Kennedy Has Strong Lead In Local Poll

If a telephone political poll taken by the Times is any indication, Democratic Presidential candidate John Kennedy will carry Ranger in the November 8 general election by a wide margin.

Forty citizens were called at random and results show that 19 said they favor Kennedy, nine indicated they would vote for Nixon and 12 said they are undecided, therefore Kennedy has a better than majority lead unless all of the 12 persons who said they are undecided vote the Republican ticket.

A breakdown percentage-wise shows that 47.5 percent prefer the Kennedy-Johnson ticket while only 22.5 percent said they would vote for Nixon and Lodge. A large 30 percent stated they are undecided.

While the Democrats carried the Ranger precinct in both the 1952 and 1956 campaigns, they did not enjoy the lead which is indicated in the Times poll. In 1956 Ranger voted 591 Democrats and 426 Republicans and went even stronger in 1952. The high number of undecided voters may indicate this race will be closer than the poll shows, but the Republicans would have to swing more than 75 percent of the undecided voters to come up even with the Democrats.

Calling numbers on a fixed pattern—one number was called then nine were skipped (the poll was not started with the first number in the telephone book)—Persons answering the call were told: "This is Gene Townsend calling for the Ranger Times. This newspaper is conducting a political poll to see which candidate is leading in this precinct in the Presidential race. No names will be used in the results of this poll. We will appreciate it if you will tell us what candidate you prefer or if you are undecided."

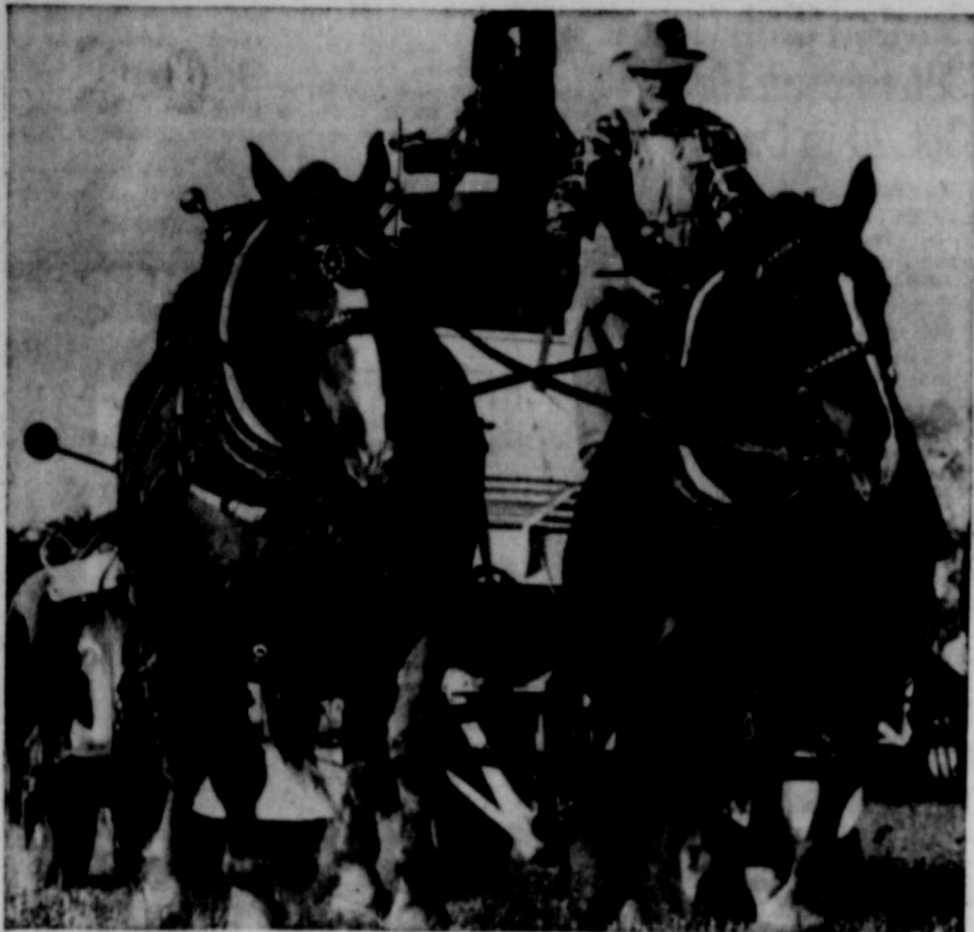

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WORKING WITH WOOD
Reasonable care and intelligent maintenance will greatly increase the beauty and usefulness of wood buildings. Dirt and stain on painted wood, like on clothing, is objectionable, but can, in most instances, be removed. An occasional washing with soap and warm water will remove grime and dirt and frequently will restore the paint color and gloss.
To remove mildew from a painted wood surface, it should be

brushed off and then washed with a 5 to 10 percent solution of borax in warm water. This treatment may have to be repeated, since the fungus which causes mildew is difficult to control.
Rust stains in wood from nails or other metal and the mineral streaks from water stains may be removed by repeated scrubbing with oxalic acid mixed 5 ounces per gallon of cold water.
The pitch in pine lumber frequently works out of the boards and accumulates in streaks or patches on the surface. If the pitch is hard, it can be chipped or sanded off. If soft, it can be removed by rubbing with denatured alcohol. After using these stain removers, the wood surface should always be thoroughly rinsed with clean water.

