

Rangers Open Here Saturday Night

The Ranger College Rangers will open the season in Bulldog Stadium against Murray State of Oklahoma Saturday night at 8 p.m.

The Rangers are opening their season a week early due to scheduling problems between the two schools. The two colleges couldn't get together on their regular schedule and chose to open a week early for their game.

The Rangers will field a relatively light line this season, but a line that has exceptionally good speed and movement. They won't have a player weighing over 200 pounds. Their two heaviest players tip the scales at 192. They will be opposed Saturday night by a team that will have nine linemen who will go heavier than the Ranger's largest man.

This lightweight line could prove to be an advantage to the Rangers as evidenced in the scrimmage against Tarleton State Tuesday night. The Rangers showed up exceptionally well against a bigger team in the scrimmage. Coaches Jim Puryear and Clyde Ewalt were well pleased with the performance of the entire squad. They were especially impressed by the defensive play of two newcomers, Guard Bud Bridges, 155, of Big Spring and Knicky Arthur, 170, of Eastland. Another newcomer of Eastland who showed up real well was Tackle Marvin Agnew, 180 pounds. The returning letterman also made a good showing. A fullback transfer from Sul Ross College, Wendell Norris, 160, of Odessa, made several impressive runs. He, along with halfback Jerry House, 135, from Kentucky will give the Rangers some of the best backfield speed that they have had in years.

The Murray State Aggies will have three starting backs returning from last season's team. Only two starters in the line are returning, a 217 pound tackle and a 219 pound guard.

The Rangers will have 11 returning lettermen this year. All of them were starters last season. In the backfield there will be Kenneth Hart, quarterback of Seagraves and Printie Gidney, fullback, of Crowell. In the line there will be Horst Krause, tackle, Fort Worth; Philip Reed, tackle, Eastland; Clyde Smith, center, Carrollton; Carroll Richardson, tackle, New London and Pat Blakeley, guard, Seagraves.

Other returning lettermen are Delbert Jones, tackle, of Woodson; Butch Scott, fullback, Anson and Sonny Oates, slot back of Loop.

The squad will have four transfers from senior colleges. They are: Norris; Mike Leonard, transfer from West Texas State, slot back of Southdown; Clinton Humphrey, transfer from Sul Ross, quarterback, of Eastland; and Frank Rice, North Texas State, halfback, of Breckenridge.

Freshmen include Jim Shutter, fullback, Graham; Don Lambert, halfback, G. O. R. Russ Ward, slot back, Morton; and House.

Other new linemen include Dick

Stevenson, end, Seagraves; Jerry Key, end, Post; James Potts, end, Breckenridge; Jerome Stone, end, Newport News, Virginia; John Swinney, end, Ranger; Martin Day, end, Eastland; and Richard Fuller, end, Carrollton.

A new tackle on the squad will be Marvin Agnew of Eastland. New guards are Bob Spradling of Richardson; Paul Free of Colorado City; Arthur of Eastland; and Bridges of Big Spring. Centers will be Don Hazard of Eastland; and Warren Sheelar of Corpus Christi.

One other returning letterman is Leon Walker, a halfback, from Holiday who lettered as a freshman and then dropped out of school for awhile.

This rounds out the squad with 34 players. Trainer is Howard Stallings, an ex-Ranger letterman from Fort Worth.

The crop over the state and the nation is expected to exceed the 1959 production.

The 1960 Texas estimate is set at 40 million pounds; last year the state produced 32 million pounds. The nation's estimate is set at 181 million pounds, which is approximately 25 percent more than the 1959 production of 143 million pounds.

Mrs. Robinson Sees Olympic Sessions

(Editor's Note: This is the last in a series of articles submitted by Mrs. Lillie Robinson, concerning her trip abroad. Mrs. Robinson returned to Ranger the past weekend in order to be here for the opening of school. We hope that everyone has enjoyed the articles she has submitted as much as we have.)

