checking other entries on the return, taxpayers should double-check to make sure that social security numbers are complete and accurate.
"Social security numbers are required whether or not this type of tax has actually been paid or whether the taxpayer is subject to such taxes. When overpayments of social security taxes occur, due to job change, computation space is provided for the application of the overpayment to any income tax owed or to obtain a refund."

of Texas citizens feel the same way. We are only asking a chance to be heard."

Sealy said that by adoption of the sales tax, the state would be able to give a \$800-a-year salary increase for public school teachers, adequate support for higher education and medical aid for persons receiving Old Age Assistance.

"We are opposed to unnecessary taxes. But in this case, we are willing to face up to the fact that the state must have additional revenue, and that the only equitable long-range solution to the State's financial problems is a sales tax."

He said a sales tax would preserve a good climate for industrial development of the state and at the same time would grow with the economy, thus eliminating additional tax levies every year or two.

Sealy said members of the 31-member executive committee would serve as supervisors in a county-by-county organization in each of the state senatorial districts. Information explaining the advantages of a sales tax over other types of tax plans will be distributed through county organizations in the near future.

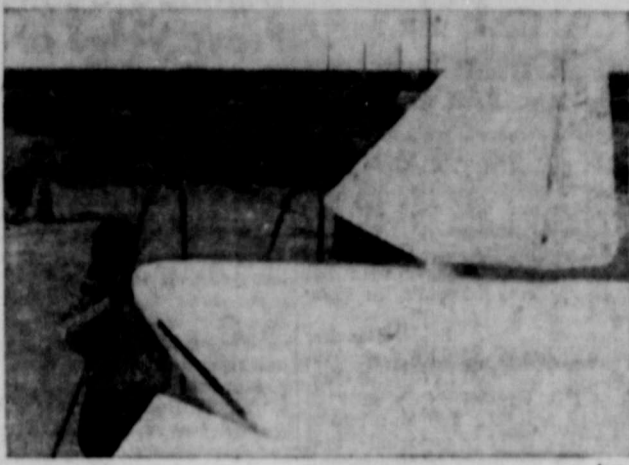
AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

An immediate attack on the vital short range operating credit problem for farmers, along with a more favorable prospect for cotton producers, are the two major developments of the new Kennedy-Johnson administration anticipated for the near future by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Orville L. Freeman and renegotiation of Federal-State cooperative agreements, Commissioner White found the attitude of the new agricultural team in Washington both realistic and enthusiastic.

"It was my impression," said White, "that Secretary Freeman and his assistants are demonstrating a profound sense of obligation to agriculture. They are sincere in their determination to help the family-size farmer to maintain a reasonable standard of living and to stand on his own feet.

"As a group, I found them to be highly intelligent and quite young. Their average age is probably 49 or 41 years. They are coldly real-

istic about our farm problems—that is, they are fully aware there is no panacea which can be instituted to provide any quick or easy solutions. At the same time, they are enthusiastic in their approach to the job."

White said he was impressed by John Baker, the new farm credit administrator, and his grasp of both the short range and long range credit problem of American farmers. ABOUT YOU, HEALTH

Texas deaths during 1960 showed the most substantial increase in 25 years according to provisional estimate compiled by the records and Statistics Section.

Deaths for 1960 were seven percent above the 1959 figures with comparative death rates of 821.2 per 100,000 population for 1960; and 782.9 deaths per 100,000 for 1959.

Over two-thirds of the increase in Texas deaths occurred the first three months of 1960. This was during the peak period of last year's influenza outbreak.

Health Department statisticians point out that during the first three months last year, there were significant increases in the number of deaths from influenza, pneumonia, and heart diseases over the corresponding period during the previous year.

Because of the rapidly increasing number of elders in the State population, Texas authorities were not alarmed at the sharp rise in Texas deaths reflecting the overall trend for the entire United States during 1960, including the startling increases experienced during the early months.

Still the number-one killer, heart disease, accounted for 26,000 of the total 79,000 deaths in Texas during 1960.

In second place on the 1960 statistical sheets, was malignant neoplasms (cancer), which claimed over 11,000 Texas lives.

On the credit side was the noticeable drop in the motor vehicle accident death rate from 26.9 per 100,000 in 1959 to 24.5 per 100,000 population in 1960. All other accidents showed a slight

rise in the death rate over the preceding year.

