

## Johnny Wells On Second Team

### Dean Richey Makes All-District Team

District 7-AA coaches met at Coleman Wednesday night and picked the All-District Basketball team.

The Bulldogs' Dean Richey was a unanimous choice on the coaches' first team selections. Richey is a repeater from last year's All-District team and also made the All-Area selection last season. Other members of the first team were: Bill Jones and John Bigby of Hallinger, Jerry Dunn of Winters, David Callerman of Cisco and Dale Greaves of Coleman.

Picked for the second team selection were Johnny Wells of Ranger, the only sophomore on the two teams, Eugene Halfman and Tommy Pleasant of Hallinger, Darrell Holt of Cisco, William

Grissom of Winters and Mike Hayes of Coleman.

Richey led the district in scoring. He netted an average of 19 points per game in the ten district games. There was only one time during district play that Richey didn't hit the double figures and on one occasion he netted nine points. On one other occasion he had an off night and scored only 11 points. Other than these two nights he hit better than 17 points each game. The high game during district play was a 29-point performance against the district champs, Hallinger, when he netted 29 points. Richey was also outstanding on the defensive backboard, getting more than his share of the rebounds.

Aside from being a constant threat when he played under the baskets, he was capable of (and did) play out front in the play-making position. A majority of the time he alternated between high post and baseline on offense, and played the middle man on zone defense.

## Community Chest Plans Revealed

Dr. Charles Gann, acting president of the Ranger Community Chest, reported that the re-organization meeting held recently produced two amendments to the constitution of the organization.

An amendment was passed by the group to change the name of the organization from Ranger Community Chest to the Ranger United Fund.

Another amendment was passed to expand the Board of Directors from seven members to 21 members. The present Board of Directors includes one each from each of the seven asking agencies. The new amendment calls for one board member from each of seven service and civic clubs in Ranger, and for seven others to be selected from Ranger at large.

The amendment calls for the members to serve three year terms with seven retiring each year. Under the proposed setup seven of the new board members will serve only one year and seven will serve two years.

The present seven board members are acting as a nominating committee to nominate the 14 new board members to be selected. The Board of Directors of the new United Fund will act as a planning body to plan and direct the annual campaign.

The next meeting has been called for Tuesday, March 7, at which time the new directors will be selected and an election of officers will be held for this year's campaign.

The re-organized group plans to hold regular meetings in order to be ready to conduct this year's campaign in a more organized manner.

## Ranger College Above State Average Growth

An audit submitted to Gov. Price Daniel, by C. H. Cavness, State Auditor shows Ranger College to be well above the State average in growth in Junior Colleges in Texas.

The state average is 5.9 percent increase. Ranger College has an 18.2 percent increase in enrollment.

Ranger College increased from 126 to 149 full-time student equivalents. The full-time student equivalents is based on the number of semester hours taught in approved courses.

Four other schools, located at San Angelo, Odessa, Uvalde and Big Spring, have fallen below the statewide average growth of 5.9 percent.

## Ranger Classroom Teachers To Host County Association

The Eastland County unit of the Texas State Teachers Association will be guests of the Ranger Classroom Teachers Association on Monday, March 6, at 7:30 p.m. in the Ranger High School Auditorium. Guest speaker will be Jennings H. Flathers of Amarillo. He was the South Central Regional Director of the NEA Department of Classroom Teachers for 1957-60. A Texan by birth, Flathers attended school in Texas, Arkansas, and Oklahoma, and returned to Texas to finish his secondary education in Canadian.

Flathers entered West Texas State Teachers College in Canyon, but the advent of World War II called a temporary halt to his education. In 1944 he went to Europe

as a member of the 355th Fighter Group, a segment of the Eighth Air Force. After receiving his discharge in 1945, he resumed his studies and completed work on his master's degree at the University of Colorado in 1946. Since that time, Flathers has done additional graduate work at the University of Denver, and at the University of Southern California. He was a teacher of speech and drama at Amarillo High School.

