City and Water District Taxes Due by Jan. 31

City of Ranger and Eastland County Water Supply District Taxes are due not later than Tuesday, January 31, according to an announcement from the City of Ranger.

Taxes not paid prior to January 31 will be charged with a penalty and interest of six percent if paid in February, and penalty and eight percent in March, penalty and 10 percent in April and after April, a penalty and 12 percent interest will be charged.

Both the City taxes and Water District taxes are payable at the City Hall.





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
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Eastland Woman Guest Speaker At Study Club
