**THE FIRST RUN**—Ronald Cook, Castro County News pressman and apprentice printer, this week makes the first trial press run after installation of this newspaper's latest piece of equipment. The press will print and fold eight pages at once at a speed of about 1500 per hour. A converted book press, it was constructed by the Huber Printing Press Company of Taunton, Mass. When it arrived in Dimmitt, the complicated machine was almost totally disassembled and it fell the lot of the News staff to assemble, tune, and make it run. This issue is the first to be printed on this press which will also be adequate in case the News ever goes semi-weekly. It is considered by the News staff to be the most ideal press available for weekly publication. As to nomenclature, it is a two-cylinder, double revolution, perfecting press, printing and folding eight, 8-column, 22-inch pages per cycle. This issue of the News was held to 8 pages this week to permit time for final adjustment and tuning.

## Farmers Union Delegates to Attend Plainview Meet

PLAINVIEW, April 12 (Sp.)—Prices of grain sorghum and cotton under the new farm bill will be outlined to a mass meeting of Plains farmers at the city auditorium on Friday, April 20 at 8 p. m., Alex Dickie announced today. Dickie is president of Texas Farmers Union.

The farm price legislation will be discussed by Gus F. Geissler, national head of Commodity Credit Corp. and Production and Marketing Administration programs under President Harry Truman. He is now assistant to the president of the National Farmers Union.

Dickie said "so much confusion has resulted from mis-statements and distortion by so many misinformed sources that it was thought advisable to get the country's No. 1 authority on these questions to give us the correct information once and for all."

Dickie stated further that Geissler is the best informed man in America with respect to all aspects of price support legislation past, present and contemplated since he was directly responsible for administrative programs under the Democratic administration. "Every farmer and business man of the Plains area who would like to know specific facts about this legislation should attend this meeting," Dickie said.

## Another Sandstorm Blankets County First of Week

Castro County again Sunday was the recipient of one of Mother Nature's dirtier, or dustier, tricks when a heavy sandstorm moved in from the north.

It was one of the worst in years and reported by Amarillo weathermen to rank ninth in recorded sandstorm history. Highway travel was hazardous as visibility at times dropped to less than a city block.

Some farms in the area reported wind damage. In Dimmitt the south end of the east wing of the new grade school building in process of being constructed was blown down. Damage was roughly estimated at \$900 but was covered by builder's risk insurance. The wall, upright and unsupported at the time, measured 35 x 10 feet and was constructed of brick and concrete tile.

No other serious damage was reported locally. As usual, the following day dawned bright and clear and only moderate winds have followed.

## Record Voting Crowds Poll In County School Elections

Castro County voters turned out Saturday in probably the greatest numbers ever for the three school trustee elections.

This was particularly true in Dimmitt where 507 people voted in two new school board members. Jim Elder took 417 votes to lead the field and J. G. Davis Jr. tallied 370. These two men replace former board members Delmond Neumayer who received 96 votes and Ivor Bagwell with 120. There were

## Sheriff Warns Of Malpractice by Cesspool Cleaners

County Sheriff Jack Cartwright this week issued a warning to all farmers in this area to be on guard against several men operating as cesspool cleaners who allegedly charge exorbitant prices and use threat and coercion to collect.

A warrant was to be sworn out Tuesday charging the men with swindling. It is alleged they cashed one check at a local grocery store knowing the check was no good by admission of the signer.

These men have shown up four known times on Castro County farms. They have reportedly claimed to be state inspectors, demanded to clean the farmer's cesspool and after working for a while no to the farmer and demand payment for the job of about \$300. Ordinarily the charge for cesspool cleaning service is less than \$100. If the farmer refuses, the cleaners try strong-arm methods to collect.

Whether there is only one team or more of the men is not known by the sheriff's office. At present there is nothing to work on other than a description and complaints made. They have cashed several checks they knew to be worthless here and in Tulsa and this is the basis of the warrant.

Sheriff Cartwright has urged all farmers to be on the lookout for these men and if approached by them get in touch with the sheriff's office immediately before the men can leave the vicinity.

