"The VA does not endorse any product, project or commercial endeavor for the profit of individuals, organizations or corporations," Onstot said.

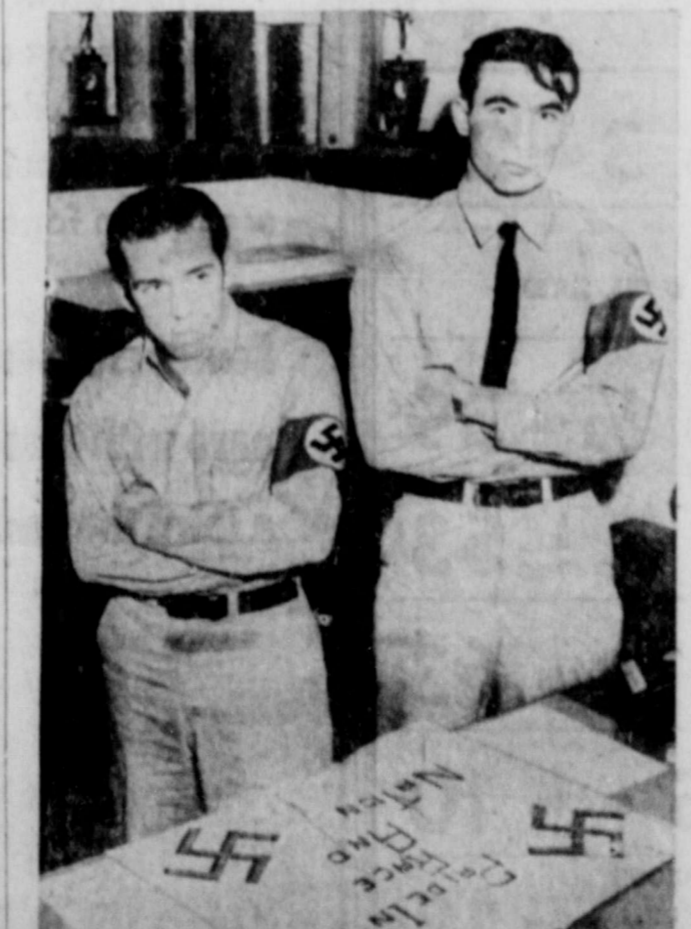

Lone Star Gas Retiree Recalls Company Band

Roy E. Payne recently retired from the Lone Star RCF Plant in Ranger after almost 38 years with the company.

Payne started to work for Chestnut and Smith on May 1, 1917 in Kelleyville, Oklahoma, when that plant was being built. In October he moved to Kiefer, Okla., as a leader on a loading rack. In January, 1918, he was made superintendent of the Kiefer loading rack. A year later, he transferred to Morris, Okla., in the same job.

He came to Ranger in January, 1923 as assistant superintendent of Chestnut and Smith's loading rack. Three years later he was made superintendent. In 1931, Payne bought Chestnut and Smith property January 1, 1931, and one year later Payne transferred to the RCF plant as a roustabout.

The retiree was born near Paris and his first job was with the Frisco railroad. He later served as an agent at a small station of Powderly, Texas. At 17, he was the youngest agent for the railroad.

During the 1920's Lone Star sponsored a band in the Ranger area. Payne was a member of this band which toured the central Texas area. The Band Director was A. J. Campbell. Other Lone Star employees who were in the band were Herman Dempsey, A. B. Baker, George Robinson and Vernon Deffebach. Also retired employees R. W. Gordon, Les Taylor and Ed Sanderson. The band was disbanded in the mid 20's.

Payne and the former Pamela Gray were married Sept. 17, 1917 in DeFoe, Okla. Mrs. Payne was raised near Paris and the two met when he was 17 and she was 15.

The Paynes have no children, but have a lot of relatives and plan to visit in New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona and all over Texas after his retirement.

Payne, who doesn't hunt, fish or play golf, said "The only thing I'm going to do is visit around and work in my garden," when commenting on his retirement plans.

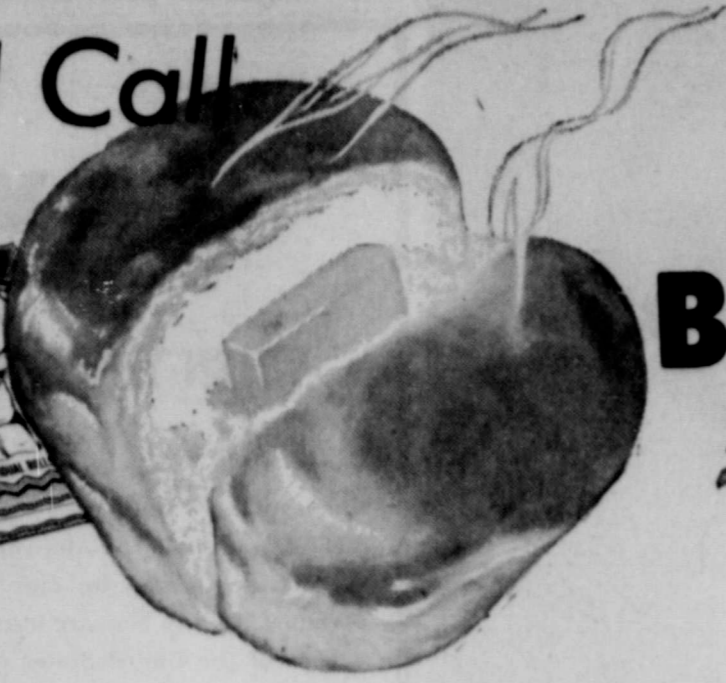
