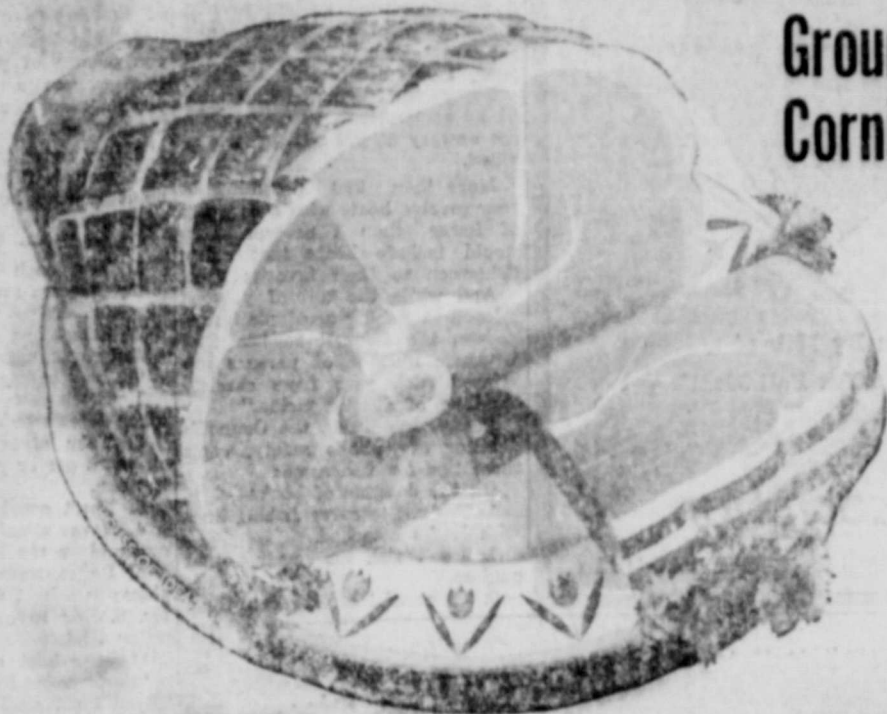

Fishing Is Fun But Can Also Be Dangerous

"Gone Fishin'." Bing Crosby made the song popular years ago. A nation with lots of leisure time on its hands has made the sport of fishing — one of today's more popular summer pastimes.

The National Safety Council estimates that more than 30 million Americans — about 1 out of every 5 persons strong enough to hold a fishing pole or cast a line into the water — will go fishing this year. Fishermen should think of safety so their fun won't be spoiled by an accident. Unfortunately, the unwary do get hurt or, worse, killed.

More than 900 drownings a year involve boats with a capacity of fewer than 1 persons. This would include boats that carry fishermen to their favorite spot. And while the toll of persons injured in fishing accidents is unknown, the Council reports that a "large number of persons are injured each year from careless handling of fishing tackle."

Pam Ralph Kuhl, the Council's director of public safety, came these tips for fishermen: On the dangers of hooks—

1. Try not to carry fishing lines with hooks attached.
2. Don't fish too near other anglers.
3. Be careful casting your line.

Talking about playing a sure thing, in a window are two signs, "Blank Cemetery Association" and "Income Tax Service." Evidently, here is a believer in the old saying, "Only two things are certain—death and taxes."

In Boston, a sign reads, "The Friendly Butchers."

4. Handle with special care bait-casting plugs that contain clusters of double or triple hooks.

5. If a hook gets imbedded in you or one of your fishing companions, see a physician, unless you're sure the wound is extremely minor.

6. Try never to back a hook out of a wound. It's best to push the point of the hook through the skin.

On wading—

1. Test each step in advance. Many streams and pools have underwater shelves or other dropoffs.

2. Remember that flat, underwater rocks usually are slippery.

On boat safety—

1. Check your boat for leaks or other defects before leaving shore.

2. Take along life preservers, an extra oar or paddle and a bailing can.

3. Don't overload the boat.

4. Never stand in a boat or sit or stand on the bow or stern.

5. Be cautious about changing places in a boat while in deep water. Better to come into shallow water first.

If your boat capsizes?

"Stick with it," Kuhl said. "Even most small boats will support several persons for hours. Keep calm. Wait for help to arrive rather than try to swim to shore."

If you have a copy of "Tall Talk from Texas," you may, eventually, own a "collector's item." After 16 years, the book is out-of-print. What with loss through fire, flood and friends who borrow, but never return books, "Tall Talk" should ultimately be in short supply. This probably will take some time as close to 100,000 copies were published.

Few Precautions Make a Vacation Carefree and Fun

The plans are made, the days marked off on the calendar, and the itinerary mapped—all for the big moment when that long-awaited vacation begins.

This summer, according to travel authorities, some 80 million Americans will embark on a myriad of trips to all parts of the universe and spend around 11.5 billion dollars getting away from it all.

Chances are three to one that you and your family will be among these touring Americans. If so, you will enjoy a more carefree vacation by taking a few precautions.

If you do any driving, remember that the National Safety Council recommends you drive no more than 350 miles a day. Arrange your trip schedule so that you arrive at your destination in daylight and stay only at approved hotels, motels, and pension.

When it comes to clothing, the main thing is to guard against a change in the weather. Wear sen-

sible shoes for sightseeing or walking on rough ground.

Stomach upsets are common to travelers. Usually, contaminated food or water is blamed. Often, eating indiscretion may be the real culprit and time schedules may upset regular eating habits. Eat lighter when traveling; save those gourmet expeditions until after you acclimate yourself to the area. Unless milk is boiled, it should be avoided in most countries. Exceptions are the Scandinavian countries, Great Britain, Holland, Belgium and Switzerland. Of course, ice cream, butter and fresh cheese are also taboo if the milk in the country is unsafe. As a safety rule, drink only refrigerated bottled water in these same areas.

For some of us exposure to the sun is an easy natural process and a frustrating problem for most of us. Regardless of your inherent ability "to take the sun", over-exposure may be dangerous. Also, don't be fooled by a cloudy day. Even though the sun is not visible, its ultra-violet rays filter through the clouds and cause a severe burn. Burning can be kept to a minimum either by gradually increasing exposure and by using a chemical which screens out most of the burning rays of the sun.

Of course, remedies should be intended only as preventives or as treatments for minor ills. The cardinal rule—if you get sick, call a doctor—holds true overseas as it does at home. Your travel agent or office, airline, hotel, American Consulate office or local medical society office can direct you to adequate medical attention almost anywhere. Make sure, however, if you are abroad, that the physician speaks and understands English.

If you wear glasses, take an extra pair along, or carry the prescription for your lenses with you as an extra precaution.

Do not let needless health worries spoil your trip. With proper precautions you can make your vacation a pleasant and memorable experience.
