Social Security And Taxation

Hello Friends:

I shall consider it a pleasure to accordance with the wishes of the in doubt regarding your views, I shall ask you, through our newspapers, to express them by letter or otherwise." I shall consistently follow such procedure and will appreciate your cooperation in order that I may better serve you.

I herewith quote excerpts from Governor O'Daniel's address to the Legislature, January 17, 1941;

"I do not feel that it is nesessary in this message to debate the Committees question of whether or not the State should provide the necessary funds to aid dependent children, care for the blind, meet the State's obligation to teacher retirement. and pay old age pensions, because all of these things were submitted to the overeign voters of this State and the demand is written into the Constitution of this State that all of these obligations be met. So the question before the Legislature today is not "Shail these obligations be met?"-The question is: "How shall they be

"I should say that from my viewpoint, where a person has no in-come, he should receive at least thirty dollars per month from State and Federal Funds, because I think that amount in such a case can be definitely justified, to enable the old person to live in deperative that income be taken into consideration, such income should be supplemented to bring their nor mal income up to thirty dollars


