These purchases are the result of contracts negotiated with about 125 different producers in the West Central Texas area, Lone Star records show. In addition, the company holds contracts with several gasoline plants in the area which buy from numerous smaller operators.  
The producers and plants are located in the following counties: Palo Pinto, Erath, Ham Kon, Comanche, Eastland, Stephens, Young, Brown, Coleman, Callahan, Shackelford, Runnels, Taylor, Jones, Stonewall, Scurry, Fisher, Nolan, Coke, Tom Green, Schleicher and Sutton.

### Milk Producers Get Higher Price In Sept.

The minimum uniform price the Central West Texas producers will receive for 4.0 per cent milk delivered to plants of regulated handlers during September will be \$3.52 per hundredweight, according to an announcement by Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator. This price is subject to a location adjustment. For each point (0.1 per cent) that the average butterfat content of producer milk varies from 4.0 per cent a butterfat differential of 7.4 cents applies. This price is 24 cents above the minimum uniform price for August and 27 cents above the minimum uniform price for September 1959.

During September there were 475 producers on the Central West Texas market compared with 506 during September 1959. These 475 producers delivered an average of 508,562 pounds of Class I milk for an average of 444,503 pounds during September 1960. This is an increase of 11.1 percent over the daily Class I utilization during August, but is a decrease of 2.66 per cent from September 1959.

Producer receipts were 114.4 percent of total Class I utilization during September 1960. This compares with a relationship of 123.3 per cent for August and 109.4 per cent for September 1959.

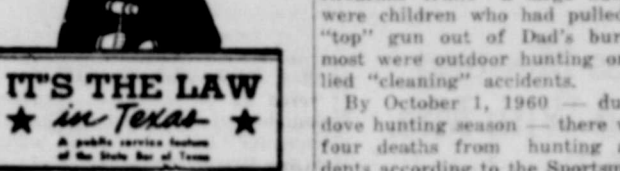

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

The thrill of the hunt is exhilarating, and yet at the same time can be soothing. This paradox of emotions probably accounts for the tremendous popularity of the sport.

But there is still another aspect—this one, not so attractive—the

ever-present possibility of an accident.

During 1959, there were 159 accidental deaths attributable to firearms. While a large number were children who had pulled a "top" gun out of Dad's bureau, most were outdoor hunting or allied "cleaning" accidents.

By October 1, 1960—during dove hunting season—there were four deaths from hunting accidents according to the Sportsmen's Clubs of Texas.

However, death from firearms is not the only way to die during hunting season. A good many hunters slip and fall over precipices while gazing off into the distance instead of watching their steps on unsure ground.

But the greatest danger is still the hunter's weapon. Here are the ten commandments of shooting safety, which if followed seriously may save your own or your partner's life.

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun.

2. Watch that muzzle! Carry your gun safely—keep the safety on until ready to shoot.

3. Unload guns when not in use, take down or open breech—guns should be carried in cases to shooting area.

4. Be sure barrel is clear of obstructions, and that you have ammunition only of the proper size for the gun you carry.

5. Be sure of the target before you pull the trigger—know identifying features of the game you hunt.

6. Never point a gun at anything you do not intend to shoot—avoid all horseplay.

7. Never climb a tree or fence or jump a ditch with a loaded gun—never pull a gun toward you by the muzzle.

8. Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or water—at target practice be sure your back-

Texas Ranks Fifth in Number of New Post Offices

Nearly 5,000 post office buildings have been constructed since the launching of the Department's modern improvement program by Postmaster General Arthur F. Summerfield shortly after his appointment to this position by President Eisenhower in 1953.

Texas got 277 of these new post office buildings, exceeded only by California, Michigan, New York and Pennsylvania. The cost of this new post office construction in Texas has been estimated at \$11,215,000.

In an announcement on this subject by Acting Postmaster Ella White, it was pointed out that while these facilities have been equipped and furnished by the Department, the buildings themselves are either leased or rented in line with the completely new policy which has been closely followed during the past seven years.

On the basis of this experience, it is estimated that at least 1,600 new buildings will be added to this total during the current fiscal year.

It was explained that this program not only reduces the government's original expenditure substantially but also means substantial additions to the tax rolls in the communities where the new structures are located since they are not tax exempt.

"This type of operation has resulted in more and more new mail handling each year since it was first inaugurated," Postmaster White said, "and it is my understanding that the annual report which is now being prepared will reveal a new all-time high for the fiscal year 1960 ended June 30 when agreements were signed for

9. Store ammunition and guns separately, beyond reach of children.

10. Avoid alcoholic beverages before or during shooting.

1,602 new buildings costing a little over \$100,000,000.