Before we left Florence, I had my hair done by an Italian gentleman. He sang all during the time he worked on my hair. We drove by bus to Rome where we stayed five days. I really enjoyed those five days. We stayed in the Columbus, a lovely hotel. Among the interesting things we saw in Rome were the house in which Elizabeth Barrett Browning died, the church in which Dante was baptized, and other memorials to Dante. We saw St. Peter's Cathedral, the Vatican, the Colosseum, the Capitol, the tomb of the unknown soldier, the memorial to Ermannando II, and the Trevi fountain which we remember for the three coins.

As we drove to Rome, we saw at least 30 teams of white oxen pulling plows behind which a man walked and pulling loads of farm produce. Donkeys were also used. We saw one woman carrying on her head, about a dozen live chickens in a large basket. The food in Italy was good. We drank the water in all the cities. To me Italy means songs, paintings, sculpture, garlicky heat and cheap perfume.

We attended the opera "Aida". We were issued nine tickets to the Olympic games. We attended seven sessions and sold two of our tickets. We saw the U. S. beat Hungary in basketball 107 to 68. We attended two sessions of boxing. I don't usually enjoy boxing but I enjoyed the reaction of the crowds as much as the actual matches. A policeman told us that Grace Kelly and the Prince were there, so all of us looked at them through binoculars. We saw a white boy and a negro from the U. S. beat their opponents, Korea and Venezuela. The Russian knocked the German down three times while the crowd chanted "Khrushchev" in unison. Poland's man knocked the Spaniard out in the first round and it took a little while to revive him.

We saw Australia win a field hockey game from Japan. One thousand Australians came to the games by boat. After the game was over I asked permission to make the Australian's picture. When I said, I'm from Texas, the manager gave all of us the Australian emblem, a small pin with a kangaroo on top of the five Olympic circles.

We saw high diving and two swimming matches. The U. S. boy and girl broke the previous record in swimming. They won first place. In track and field events most of the girl contestants were the girl negroes.

At the field hockey game we sat by two boys from San Antonio. They had visited East Germany and talked with a man who told them that one day he went to his own shoe factory and was told that the factory had been taken over for the good of the government. (He was working for \$3. per day in his own factory). He said the East Germans felt hopeless and said, "The Russians are here to stay."

We flew to Brussels and were greeted by pouring rain and cold weather after having been in 104 degree weather in Italy. We had an interesting guide who showed us places of interest, such as St. Baron Cathedral and the Castle of the Count of Flanders. We flew to Amsterdam, Holland where it rained all day. We visited the flower

shops. I never saw so many beautiful flowers in one place. We visited a wooden shoe factory and a diamond cutter. We had lunch in an Indonesian Inn where waiters dressed in native costumes, served us 30 different foods. We didn't know what we were eating but enjoyed most of the food. I recognized the fried bananas and the peanuts and rice. The food was highly seasoned. One dish was called dynamite. In the afternoon we had a boat ride. The guide told us there are 500,000 bicycles in Holland and 1600 boats and 485 bridges. We saw small houses like house trailers built on raised concrete in the canals. Our guide was a handsome college student. As we rode along in the boat, he pointed out places of interest on both sides of the canal. He said, "We don't have the biggest gas locks in the world; I'm not from Texas." He didn't know any of us were from Texas but we let him know we were.

Our last dinner was served in a beautiful Castle Hooge Vuursche. I guess Studo Abroad wanted to leave a good impression in our minds as we were served steaks in a beautiful dining hall. The table was long enough to seat 40 people. The room was lighted with candles and there were 14 vases of flowers. The meal consisted of five courses.

We boarded our plane about 11 o'clock but had to disembark as new spark plugs had to be put into one motor. We took off at 12:30 and landed in New York 14 hours later. The Customs officials were very kind and we passed through in five minutes. We had to wait until 6 p.m. for our jet flight to Dallas where my husband and daughter and family met me.

It's good to be home after a most pleasant summer abroad.

The Ranger Bulldogs will travel to Mineral Wells Friday night to take on the Class AAA Mountaineers in their second outing of the season.

Mineral Wells will be playing their first game of the season.

The Bulldogs came back to practice Monday after Friday night's heartbreaking defeat, full of desire and determination. They all showed disappointment from the previous defeat, but the coming game was more important in their mind.

