Four Auto Accidents In Forty-Eight Hours

Police Chief (Bob) Patterson reported today that four traffic accidents had occurred in Ranger, since Sunday morning. This is the greatest number of accidents that has occurred in the same period of time in Ranger in several months. Patterson asked that Ranger citizens be more alert in their driving, to observe traffic rules and speed limits. He urged citizens to be especially alert at intersections where there is no traffic sign.

The four accidents included a collision of a 1955 Ford driven by Homer Montgomery and a 1957 Ford pickup driven by Woodrow Wilson Weeks of Dublin, at the intersection of Marston and Walnut Streets. This accident occurred at 7:30 a.m. Sunday.

Sunday afternoon, a 1954 Ford driven by Mrs. R. D. Lewis of Gorman and a bicycle ridden by Alvin Chestnut collided on Highway 80. Chestnut suffered minor bruises.

Monday at 11:20 a.m. a 1960 Chevrolet driven by David Allsup, and a 1961 Plymouth driven by Maxine Tabor collided on South Austin Street.

Monday at 9 p.m. Earl Walker reportedly went to sleep at the wheel of a 1952 Buick and crashed into a telephone pole.

Although there was no serious injuries in any of the accidents, damage to the vehicles amounted to several hundred dollars.

Patterson reported that all of the accidents possibly could have been avoided by alertness by the drivers.

James D. Alexander Named On FHA Eastland County Credit Committee

Appointment of James D. Alexander as a member of the Farmers Home Administration county committee was announced this week by H. P. Cole, the agency's county supervisor serving Eastland County.

Alexander owns and operates a farm and ranch four miles west of Rising Star. He has been an outstanding farmer in his community for the past 30 years. He has been active in promoting pecan and fruit orchards and the quality of livestock in his community.

Two other members make up the three-member committee which works with the county supervisor to see that the best possible use is made of the agency's farm credit service program consistent with local farmers' needs.

The other two members are Frank H. Park, Carbon, and Duward B. Warren, Gorman. Warren will serve as committee chairman during the next, or 1961, fiscal year.

Each member is appointed for a three-year term. Alexander succeeds Charles D. Ballew whose three-year term expired this year.

"The committee determines the eligibility of individual applicants for all types of loans. It also reviews borrowers' progress and aids the county supervisor in adapting the agency's loan policies to conditions faced by farmers in this area. Members are selected and appointed so that, so far as possible, different areas or neighborhoods are represented."

The Farmers Home Administration makes annual or intermediate term loans to farmers who need adequate funds to buy equipment and livestock, and longer term loans to build or repair houses and other essential farm buildings, and to purchase or improve land suitable for family-type farm operations.

It also advances credit to farmers or their non-profit associations to establish and carry out approved soil and water conservation practices, and to install and improve irrigation and farmstead water facilities.

Sevens Arrests May End Local Fire Setting Ring

Six Eastland County young men and another from Stephens County have been arrested and charged with setting a series of grass fires which have caused heavy damage to pastureland and kept Eastland County fire-fighters busy for the past month.

Credit for breaking up the young fire boys was given Constable Foster Woods of Eastland, Woods, after some involved detective work, chased down a car driven by one of the suspects, and with the help of Eastland City Policeman Howard Bradford, made the arrest. The suspect confessed he was involved in the ring and implicated the other six.

Some 17 grass fires have plagued farmers and law enforcement officers in the past month east of Eastland near Farm to Market Road 470. Three of the suspects were arrested Friday and the other four were nabbed Saturday.

Four of the youths, two from Morton Valley, one from Ranger and one from Eastland were charged with setting the fires. The three others are juveniles and their names were not made available.

One is from Eastland and two from Ranger.

The four charged with willfully burning pasture land will be bound over for action by the Eastland County grand jury. The juveniles will appear before County Judge John Hart.

During the past month fires in the area have caused heavy damage and only hard work by firemen has kept the damage confined to pastureland. At least one barn and one house caught fire but was put out before heavy damage resulted.

Woods said he began work on the case several weeks ago. He has been assisted by other area law enforcement officers, Police Chief Bob Patterson and Fire Chief Charlie Isbell, both of Ranger.

