colorful—and decisive—President. Someone asked Mr. Truman what he thought of the Democratic ticket. "It's a winner for sure," he said. "What did you think of the Republican convention, Mr. President?" another reporter asked. "Worst in history," Mr. Truman replied.

The outreach of Hurricane Brenda delayed our arrival in Hyannis, Massachusetts for my conference with Senator Kennedy. The pilots—Captain Reuben Cape, of Blanco, Texas and First Officer Jerry Dickson, of El Paso—who became the father of a new baby girl during the trip—brought us in for a perfect instrument landing when the visibility was only 175 feet.

Senator Kennedy and I sat up until 1:00 a. m. We talked about the program for the people we believe Congress will enact during the remaining weeks of the session, the coming campaign (Senator Kennedy accepted my invitation to come to Texas), and we also compared grey hairs. After the young men had gone to bed, I stayed up and worked until 3:30 a. m.

Lady Bird "took" to the Kennedy's home. It is a large, comfortable, pleasant house on Cape Cod. Jacqueline has furnished it with early American antiques and I almost didn't get Lady Bird away from her inspection tour in time for the press conference. Before we left Saturday, Senator Kennedy and Jackie came aboard our press bus and told our folks how happy they were that Texas had sent such a fine group of men and women along on the trip.

Saturday afternoon we were in Nashville, Tennessee where we were guests of Governor and Mrs. Buford Ellington.

I spoke that night to a Democratic rally of ten thousand people and when Governor Ellington introduced me, he had to send State Troopers out into the crowd to ask the folks to stop applauding. Governor Ellington told me that Tennessee hadn't seen a turnout like that "in a long, long time."

Every Southern state was represented and the Governors of Florida, North Carolina, Alabama, Virginia and Kentucky predicted a sweeping victory in November.

More than ten thousand people waited under the hot sun in Monticello, Iowa when we arrived there Sunday afternoon. Their

### The Growth Of A Texas Industry

Mrs. Ninnie L. Baird, who founded the nation's largest independent bakery operation, first learned the art of baking good bread as a girl in her native Tennessee.

Born May 23, 1869 near Trenton, Tennessee, she was orphaned at an early age. She was reared by an aunt who lived near Trenton. Under her aunt's direction, she learned of all the work and skill—and care—that goes into the baking of a good loaf of bread.

But it wasn't until years later—in 1908 to be exact—that these baking skills were to be put to work for her family and launch her on a career that was to make her name and her bread a household word in many parts of Texas.

It all came about this way:

At 17, she married W. A. Baird, and shortly afterward they moved to Fort Worth, Texas, where they operated a restaurant for several years.

In those days, Mrs. Baird baked all the bread for her family. Often she baked more bread than she needed and took extra loaves to her neighbors as gifts. The neighbors liked her baking and soon asked for the privilege of buying her bread.

Then, when Mr. Baird became too ill to work, she recalled a question that neighbors had been asking for some time: "Mrs. Baird, can you spare an extra loaf of bread?"

She gathered her brood about her, assigned tasks, and made every day baking day.

The oldest son, Edward, 16, became first assistant baker to his mother, and the three younger boys, Hoyt, Roland, and C. B., became "route men", serving their routes on foot and carrying the piping hot bread in baskets. The eldest daughter, Beanie, as first assistant housekeeper, was charged with the responsibility of the younger girls, Lorine, Marjorie and Ruth.

The family gave no thought to naming the loaf, but their customers, by referring to it from the very first as "Mrs. Baird's Bread" gave it the name it has borne ever since.

After the death of Mr. Baird in 1912, the family did not falter. "If we're going to get along, we've got to bake more," Mrs. Baird said.

From a hotel, Mrs. Baird purchased a second-hand, wood-burning commercial oven—capacity 40 loaves. The purchase price was seventy-five dollars—and Mrs. Baird paid twenty-five dollars in cash and the rest in bread and rolls.