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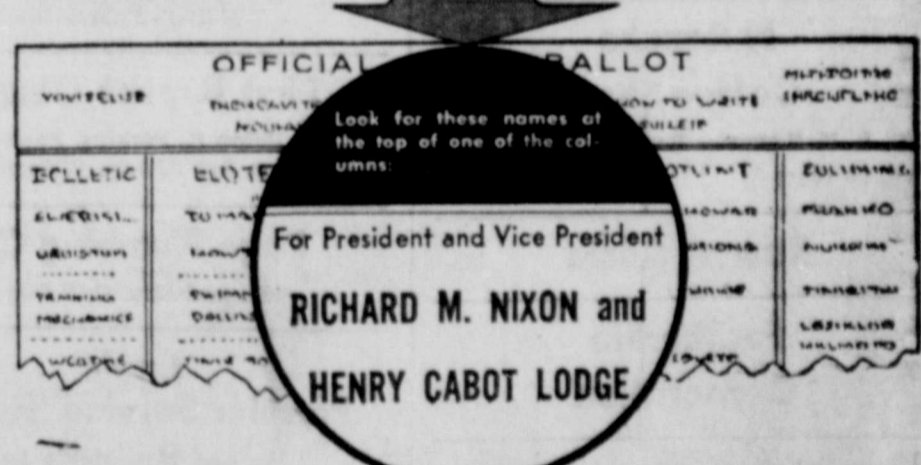

Texas Is Haven For Out of State Loan Sharks

Loan sharks have found Texas to be a haven for their unscrupulous activities, according to the Assistant Attorney General Elmer McVey.

"Since Texas is practically the only state in the union with an industrial economy and heavy population which has no laws to adequately protect borrowers, our state has become the last frontier for loan shark operations," said McVey, who is head of the finance law division of the Attorney General's office.

"If the people of Texas approve Constitutional Amendment No. 4, the loan shark will be put out of business in our state," he added.

Amendment No. 4, which will be voted on at the Nov. 8 general election, would give the Legislature the authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum interest rates.

According to McVey, most of the loan shark operations in the State are managed or owned by out-of-state people or relatively new Texas residents.

Lack of effective regulatory laws in Texas permits loan sharks to make excellent returns on their money, McVey stated. "We estimate that a loan shark can take an original investment of only \$500 and increase it to \$12,000 in only one year. He is able to do this by charging interest rates that may range anywhere from 200 per cent per year to over 1,000 per cent per year," he added.

McVey said the Attorney General's office had learned that a loan shark has devised schemes which allow them to charge the borrower for the use of his own money. "After a small loan is refinanced the second or third time, the loan shark has fully recovered his investment and is able to charge the borrower for use of money never actually received," he says. "Naturally, the loan sharks do everything within their power to encourage the borrower to continue to refinance. Then, all too often, the borrower suddenly awakens to find himself trapped in a perpetual debt that is impossible to repay."

"Unless and until we have adequate laws to govern lenders, the State is practically powerless to effectively stop loan sharks. The first step to get such laws is for the voters to approve Amendment No. 4. If the Amendment is not approved, Texas will likely continue to be a loan shark haven for years to come," he concluded.

WORKING WITH WOOD

Some species of wood are naturally resistant to fungus attack and withstand decay for many years. However, it is only the hardwood of these species which is durable. The sapwood of all native trees decays readily. The durability of heartwood from certain trees is the result of toxic materials in the heartwood which make the wood undesirable to fungi. Also, since heartwood is drier than sapwood and the heartwood pores are filled with various deposits, the moisture and air conditions required for fungus growth are less favorable.

Fortunately, sapwood is easy to treat with wood preservatives since the cells are relatively open and free of deposits. Such treatment can make sapwood more durable than the naturally durable heartwood. The expense of preservative treatment should really be considered a saving, since properly treated wood will give effective service many times longer than untreated wood. To protect their investment, home builders should demand the treatment of all wood which is used in or near the ground line where conditions favorable to insect and fungus attack exist.

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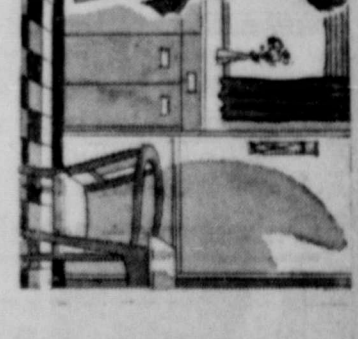
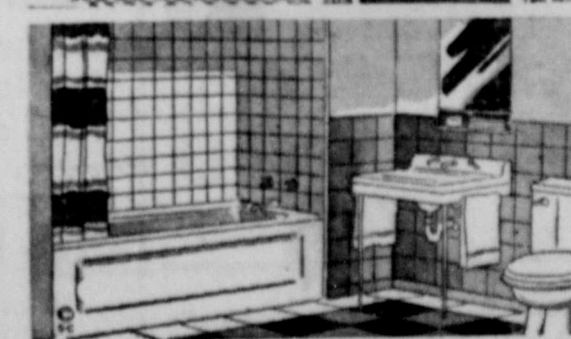