Welfare Officer Gets Mentioned By Commissioner

The question of does Eastland County need a welfare officer came up briefly at the Eastland County Commissioners Court meeting Monday.

Commissioner B. M. Bennett of Gorman suggested that an officer might be needed since charity costs keep going up and up.

Commissioner Carl Lamb of Cisco said he didn't believe the county could afford an officer since it would "take at least \$3,000 to get a qualified man."

The question was dropped.

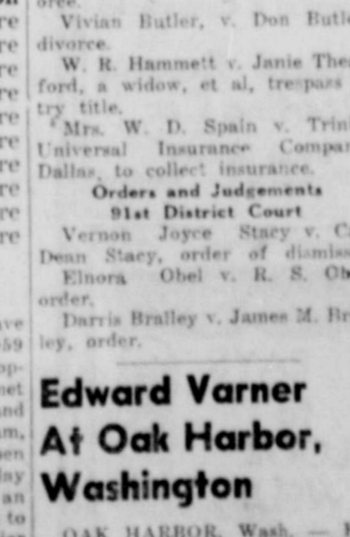

Modern Army's Surveillance Drone Completes Second Successful Flight . . .



THE USD-5, a turbo-jet, unmanned surveillance drone was successfully flown for the second time at the U.S. Army's Electronic Proving Ground's Drone Test Facility, Yuma Test Station, Arizona. Designed for missions of greater speed and longer endurance than previous propeller-driven surveillance drones, it will carry electronic surveillance equipment to provide Army commanders with continuous information about the enemy and his movements. The USD-5 was designed and built by Fairchild Engine and Airplane Corporation under an Army Signal Corps contract.



Lueders Baptist Youth Camp to Begin Monday

Plans are being made for an attendance of about 200 youngsters at the youth camp for District 17 of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, to be held at the Lueders Baptist Encampment Aug. 15-18.

District 17 includes 11 counties — Kent, Stenoell, Haskell, Fisher, Jones, Shackelford, Stephens, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan and Eastland.

State Banking Commissioner J. M. Falfner said the proposed bank of Stinnett would have capital of \$100,000, surplus of \$50,000 and reserves of \$50,000.
E. C. Britain of Stinnett is chairman of the board, Fry is president and Gene Scott of Stinnett is vice president and cashier. Other projected directors are Maurice B. Bentley, C. W. Kirk and Prantz Ferguson, all of Stinnett; R. D. Lemon of Perryton and David M. Warren Jr. of Borger.
No date has been set for a hearing on the application.

Texas Third In Number of Tree Farms

Texas, with 1,339 certified Tree Farms, ranks third in the nation in the number of these farms, according to Bill Smith, extension forester. The latest count released by the American Forest Products Industries, Inc. showed Mississippi first and Alabama second.

A Tree Farm is a privately owned, tax-paying woodland dedicated to continuing growth of forest crops for man's use, Smith pointed out. He adds that the words tree farm mean the owner is recognized for doing a good job of woodland management.

In terms of Tree Farm area, Texas ranks sixth with over 3,750,000 acres devoted to the production of timber and other forest crops, he said. The Lone Star State is headed by Florida, Georgia, Alabama, Washington and Oregon.

There are still over 60,000 timberland owners on about 7,750,000 acres in the Pineywoods of East Texas who could improve their woodlands and become tree farmers. Most of these lands are growing less than one-third of the timber they are capable of producing, Smith stated.

Cast Your Ballot - But DON'T THROW AWAY YOUR VOTE!

When a tree farmer's lands are certified, they receive a certificate and large metal sign to mark the property from the sponsors of the program, the Texas Forest Industries Committee. In order to attain certification, timberland owners must do certain things to keep timber growth rate and quality high, and protect the land. These practices include protecting the woodlands from wildfire, insects, disease, and destructive grazing; harvesting trees when mature or ready for thinning; and planting tree seedlings on idle acres.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest, fix maximum rates of interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency orders or refuses to grant any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; provided, however, in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest all contracts for a greater rate of interest than ten per centum (10%) per annum shall be deemed usurious; provided, further, that in contracts where no rate of in-
