VA Announces Annual Dividend Refund to Vets

More than five million refunding participating GI insurance policies will share a \$258,500,000 annual policy dividend totaling \$258,500,000. Edward P. Quast, manager of Veterans Administration benefits office in Dallas, said today that these dividends are refunded to policyholders of their premium payments. The refunds are made up of GI policyholders who are to be lower than the rate which the premiums were issued by law. Dividends totaling \$246,000,000 will be paid to approximately 800,000 policyholders of Service Life Insurance who were designated in World War II. Some \$18,500,000 in it will be paid to approximately 200,000 policyholders of Service Life insurance who were designated in World War I. This is approximately 10 percent more in overall dividends than the amount being distributed during 1960. This increase is due to a higher interest earning rate from a new investment fund into effect last year. The 1961 individual policy dividends will not be materially different from the 1960 dividend. Some policies the extra interest offset by a decrease in some of the other dividend factors. The dividends will be paid as soon as possible after the 1961 anniversary date each policy was issued. On that date, both term and permanent plan participating NSLI and USGLI policyholders will receive dividends. As the payment of dividends is automatic, policyholders will receive the dividends sooner if they do not delay the processing by making advance individual inquiries, he added.

And the man? Mr. Murdock. Old, white-haired Mr. Murdock, who lived just across our driveway. That same Mr. Murdock who was so proud that his grandchildren were coming to visit; who urged his wife to bake cookies so he could sit out in the front yard and give them to the children who passed. That same Mr. Murdock who whittled rock-shooters and whistles for my four brothers. Sure that it couldn't be the truth, I asked the visiting daughter. Yes, it was true, but Daddy "wasn't" really a violent man. Just with colored people. She, her date, others had told him the child meant no harm. To that day she took all the blame. "I know better than to talk to Negro children", she said, "but it seemed cruel to throw away popcorn when he was standing there".

From that moment on, I was deathly afraid of Mr. Murdock. I'd eaten my last cookie from the Murdock kitchen. When a brother brought home another carved toy, I was deeply relieved that Mr. Murdock hadn't carved on the child.

This fear was considered un-reasoning by all the adults I knew. Not one of them would admit that a man capable of enough violence to half kill any child was potentially dangerous to all children. They said of him: he wouldn't hurt anyone. Anyone? What about that child? Oh, he was a Negro. The way a white

man treats a Negro is no key to his character.

However, teen-agers are a breed unto themselves. Not still a-jelly as few children, they are not yet hate-filled adults. In a town where whites were clearly out numbered, most high school students professed good will toward all. Since they are new parents themselves, I hope they haven't changed drastically since we were in school.

The jellied salad with its garden-fresh vegetables can be chilled until firm in a decorative mold or in the mixing bowl in which it was assembled. If the latter method is used, the salad does not require unmolding and may be spooned into lettuce leaves at meal time. Unflavored gelatine dissolves the relish-type vegetables into harmonious unity.

**Perfection Salad**

1 envelope unflavored gelatine 1/4 cup finely shredded cabbage  
 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup diced celery  
 1 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup diced green pepper or pimiento  
 1 1/2 cups cold water, divided 1/2 cup vinegar or lemon juice

Mix together gelatine, sugar and salt in a saucepan. Stir in 1/4 cup of the cold water. Place over medium heat, stirring constantly, until gelatine and sugar are dissolved. Remove from heat; stir in remaining 1/2 cup water, vinegar or lemon juice. Chill until mixture is the consistency of unbroken egg white. Fold in cabbage, celery and green pepper. Turn into a 6 cup mold or individual molds. Chill until firm. If desired, unmold on salad greens; serve with mayonnaise. Yield: 6 servings.

NOTE: If desired shredded carrot may be substituted for the cabbage. Diced cucumber may be substituted for all or half the celery.