We have been told that this is part of a program to completely modernize between 12,000 and 15,000 postal facilities during the next few years.

"In addition to the fact that we are getting more and more brand new buildings, it is doubtful if the Post Office Department was ever before as careful in making preliminary scientific and engineering checks and surveys in order to be sure that the new facilities will adequately take care of present postal needs in their various communities, and future growth as well. And as a clear indication of just how much more rapidly this new program is being carried out, the new building total for fiscal 1960 was 655 representing a total investment by private industry of approximately \$62,000,000."

As an indication of the type of agreements negotiated during fiscal 1960, it was stated that 1,125 of them—approximately 75 per cent—were on a lease basis while

the remainder were for new buildings but on a monthly rental basis in order to simplify a change should it become necessary.

It's almost impossible to predict what that tiny bundle of fur will look like when it's full grown if it's a cross-breed. But it may be just as cute, smart, affectionate, or brave as the purebred. 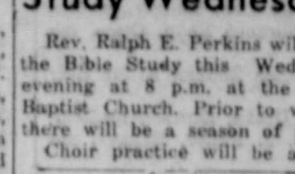

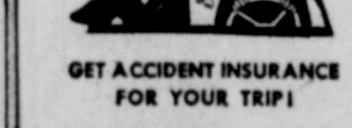

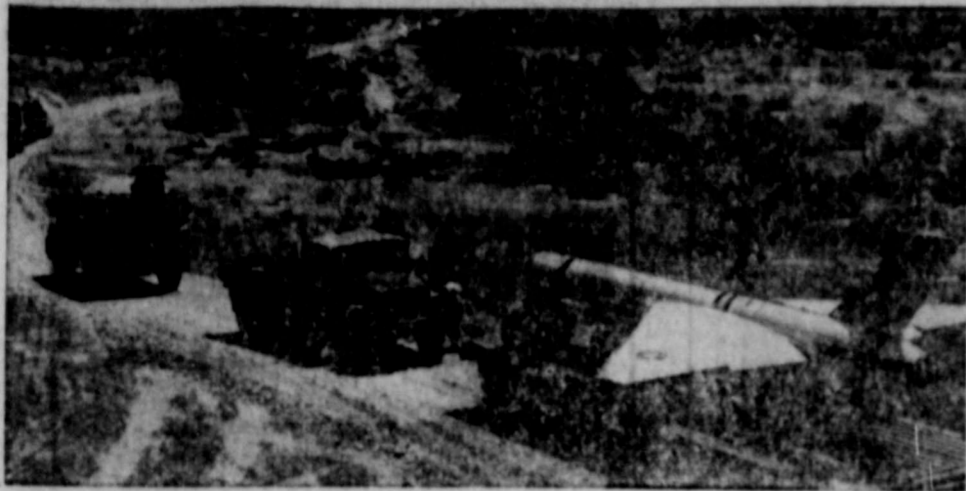

Game Law Violators Charged With 433 Fines

Wardens will begin another crackdown on persons who fail to buy their hunting and fishing licenses, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. New licenses

were required after Sept. 1. Last month, 433 persons paid fines for failure to have fishing licenses under these conditions. The report of the law enforcement division. There were 546 arrests for the month, with fines and costs amounting to \$9,975.42. Fifty persons paid fines for "telephoning" for fish. This is the illegal use of electrical devices in shocking fish.

Licenses were revoked on a dozen violators, including those who "telephoned" the fish. Others who killed deer out of season also got their licenses revoked.

"There is little excuse for a person to get caught without a hunting or fishing license," the director said. "Everyone knows such a license is required. They think they can get by without one, and then get caught."

If you hunt deer you must have deer tags, even though you are entitled to exemption. This is the warning of the fiscal director of the Game and Fish Commission, whose job it is to provide hunting and fishing licenses.

For persons entitled to an exemption, the license is required only if you hunt deer or turkey. The exempt license is not required for other types of game.

The following are exempt from buying a hunting license: If you hunt entirely within your own county (except for deer and turkey); If you are over 65 or

under 17 years of age. If you qualify for hunting without a license under these conditions you do not need a permit.