The Bulldogs will be up against a big tough and experienced team when they meet the Mountaineers Friday night. There will be one thing in the Bulldogs' favor and that will be one game more experience than Mineral Wells. The AAA schedule doesn't begin until this week, where Class A and AA began last week.

Team statistics for last week's game showed that Richard Wilhelm was the big ground gainer for the Bulldogs. He made 72 yards on 15 carries rushing for an average of 4.8 yards per carry and caught one pass good for 48 yards for a total of 127 yards. Joe Barker made 61 yards on 12 carries for an average of 5.1 yards. Edward Mendez picked up 7 yards on two carries. Wilhelm scored 12 points, Mendez six and Robie two.

Defensively Bonnie Daskevich and Jim Robinson led the Bulldog defenders. Daskevich got three tackles and nine assists and Robinson got four tackles and eight assists. Joe Barker got the most individual tackles with six and also got five assists.

Richard Robie made two tackles and eight assists. Wilhelm made three tackles and two assists. Mendez made two and two. James Henry got four tackles and two assists. Dean Richey made two tackles and assisted in four more. Charles Garrett assisted in six tackles. Alfonso Vesquez got three tackles and six assists. Richard Guest got two tackles and three assists. Arthur Mendoza got one tackle. Charlie De Los Santos made the outstanding defensive play of the night by tackling a Rotan ball carrier and making him fumble, then recovered the fumble to give the Bulldogs the ball on the 50 yard line. The play resulted in a touchdown for the Bulldogs.

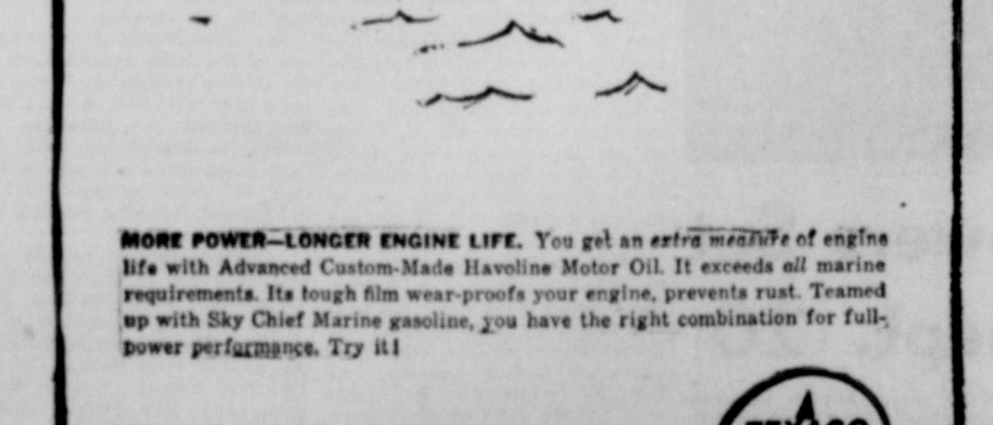

### Texas Republicans Look to State Level in Bid for Two Party State

Texas Republican campaign headquarters—in a handbook prepared for state candidates—called today for election of a state government that would squarely face such problems as economic growth, taxes, school and water.

The GOP attacked the Democrats for trying to meet the revenue crisis with "quickie" taxes—a dab here, a dab there.

A product of several months of research, the manual urged re-alignment of school districts in the interest of efficiency and the best use of funds.

It appealed for intensified efforts to stimulate industrial growth. This growth, it added, would depend substantially on improvement of schools to turn out high-quality workers, acceleration of highway construction, boosts in the water supply.

Asserting that this interrelated development demands better leadership in the state government, the handbook said: "Texans can choose 'normal growth' and barely get along, or they can choose growth upon growth and become the possessors of one of America's greatest industrial and economic complexes.

Democrats have failed so far to lead the way." The manual said GOP candidates would avoid Democrat factionalism, cooperate with private research groups and public-spirited Democrats—help Texas meet the challenge of the "Crucial Sixties."

Pointing to the 56th Legislature's tax fight as a vivid illustration of Democrat factionalism, the manual said: "They tried to solve the dilemma with 'quickie' taxes—a dab here, a dab there, with the Governor's boys' and the Speaker's boys' at each other's throats to the last minute before adjournment."