While the total number of live births for a single year was the second highest in history the birth rate continued its slight decline over the past few years.

There were nearly 249,000 live births in 1960. However, there were 7,200 infant and 4,200 fetal deaths during the same period. (A weekly feature from Public Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

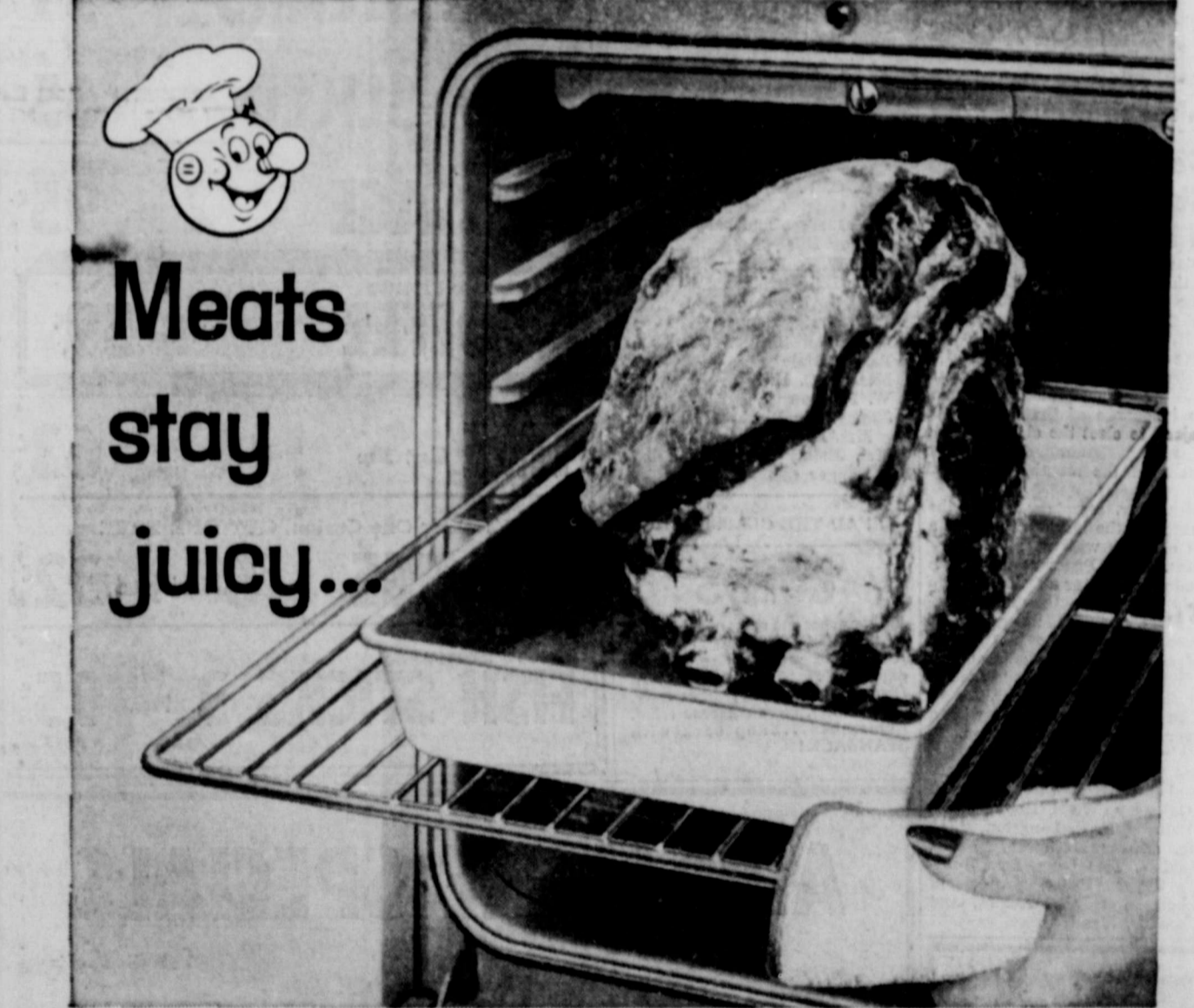

IT'S THE LAW in Texas
of the State Bar of Texas

In the past a person could lose his citizenship largely because he wanted to; but of late one could lose it against his will by "expatriation."