Tags are necessary, because it is illegal to possess a deer that does not have a tag. These tags must be securely attached to the deer immediately after it is killed. Just having the tag in your pocket is insufficient. As soon as you reach your deer, the tag, properly filled in, should be attached to the antlers, if a buck, or a leg if a doe, where does are legal. It can be securely wrapped with string, or fastened with adhesive tape. And the tag should be put on so it will not become loose with handling the carcass in either the leanbox or the automobile while in transit.

The deer tags are non-transferable and must bear the name of the shooter.

Afterward, I "accused" Harley, who was a good friend, of arranging for me to be handed one of the main-prize packages but he said that wasn't the case at all—that I had actually won on my merits; that the vendors used to know which packages were the most valuable but they got to handing them to relatives and friends in the audience so now they didn't know, any more.

The other time that I won was on "country store night" at a Los Angeles movie house; but, when the number on my ticket stub was called, I didn't go forward. Wouldn't I have looked silly, tugging a big basket of groceries on a street car at 11 o'clock at night in a hotel in Culver City? (What's that? Did somebody say I look silly, anyhow?)

Back to the blanket — it was a quiet little number; blue and yellow. Premonition — intuition — instinct — or something told me that this would be my only time over to win anything; therefore,

I decided to make the most of my moment.

So when I got back up town, I draped it around me, entered the lobby of the Raleigh Hotel, raised my right hand and said, "Ugh!" I was sensational.

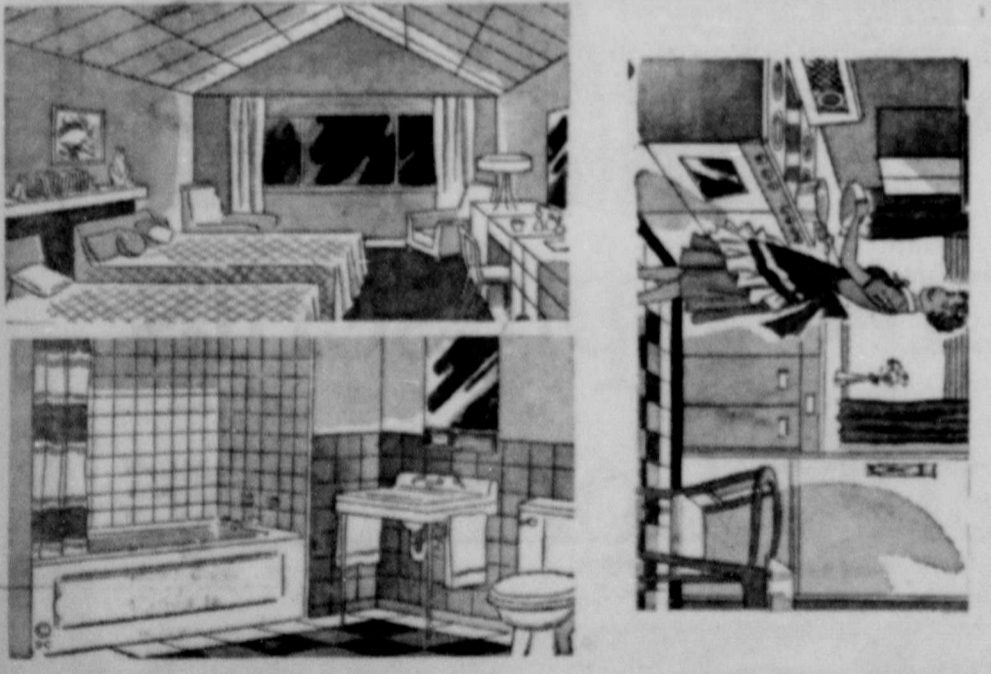

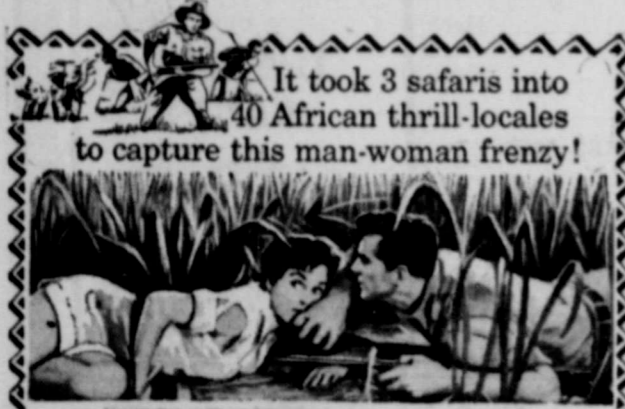