Elected to the County School Board were C. W. Anthony and Percy Hart. The County School Board principally administers state education funds and charts transportation routes for the three schools. They meet once every three months. Also on the County School Board are E. H. Youts.

## Dimmitt's New Water Tower Came Tuesday

Chicago Bridge and Iron Company workmen from Tulsa, Oklahoma Tuesday began unloading sections of Dimmitt's new water spheroid off the train.

The spanking new water tower arrived in town about a week earlier than was originally expected. Work of actually building the tower has begun just west of Dimmitt Public Schools. It had originally been slated for delivery in February, but tight production schedules of the United States Steel caused a delay of about one month.

June 15th is the present target date for completion of the tower. When finished it will hold approximately 200,000 gallons and provide much increased water pressure particularly to the west part of town. The tower was approved in a city bond election last summer.

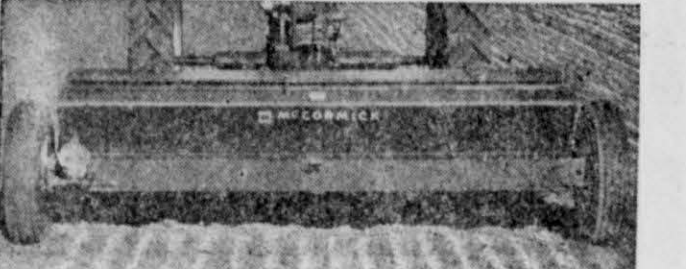

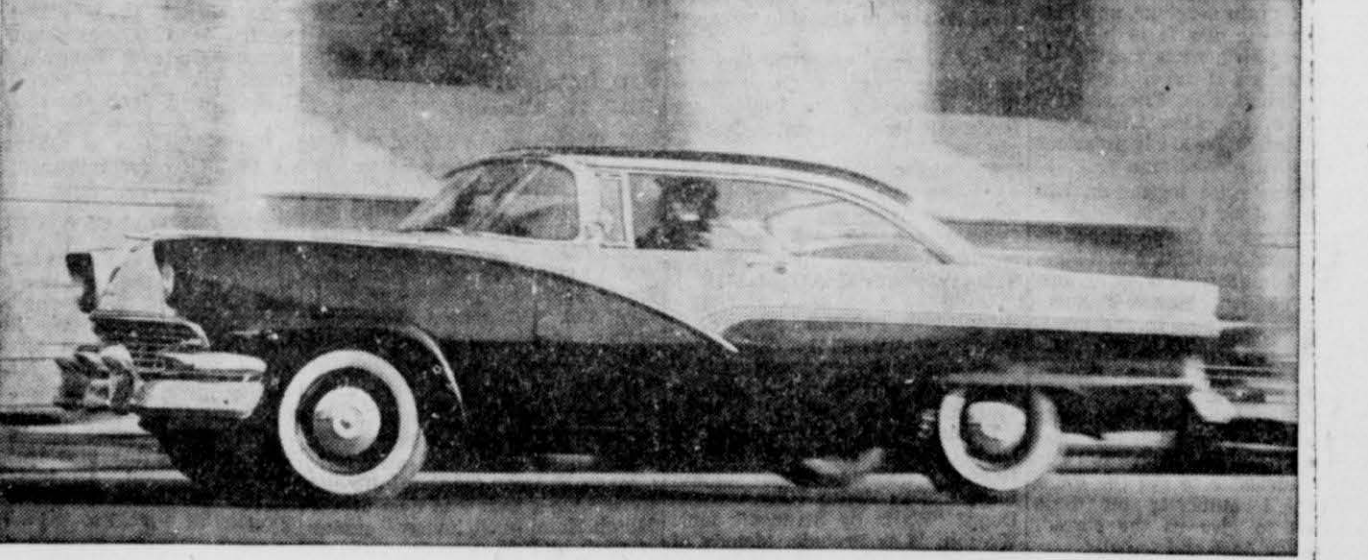
