Year's Hunting Season End Is Nearing It was a short hunting season, after all! Most of it will be over in a little more than a week. The deer season, already ended in Eastland county, will end for the entire state Dec. 31. The quail season will end in the Trans-Pecos area, and in a number of individual counties, Dec. 31. Eastland County hunters will have until January 16 to complete their quail hunting and counties in the Possum Kingdom area will have until Jan. 20. Duck season will end Dec. 30. G o o s e season will continue through January 8. Javelina season will be over Dec. 31 in most of the counties covered under the general laws which have closed season on the javelinas. Turkey season will end Dec. 31 throughout the state. In most of the counties under general laws the quail season will continue through Jan. 16. It will be best to check with your local game warden on open counties.

Labor Department Warns Against School Dropout

Quitting high school can cost a young man a lot of money. His future earnings drop by thousands of dollars. So says the U. S. Department of Labor, in a report released today. The report, based on a study of high school dropouts and graduates who terminated their schooling between 1952 and 1957. Four thousand youths were interviewed in seven communities across the nation. The majority of girls graduates found jobs in offices, whereas girl dropouts were more likely to be employed as waitresses or in other unskilled work. According to the study, graduates advanced at a swifter rate into more highly skilled jobs. The new Labor Department publication, which follows an earlier and less detailed report published this spring by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, noted that dissatisfaction with school, (including boredom with school subjects, dislike of teachers, and other general complaints) was the single major reason given by both girls and boys for dropping out of high school. The second most important reason for girls was marriage; for boys it was "to go to work."

Mr. Mitchell said industrial and technological advancement today and in the next decade calls for more skill and training on the part of workers. But many young people will not be sufficiently trained for the kind of work that society needs to have done. He said the study found that a great majority of both graduates, and dropouts have no plans for future education or specialized training. When asked what kind of work they would most like to do, they mentioned, with few exceptions, jobs which were already within reach. A similar pattern of wage difference existed among the girls. Nearly 40 percent of the girl dropouts earned less than \$40 a week, compared with 14 percent of the graduates. Nearly half the girl graduates were in the \$50 to \$79 wage bracket, while only 16 percent of the dropouts were in this category. Unemployment among the boys was three times greater for dropouts than for graduates, and among the girls it was four times greater.

Ranger Gets Near Half Inch of Rain Wednesday

A slow drizzle which began Wednesday around noon and continued intermittently through early Thursday morning, and laced with light sleet early Wednesday night, increased the December rainfall another .45 of an inch. Temperatures which reached the upper 40's Wednesday, took a sudden drop late Wednesday afternoon, but leveled off at two degrees above freezing Wednesday night. Total rainfall for the month now stands at approximately 2.60 inches, better than an inch above normal for the month. The weatherman says that intermittent light rain or drizzle will continue to fall through Friday.

Questionnaires On Income Must Be Answered by Vets

Veterans and dependents of deceased veterans on the Veterans Administration rolls and parents of deceased veterans receiving dependency and indemnity compensation are urged by the VA to complete and return promptly the income questionnaires they receive with their December pension checks. The completed cards must be returned to the VA not later than January 31, or, under law, payments must be discontinued. Edward P. Ostler, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas said today.

Population Trend Shows Movement To City Areas

As the year 1960 comes to its end, population trends in Texas confirmed by the Federal decennial census have now been given some study and evaluation. What the findings in general add up to are that the thinly populated, open-country areas of the State are becoming even more thinly populated while more people are flocking to counties which are already thickly populated. Over-all, in round numbers, the total Texas population increased from 7,700,000 in 1950 to 9,500,000 in 1960, a rate of growth amounting to 23 per cent against the national increase of 17 per cent. Only two states outstripped the 1,800,000 gain in Texas: California, which had an increase of about 2,000,000, and Florida, which grew by slightly more than 2,000,000.

But despite the over-all gain in Texas, 144 out of the State's 254 counties showed losses in population. This was an approximate follow-up of trends established in the decade from 1940 to 1950, with the losses in total population confined largely to counties which have no sizeable towns or cities and which offer little in the way of industry. However, there were some exceptions to the movement away from rural counties. Some of these counties, mainly in West Texas and in the Panhandle, showed steady gains in population. In general, these were counties which have developed farming by irrigation, are devoted largely to cotton and grain cultivation, and have resources of oil and gas.

Three of the older, comparatively thickly settled counties showed the heaviest losses in population. These were Lamar County in Northeast Texas, which lost 9,000 during the decade, Hill and Fannin counties in the old Blackland Belt, which lost 8,000 and 7,600 respectively. Then there were Rusk, Red River, Navarro, Cherokee, Falls and Limestone counties, all of which had losses of at least 5,000.

The trend of the past two decades projects an outlook something along these lines: Rural counties that are in fairly close range of future job opportunities probably will hold their populations at a fairly stable level. Suburban and open country areas not far removed from work opportunities can expect to grow fairly rapidly. However, until the anticipated population explosion actually arrives, open-country, strictly rural counties far removed from industrial areas may become even more rural before growth overflows in their direction.