Before 1900 the courts said: "No persons can be their own act, without the government's consent, put off their allegiance, and become aliens."

In 1870 the U. S. and Great Britain, and later with Germany, agreed that naturalization in the one nation meant loss of citizenship in the other. Soon afterwards, courts also held that a citizen could give up U. S. citizenship at will, and the next question was when it could be taken away.

Under a 1907 federal law, certain acts could mean expatriation: one's swearing allegiance to a foreign nation; a woman's marrying an alien, a naturalized citizen living abroad for a certain number of years.

In 1949 (later amended in 1952) the U. S. broadened the laws to cover new acts that could deprive one of his citizenship.

1. By willing foreign military service. One citizen in Japan before World War II was drafted in the Japanese army. After the war, the U. S. tried to take away his citizenship, but the court said no. The citizen must have served willingly; if he were forced into Japanese service, no one could take away his citizenship.

2. By voting in a foreign election. One U. S. citizen voted in a Mexican election (as Mexican law permitted). The U. S. took away his citizenship.

Why? By voting a citizen may encourage conduct against the U. S. interests.

3. By treason or desertion in war time. But in one such case the Supreme Court found expatriation so severe as to be "cruel and unusual" punishment in violation of the Constitution.

4. There are other acts which endanger one's citizenship such as leaving the country to evade military service in time of national emergency.

"And baseball has been and still is a vital part of our lives," Mrs. Smith said. Smith's participation in baseball affairs has continued through the years, and he has headed professional teams at both Ranger and Midland. The Smiths seldom miss a home game as long as Midland had a pro team.

After leaving Durant, Mr. and Mrs. Smith resided in Lindsey, Okla., where they operated a mercantile store. They next moved to Ringling, also in Oklahoma where they saw their first alfalfa.

It was not too long after this that they departed Oklahoma for Texas, moving to Ranger to establish a ready-to-wear store in 1918.

They remained in Ranger for 18 years before moving their popular store to Midland, March 11, 1936. The J. C. Smith Co. store in Midland became one of the best and most favorably known ladies' and men's clothing stores in the Permian Basin Empire. Both Mr. and Mrs. Smith were active in business, which opened in a 25-foot front location on main st. The store later was doubled in size. The Smiths retired in 1950, after selling their store and its stock to Grammer-Murphy.

Through the years, Smith has been active in civic and service club affairs. He was a charter member of the Ranger Rotary Club and was an active Rotarian during his business career days in Midland. He is a former director of the Midland Chamber of Commerce and has been associated with other civic groups and activities in Midland.

Their son James, a prominent Midland attorney and civic leader was born in Pauls Valley, Okla.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith also reared her brother, Ray Trammell of Midland, and sister, Mrs. A. C. Gallagher of Dallas. She also has two other brothers, W. W. Trammell of California and Earl E. Trammell of Oklahoma.

Demonstrations Prove Value of Soil Testing

A group of Cherokee county corn growers know that fertilizing according to soil test recommendations doesn't cost but pays. The farmers, cooperating with county Agricultural Agent Steve Lilly, conducted demonstrations last year on their farms to compare yields from plots fertilized according to soil test recommendations and from others where usual rates of fertilizer were used.

In a summary report, from Lilly to W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, the value of soil testing for determining fertilizer needs was definitely proven. From the plots which were fertilized according to the farmer's choice, an average of 48.7 bushels of corn an acre was harvested at a cost of \$8.40 an acre for plant food. Corn fertilized according to soil test recommendations produced at the rate of 63.4 bushels and fertilizer costs averaged \$14.70 an acre.

By following the soil test recommendations, 13 e demonstrators produced an extra 14.7 bushels of corn from the additional \$5.77 an acre spent for fertilizer above their usual rate of application.

With corn figured at \$1.25 a bushel, Bennett said the extra corn meant an additional \$18.38 an acre income. Since the soil test cost \$2.00 and the extra fertilizer \$5.77, they should be deducted, Bennett said. The result — a nice profit of \$12.61 an acre—in favor of the soil test.

On a 20-acre corn crop, the chemist pointed out, the use of soil test recommendations could mean an additional \$250 profit, a significant sum in these days of the ever-tightening cost-price squeeze.

Wards plans to add to their service department in the near future. They plan to install an automobile drive-in service in the rear of the store. This addition will add greatly to customer convenience.