One neighbor told another about "Mrs. Baird's" bread and before long the demand became so great that the family had to expand its operation. A horse and delivery wagon were purchased and a little wooden building to house the baking plant was built in the backyard of the Baird home on Washington St.

But the demand continued to grow, and by the time of World War I, it was obvious that the little baking plant would have to be replaced if this demand was to be met. So Mrs. Baird and her family—the sons were grown by then—built their first real bakery and began selling bread through grocery stores.

Down through the years, the fame of Mrs. Baird and her bread has continued to spread throughout the length and breadth of Texas. Today, bakeries in Fort Worth, Dallas, Houston, Abilene, Victoria, Lubbock, Waco and Austin serve the greater part of Texas with Mrs. Baird's Bread, and a plant in Fort Worth is devoted exclusively to baking cakes.

It's still a family operation—sons and grandsons not only manage the business operation but also directly supervise and control each day's baking. 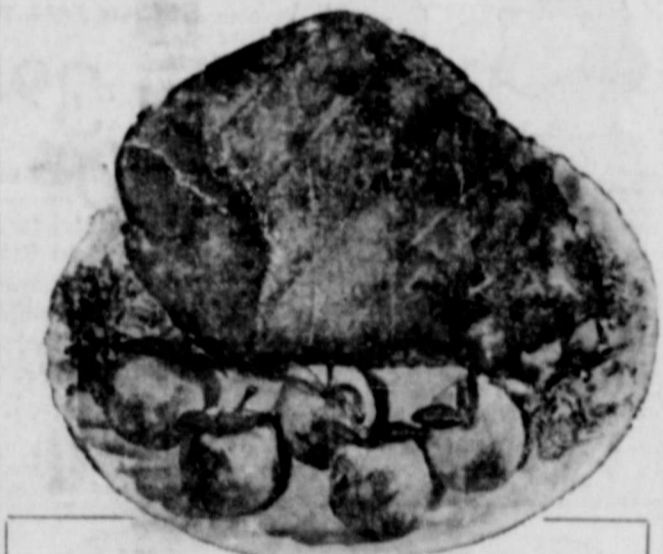

### Time to Sample Soil for Fall Crop Planting

Fall planting time is not too far away, and plans should be made now. Fertilizers and lime cost money, and guesswork on how much to apply is not very efficient farming. Dr. W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, says the only

way to eliminate this guessing is to have the soil tested.

The farmer must remember that soil samples are of very little value unless they truly represent the actual soil conditions of the field. Soil samples may be taken in several different ways, but Dr. Bennett says that anyone taking a sample must remember a few basic requirements. These include: Take one sample from each uniform area in the field.

A representative sample may be obtained by taking a slice of soil 4 to 5 inches deep, and repeating this at 15 or 20 different places over the field.

Spade, soil augur, soil probe or garden trowel may be used to take a sample.

All of the small portions from a single field should be mixed and a composite sample taken and placed in a soil carton.

All blanks on the soil carton and information sheet should be filled out completely.

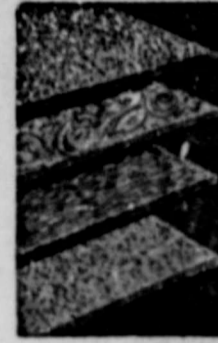

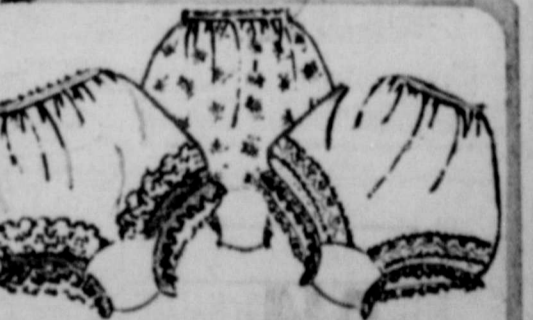
