Motor Vehicle Inspection Period Begins Today

The Texas Public Safety Commission has designated Sept. 1 as the beginning of the 1961 Motor Vehicle Inspection period in Texas.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that 4,700 inspection stations will be ready on Thursday, Sept. 1 to attach the new 1961 inspection stickers to the windshield of more than four and one-half million vehicles coming under the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act.

Garrison said, "We feel that the vehicle inspection program in Texas has proved a deterrent to vehicle accidents on our streets and highways." He urged all motorists to get their vehicles inspected before the bad weather of winter begins.

The fee for each inspection is \$1.00 plus any repair or adjustment necessary. The average cost for inspection in 1960, including the \$1.00 fee, was \$2.00 per vehicle.

Bulldogs Meet Rotan Here Friday Night

The Ranger Bulldogs will take on the Rotan Yellowhammers at Bulldogs Stadium Friday at 8 p.m. in the season opener for both teams.

Lack of experience and reserve strength will be one of the main obstacles for the Bulldog squad this season. Experience in the backfield is very limited. Richard Robie will be calling signals for the Bulldogs, and Friday night will be his first game at that position. Understudy for Robie will be Charlie De Los Santos who could possibly see action in two other positions other than quarterback. He has been practicing at end and halfback. Edward Mendez, who is running in the wing-back and half-back position, also has studied in the special calling duties. Others who will see action in the backfield will be James Henry who played end the majority of last season and Joe Barker who was a defensive halfback last season. Richard Wilhelm, a defensive player last season, will be seeing action on the offense team this year.

In the line there will be more experience. Chuck Garrett will start in the center position. He played mainly on defense last season, but has some experience in offense. In the starting guard positions will be Jim Robinson and Rastnie Daskewich who is the most experienced lineman on the squad, along with Dean Richey at tackle. The other tackle will be Richard Guest who is one of the biggest boys on the squad. The end positions will be the least inexperienced spots in the line. Two freshmen will see some action at these positions. Johnny Camacho and Arthur Mendoza will man these positions when De Los Santos and Henry are alternating in the backfield. Other linemen who will probably see action Friday night are Alex Eakin, David Lockwood, David Eckrell and Alfonso Vasquez.

Rounding out the squad will be Mike Sanders, Carlton Stagner, Kyge Edmonds, Douglas Browning, Jerry Jones, Tom Covington, David Sutton, Dwight Squires and Terry Townsend. The Rotan Yellowhammers will have five starters back from last season. They are, David Baugh, back; Donald Goodwin, back; Philip Petty, center; Morrow Hunsaker, tackle; and Erb's Rodgers, end. Their main loss from last season was Todd Baugh, quarter-back and Bradley Ritt's, fullback. The two teams will be about even on experience and weight. Rotan has two big linemen, Hunsaker at 185 and Van Leon at 205. Baugh is the heaviest man in the backfield at 160. Rotan downed the Bulldogs 29 to 0 last season.

Re-Entry Try And Completed Gasses Noted

A re-entry project and a completed gasser highlight this week's Eastland County oil news.

The completion is Lone Star Producing Co. No. 1 J. C. Dyer, a plugback operation nine miles northwest of Cisco in the Leary Field. It was completed as a gasser from the Lake Sand. The gas was gauged at the rate of 243,000 cubic feet daily from perforations at 3,606-3,612 feet. Formation was fractured and treated with 250 gallons of mud acid.

The No. 1 Hopper will be drilled by W. W. Franklin, et al, of Eastland. It is a 3,000 foot re-entry project two miles southeast of Nymrod in the regular field, and 660 feet east of a prospective Caddo Lime discovery.

Location is 2,310 feet from north and 530 feet from west line of Section 79, Block 3, H&TC Survey. The try is an east offset to the same operator's No. 1 Schaefer, being completed from the Caddo Lime. No. 1 Hopper originally was drilled to a total depth of 5,948 feet in the Ellenburger and was plugged in 1950. The Caddo was topped at 2,872.