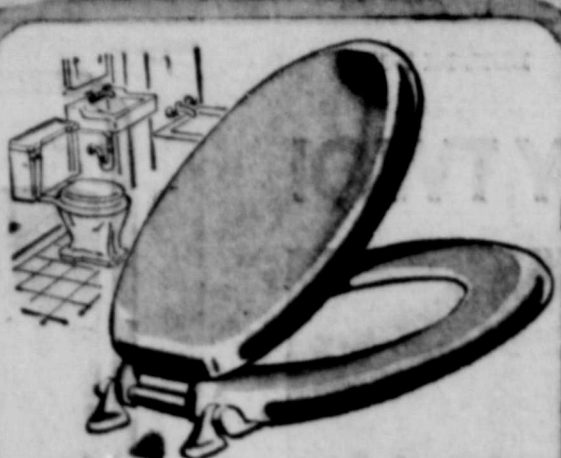

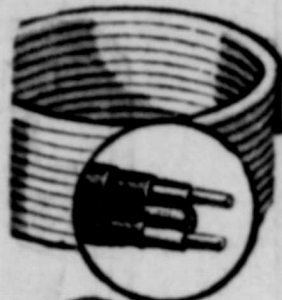

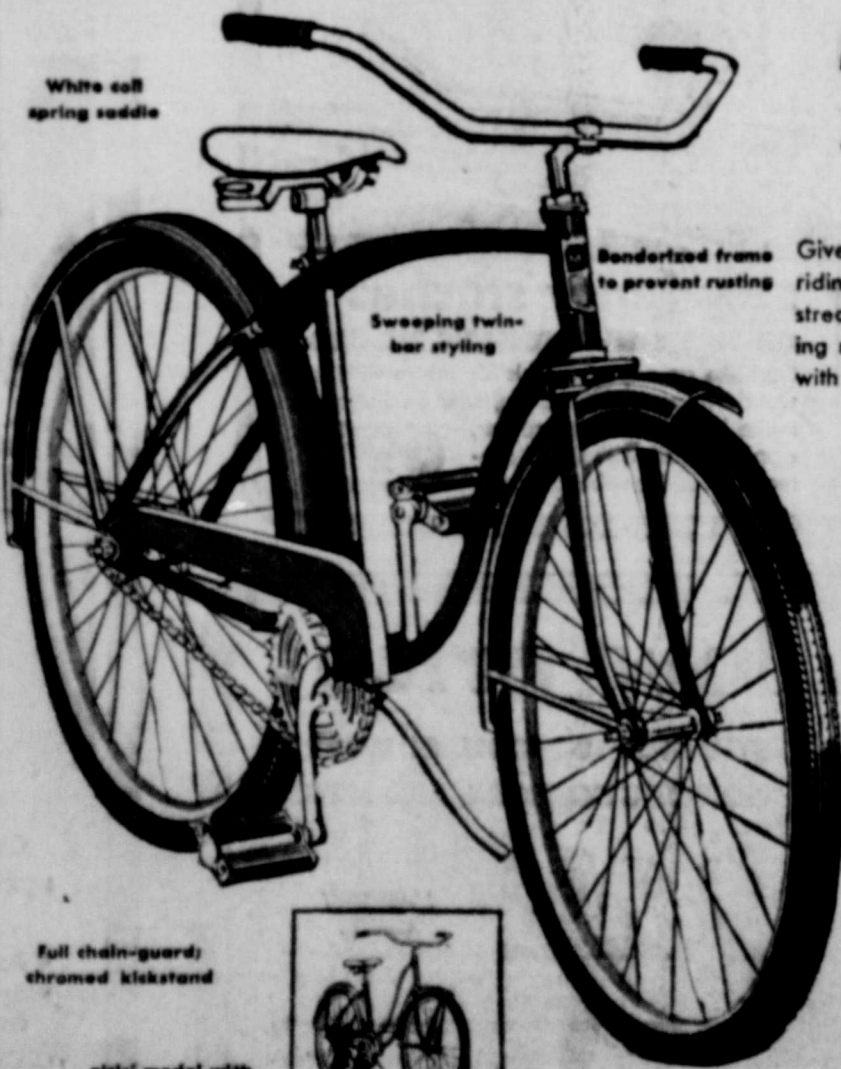
