There is only 30 days left in which to get your automobile registered. Jimmy Smith of the L & J Supply Company said that registration had been slow so far this year. Looking around town Monday, we noticed that less than one-third of the cars have new tags. Smith said that people should try to get their licenses early in order to avoid the last minute rush that is always present around March 31.

Ranger's good fire rating the past year has earned citizens a 5 percent credit or discount on their fire insurance premiums effective April 1, 1961.

The fire insurance rates are set by the State Insurance Commission, and a town can be charged as much as a 25 percent penalty or get as much as a 15 percent discount, according to their fire losses. The penalties and discounts are based on a five year basis.

Following the year of the Paramount Hotel and the theatre fires, Ranger was charged with a 25 percent fire insurance penalty. Since that period Ranger's penalty has steadily decreased until now they have a 5 percent discount.

Other ratings in the county show Eastland and Rising Star to have 10 percent discounts and Cisco to have a 5 percent penalty.

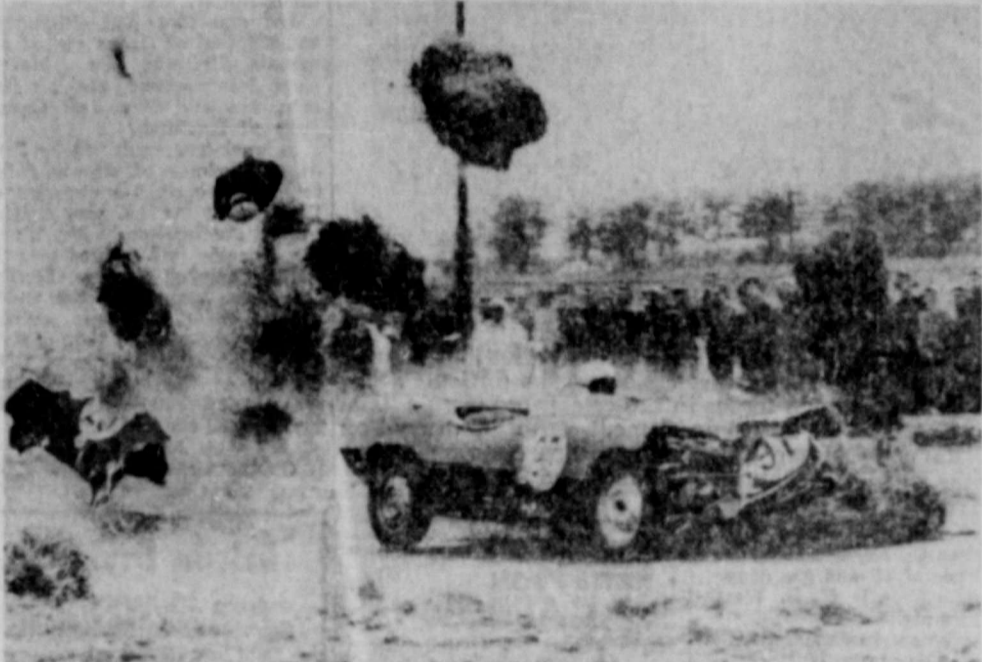
Interment was in Garden of Memories with Norris Funeral in charge of arrangements.

Wet country always puts a smile on a stockman's face. Ranchers since early days have kept their eyes on the clouds. If the rains come the grass will be good; if the rains fail the grass will be short. After experiencing both wet and dry modern conservation minded stockmen have learned the importance of watching the moisture in the ground instead of watching the clouds as what falls does not always help to grow grass.

Recent moisture checks around this area by Soil Conservation Service technicians show a basis for optimism toward a good crop of summer grass in 1961. At present we have more water stored in the soil than we have had at any time since March of 1958.

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Ralph Yarborough Report

A total of \$75,758,000 has been advanced in 75 federal loans to Texas colleges and universities over the past ten years to build housing for many thousand more

students. In addition, eleven more of the low interest rate college housing loans totaling \$12,973,000 have been approved.

This program has been vitally important in our effort to see that every capable Texan has an opportunity for higher education. But the program will have to be expanded if we are to have room in our colleges and universities

for the flood of additional students over the next ten years.

Total college enrollment in Texas now exceeds 165,000 students and is predicted to climb beyond 280,000 by 1970. National college enrollment of 3.4-million students today is expected to climb to 6-million students by 1970.

Not only must our colleges greatly increase housing facilities, they will have to build many more classrooms, laboratories, libraries and otherwise enlarge all their facilities. In many cases, it is indicated that physical plants will be needed in Texas almost twice the size of our current college plants.

With this tremendous need for college facilities for young Texans facing us today, I'm strongly convinced that we must have governmental action at both the state and national levels to meet the need. It is my hope that the Governor and the State Legislature will move immediately to meet this need. I will cooperate with them for action at the national level.

As a member of the United States Senate Education Subcommittee, I am author of a bill providing for loans and grants to colleges and universities to build academic facilities, that is classrooms, laboratories and other academic facilities as distinguished from dormitories for the students to live in. This bill I am sponsoring is in harmony with the recommendations made by President Kennedy's task force just a few weeks ago. Many educators believe it is a vital step toward fulfilling our American goal of higher education for every youth who can benefit from higher education.

Two years ago, a survey of leading Texas business men and industrial firms showed that 65 per cent of their top management and research personnel were educated in out-of-state schools. I believe that most Texans will agree that there is no excuse for training our young people in Texas to be the hired-hands while

other states are training the bosses. We must move this year to improve our higher educational facilities so that young Texans will have a major role, not the hired-hand assignment, in the building of a better Texas.

ABOUT YOUR HEALTH

AUSTIN — Credit Bull Moser Teddy Roosevelt for starting what still stands as one of the most vital single phases of personal health protection. As President in 1908 he ordered periodic health examinations for all army officers.

A "periodic check-up" is simply a careful medical study of a presumably healthy person, performed regularly by the family physician to detect or body malfunction in an early stage. Early treatment reduces suffering and prevents some diseases from becoming chronic, and perhaps incurable.

Besides detecting disease before it becomes too deep-rooted, the check-up serves as a basis for better health practices for the patient and his family. The physician can discuss such problems as diet, exercise, rest, work and play habits, and other activities which affect health.

How often and what type examination should be given varies with the patient's age, sex, occupation, heredity, past health, place of residence, and economic status. Says the American Academy of Pediatrics:

"The normally healthy infant should be checked about every six weeks during the first year, every three months during the second year, and once a year from the sixth to twelfth year."

Most medical authorities believe that from about 12 to age 40 or 45, annual health check-ups are adequate. After 45 some doctors advise examinations every nine months. These time schedules, keep in mind are suggested for normal people without previous serious or chronic illness.

No single examination can be applied to all persons, but all check-ups include a medical history, the actual physical examination, and may include certain laboratory and x-ray procedures as determined to be necessary.

The medical history gives the physician clues as to what he should be especially alert for when he begins the examination. It will include such things as social and occupational habits, past illnesses, present symptoms. Armed with this advance knowledge the physician can frequently detect the possibility of disease long before abnormal physical signs become apparent to the patient.
