

De Leon Cats Pounce On Bulldogs Backs

The DeLeon Bearcats pounced on the Ranger Bulldogs Friday night and rode them to a 20 to 0 victory.

The Bulldogs were up against several bad breaks—the bad breaks being the big DeLeon line and quarterback Grady West and halfback Gerald Van Zant.

Van Zant scored 12 of DeLeon's points and West accounted for the other eight. The two fleet footed backs took advantage of the big powerful front line to deal the Bulldogs trouble the entire game.

A good crowd of Ranger fans braved the downpour shortly before game time to see the Bulldogs, who fought gallantly through the entire game, but couldn't ever get a sustained drive underway. Each time the Bulldogs got a drive started, a penalty or a fumble would cause them to give up possession of the ball.

The Bulldogs received the opening kickoff, but couldn't move the ball for a first down and had to kick. DeLeon made a fine run-back and went from scrimmage on

their own 35 yard line. On the first play James Henry came up with a DeLeon fumble and it scooted 27 yards for another TD. This time the extra point was no good and DeLeon led at the half 14 to 0.

The third quarter was scoreless, but DeLeon struck for another score in the opening minutes of the fourth quarter. This time West went over from the four yard line. The extra point was no good and the scoring ended with DeLeon leading 20 to 0.

The Bulldogs fought hard in the fourth quarter to get into the scoring column, but could never move that last needed yardage. Ronnie Daskevich recovered a DeLeon fumble on the DeLeon 16 yard line but the Bulldogs could only pick up two yards and the ball went back to the Bearcats after four downs. The Bulldogs still had another threat going following James Henry's intercepted pass. This time the Bulldogs moved the ball down to the Bearcat 25 before losing it on downs again. Two plays later Charlie De Leon Santos recovered a DeLeon fumble and after a completed pass from Richard Robie to Edward Mendez, time ran out as the Bulldogs were running from the DeLeon 35 yard line.

The Bulldogs will return home to Bulldog stadium next Friday night to play host to the undefeated Dublin Lions.

RANGERS CROWNED BOWL CHAMPIONS

The Ranger College Rangers proved that they were the true Eastland County Peanut Bowl Champions Saturday night in Maverick Stadium as they fought the highly touted Cisco Wranglers to a standstill and went on to defeat them 13 to 0.

The Rangers' defense stopped the Wranglers' line and linebackers. The hard charging Ranger line held the Wranglers to only 11 yards gained on the ground and 16 yards in the air, and shook the Wranglers loose from the ball and recovered it on four different occasions.

Frank Rice, the hard running Ranger halfback, led in rushing with 89 yards on 12 carries, picking up 12 of the Rangers' 13 points.

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Cisco received the opening kickoff but failed to make a first down and was forced to punt. Ranger mounted a drive that carried from their own 25 yard line down to the Cisco 14 yard line but bogged down and Cisco took over on downs. Again Cisco was forced to

punt and Ranger struck from their own 32 yard line and moved on to the first score of the game with Frank Rice scoring on an 11 yard pass from Quarterback Clinton Humphrey. Kenneth Hart kicked the extra point and Ranger led 7 to 0 with three minutes left in the first quarter.

Pat Blakely recovered a Cisco fumble on the Cisco 41 yard line, but the Rangers failed to capitalize on the break and the half ended with Ranger threatening from the Cisco 26 yard line.

An over-capacity crowd was entertained during the half time by a colorful performance by the Eastland, Ranger, Cisco and Gorman High School Bands under the general direction of Eastland Band Director Phil Hewett. The Ranger College Rangemen added to the color by presenting "Has Anybody Seen My Girl." Eastland County Peanut Queen, Mary Kay Rush, of Ranger, and her attendants, Cindy Fox of Olden, Mary Laird of Cisco, Betty Young of Eastland, Linda Harrison of Gorman, and Paula Norris of Carbon were presented. Miss Johnny Harrison of Rising Star, was unable to attend the presentation.

Parade winners were presented their awards by the Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce. The 250 plus bandmen presented a very spectacular sight as the several different colors of the uniforms blended into formations on the field.

Ranger received the ball on the second half kickoff and after an exchange of punts, Cisco lost the ball on their own 14 yard line after a fourth down penalty of an illegal receiver down field cost them the loss of the ball. County Cancer Delegates Attend Weatherfor Meet

Six delegates from the Eastland County Cancer Society Unit attended a planning workshop in Weatherford Friday, Sept. 23.

Delegates attending were Mrs. Roscoe Hopper of Ranger, H. R. Garrett of Eastland, Mrs. Austin Flint, Mrs. Johnston and Mrs. Schaefer, all of Cisco.

The workshop and meeting was for planning the 1960-61 Cancer Crusade in Texas.

Dr. Fred M. Learned, one of the leading researchers in the cancer research program was the main speaker.

Dr. Learned spoke to the group on the advancements that had been made in cancer research in the past few years.

He said that vast sums of money had been spent and many hours of research had been made in the causes, controlling and curing of cancer. The money for this research has come from units such as the Eastland County unit, and that the progress that has been made in the fight against the disease could not have been made without these large sums of money.

He went on to say that now the ultimate treatment and cure of cancer is in sight and the need for the work of the Cancer Society Units were ever more important than in the past.

He listed six goals which research may hope to achieve during the next few years. They are: 1. Discovery of Cellular trigger mechanisms which start malignant growth; 2. A means of checking metastasis—spreading of cancer; 3. Chemicals to selectively kill or halt division in cancer cells; 4. Understanding of possible immune defense mechanisms that may work against cancer; 5. Proof that viruses are a cause of some forms of cancer in human beings; and 6. A simple and practical blood test to disclose early cancer.

He went on to add, "Now, you will note that any one of the first four of these would mean in effect that cancer — even advanced cancer — could be cured or controlled. And, from what I have told you, some progress has been made on everyone of these. The fifth point could lead to a means of either preventing or curing cancer—to find that viruses are the vital link in cancer would provide the lock, if not the key, to the whole problem.

As to the sixth point, a practical test for detecting cancer anywhere in the system, would mean that the vast benefits to be accrued from always detecting cancer early would result in thousands of lives being saved immediately without any further knowledge or cure. And it would be the final blessing. It would provide a panacea that could lift the awful burden of doubt—the terrible weight of fear—that the very word cancer implies.

He closed with, "I think, that whatever the way is managed, and whenever the time comes, all of you must be extremely proud to have known that you were a part of this exciting adventure into the paths of life and death, of sickness and of health."

Fall Revival Scheduled at First Baptist

Dr. Ray Ellis, Associate Professor of Greek and Bible at Hardin Simmons University, will preach the fall revival in the First Baptist Church, October 2-9.

Dr. Ellis is known for his sound Biblical preaching and his highly evangelistic messages. The two go hand in hand. He is a graduate of Howard Payne College and holds his Doctor of Theology Degree from Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth.

He has been associated with Hardin-Simmons since 1957, and has conducted many revivals in this area during this time.

At the present time he is affiliated with: The Southwest Baptist Bible Teachers Association; The National Association of Biblical Instructors; and the Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis.
