

As I See Ranger

Ranger has been trying unsuccessfully for the past several years to get a Ranger representative in the County Commissioners Court. And after all these years they are finally going to have a representative in the Court. It's not that they have finally got one elected, but that one is going to become a near Ranger resident. J. B. (Tip) Arther, the present commissioner from this precinct, who resides at Morton Valley, and who Eastland calls theirs, is soon to become a resident of the Ranger area, according to our scouts.

According to our report, Arthur has recently purchased the Webb Ranch between Ranger and Olden, and plans to build a home on the property in the near future.

So at last Ranger will have their own County Commissioner, although this won't settle our problem, as Precinct 1 will still have only one commissioner, where by all rights they should have two.

With the end of deer season past in Eastland County and drawing to a close in surrounding areas deer hunting weather is just now beginning to catch up with the season. A last minute spurge of deer hunting has been taking place the past few days. Several additional kills have been made. A. H. Powell killed a six point buck Monday morning. L. H. Pounds got a six pointer Sunday morning and Fred Ellis got his buck Tuesday afternoon. The season closed yesterday in Eastland County, but will run through next Monday in the counties in the Possum Kingdom area. This includes Stephens, Palo Pinto and Erath. Quail season opened in Eastland County today.

There are some basketball officials who call a game rather close, but the officials that refereed the game at Comanche Tuesday night took the honors of calling the most fouls in one game that I have ever seen. In the B team game there were 51 fouls called and in the A game 46 fouls were called. Coach Bill Young took seven B team players and in the third quarter he was playing with four players. He had the two managers suit out and they played the entire fourth quarter. Ronnie Hinds, one of the managers, scored four points, in fact he was fourth highest scorer for Ranger. Douglas Brown was the other manager that suited out.

In the two games which was a total of 64 minutes of actual playing time, there were 97 fouls called. That is almost one and one-half per minute.

O. L. Cantrell Gets City Council Post

A good turn out of Ranger voters went to the poll Tuesday and selected O. L. Cantrell as their choice to fill the unexpired term of Hershell Angus on the City Commission.

Cantrell will serve as the Police and Fire Commissioner until April 30, 1961 which is the expiration date of the Place One Commissioner's term.

A total of 357 votes were cast in the specially-called election Tuesday. Cantrell received 272 votes and his opponent Carl Black, received 85 votes.

Angus' resignation was tendered due to his being transferred to Coleman by the Premier Oil and Refining Co.

Cantrell will be sworn in Monday, Dec. 5 by Mayor W. F. Creager, at the next regular meeting of the Ranger City Council.

Cantrell is owner and operator of the El Rancho Motel, and has lived in Ranger since 1941 except for a two year period that he was in South America. He formerly served as the city commission during the tenure of Mayor Dr. Calvin W. Harris.

Black, who was seeking his first term as a city official, is vice president and general manager of the Featherlite Corporation plant in Ranger. W. W. Paschall served as election judge.

The Colonel is the nephew of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Brown, 604 Pine, Ranger and has been a frequent visitor in Ranger. Neither officer had previously known of the other's connection with Ranger.

The award was the second consecutive time for Major Stovall's flight to win. The three flights in the squadron compete on such points as the effectiveness of their radar coverage on their patrol missions off the west coast of the United States and the training and department of all flight members. The 965th Squadron is one of three such squadrons flying the RC-121 "Warning Star" radar pick-it planes over the Pacific. Both officers recently participated in the successful recovery of the Discoverer 17 Satellite off the Hawaiian Islands.

Morrow tells Scouters that Character is Key to Success

The Annual Northeast District Scouter Banquet held at the National Guard Armory in Ranger Tuesday night, drew the largest turnout the annual affair has ever had, with over 100 guests being present.

The banquet is an annual event held each year honoring the Den Mothers, Cubmasters, Scoutmasters and Explorer Advisors from the four-county district.

The district has a total of 15 Cub Packs with 373 Cub Scouters; 24 Scout Troops with 422 Boy Scouts and seven Packs with 109 Explorer Scouts. There are several hundred adults that work directly and indirectly with these 46 units and 904 boys.

Jack Merrill of Breckenridge, District Chairman, was master of ceremonies. The Flag Ceremony and Pledge was conducted by Troop 15 of Ranger and a special Indian dance was performed by members of Scout Troop 10 of Ranger.

Bobby Morrow, noted track and Olympic star, was guest speaker. He was introduced by Coach

Jackson, Abilene Christian College track coach. Morrow gave a very inspirational talk on character building, and also a vivid account of the Olympic Games. His talk on character building stressed five points, self control and development of a healthy body, determination, spirit, sportsmanship and faith. He closed with a formula for success, which he said could be described in one word, "Character."

Morrow is one of only a few to ever win three gold medals for his country in the Olympic Games. A Scouters Key award was presented to James D. Horn of Eastland for his outstanding work in the scouting program.

The Ranger Bulldog basketball teams suffered two defeats by Comanche Tuesday night in Cisco. The B team was defeated 42 to 24 and the A team 42 to 28.

The Bulldogs, in suffering their first defeat of the season, still turned in an impressive game. Improvements were seen in all departments except the free throw percentage.

Dean Richey took the game scoring honors with 14 points even though he was fouled out in the fourth quarter. Johnny Wells was a defensive standout as he stole the ball from Comanche time and again with his quick deceptive defensive playing.

Ranger scored ten field goals out of 28 shots for a 35.6 percentage, but dropped only nine of 26 free throws. This is where Comanche got their big lead. They made 16 of 31 free shots.

Scoring for Ranger was Richey with 14, Wells with six, Henry, five, and Charlie De Los Santos, Edward Mendez and Bob Anderson, two each.

In the B team game Henry was the leading scorer with seven points and Arthur Mendez had six. Tommy Robinson, five, Kyge Edmonds, two and manager Ronnie Hinds, four.

The Bulldogs will meet Comanche in the Ranger gym in a return game Thursday night at 6:30 p.m. They will play Breckenridge here Friday night at 6:30 p.m.