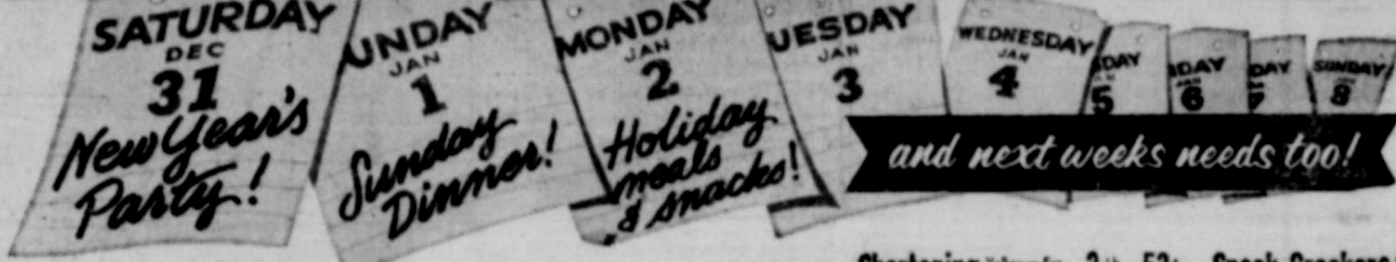

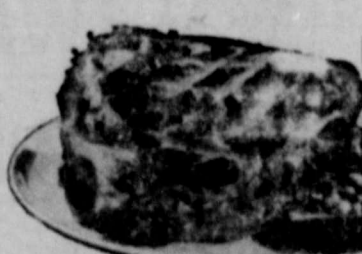

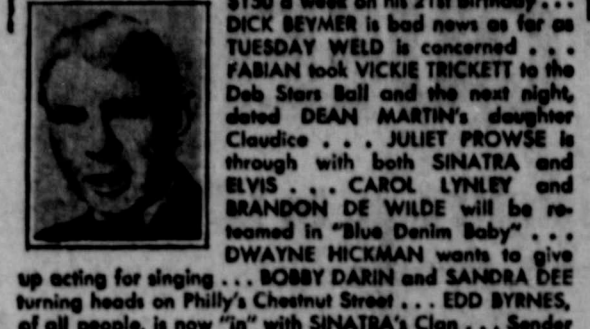

papers in your safe deposit box, but make a list of those papers and a brief summary of their contents to put in your home file.
3. Get for your files copies of birth certificates for all members of the family, and add them to the file. Add your marriage license or at least a statement as to when and where you were married and by whom.
4. Insert your will or a copy of it. If your will is kept elsewhere, include a note telling where it may be found.
5. During the year, put into the file your income tax withholding statements and receipts for expenditures which may be deductible. Then keep a copy of each year's tax return in the file.
6. Make a list of all the stocks and bonds you own and where they are.
7. List all the places you have lived and worked and the names of persons there who you know. Include the schools you have attended and the dates you left or were graduated.
8. If you may have benefits com-

ing under a profit-sharing plan where you work, make a note of that too.

If you're in doubt about whether an item should be included, put it in.

This takes time initially, but it will save you both time and worry in the long run.

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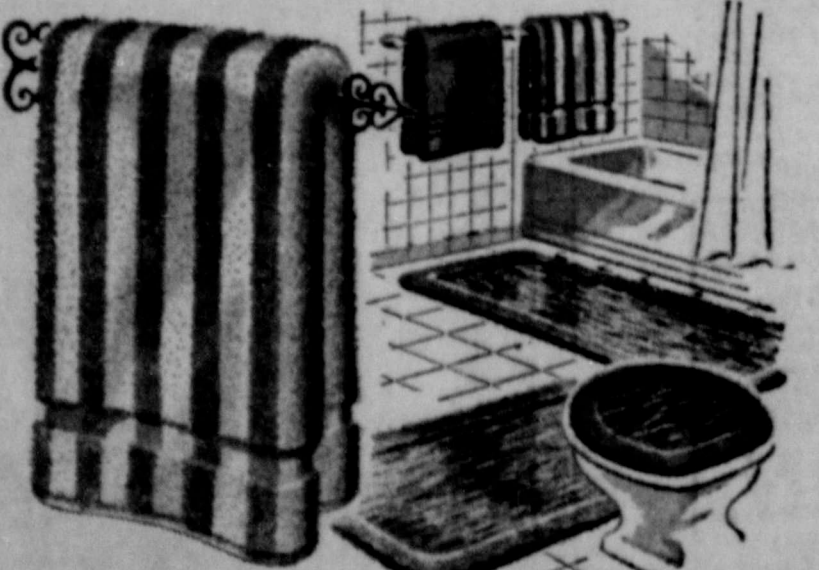