A long record of service to his professional organizations preceded Flathers' election to his new position as NEA Field Representative, but the advent of World War II called a temporary halt to his education. In 1944 he went to Europe

## Internal Revenue Announces Tests For Tax People

M. O. Tesson, Special Enrollment Examination Coordinator for the Dallas District, Internal Revenue Service, announced today that he now has available application forms for persons, other than attorneys and Certified Public Accountants, who wish to take qualifying examinations for practice before the Treasury Department.

The 1961 Special Enrollment tests will be given on September 27 and 28. Applications can be obtained from M. O. Tesson, P. O. Box 594, Dallas, Texas.

Applications must be mailed to the Director of Practice, Internal Revenue Service, Washington 25, D. C., before August 1, 1961. A fee of \$25 must be paid with the application.

Tesson stated that generally speaking graduation from college and/or four years of practical accounting experience will qualify applicants to take the examination. He cautioned those interested to carefully read Circular 230 which he sends to each applicant along with the examination application blank. Internal Revenue cannot return the \$25 fee to applicants who do not qualify for the examination.

Enrollment is required of persons wishing to represent clients in tax matters before the Department, and in certain other actions.

## Students Advised To Submit SSCQT Applications Now

Applications for the April 27, 1961 administration of the College Qualification Test are now available at Selective Service System local boards throughout the country.

Eligible students who intend to take this test should apply at once to the nearest Selective Service local board for an application and a bulletin of information.

Following instructions in the bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided to Selective Service Examining Section, Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 586, Princeton, New Jersey. Applications for the April 27 test must be postmarked no later than midnight, April 6, 1961.

According to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once. Test results will be reported to the student's Selective Service local board of jurisdiction for use in considering his deferment as a student.

## Austin Report

Things began to happen quickly as a number of controversial issues began to make their way toward the House Calendar. The so-called "Race-horse Bill" got a favorable report from its subcommittee on Constitutional Amendments. It is reported that some members who oppose race-horse gambling voted for the amendment so that it would come out on the floor for further debate. If it passes both houses of the Legislature, it would then go to voters of Texas for final approval in 1962.

As a member of the Committee on Private and Municipal Corporations, I heard a debate on House Bill No. 3 by Representative Dungan of McKinney. This Bill relates to the regulation of "novation by citizens and towns. H. B. 3 represents a compromise between the large cities and the small towns. During the hearing it was brought out that in some cases cities had reached out and annexed farm-land several miles from the city and had caused farm-land to be taxed the same as city property. H. B. 3 would help to insure more responsibility in this respect. The Farm Bureau favored the Bill because of its importance to the economy of rural families. The Bill was referred to a 5 man sub-committee of which I was appointed a member. We will hear other testimony before taking final action on the measure.

As the 67th Session nears its second month, nearly 600 Bills have been introduced. Among some of the latest are: H. B. 399 by Representative James of Dallas, allowing Legislators who fail to run again or who are defeated in primaries to retain membership on interim Committees until their term expires; H. B. 389 by Representative Sandahl, bringing the Pure Food and Drug Law up to date; H. B. 404 by Representative Spears, allowing micro-filming of County records; H. B. 440 by Representative Buchanan, the Bill which didn't quite make it last time making gas producers sell to the landowner for irrigation purposes.

The ladies really marched on the Capitol last week in support of a Constitutional Amendment that would help them to attain more rights. They were out in force to push for passage of SJR No. 4. It was heard and sent to a Sub-committee last Wednesday night. I am pleased that this little column has been read by so many people lately. It is sent to all the newspapers and the radio station in the 76th Representative District. Sometimes I don't make the deadline on sending it but I wish to thank all of the News People for their helpfulness in helping me to better inform you folks back home.

## Texas Electric Joins In 'Super Line' Project

Texas Electric Service Company and three other major investor-owned electric utility companies operating in Texas today announced plans for the joint construction of a "super power" electrical transmission line between Houston and Fort Worth-Dallas area. The companies are Texas Electric Service company, Texas and Light Company, Dallas Power and Light Company and the Lighting and Power Company.

It also was announced that this line will connect with similar high-voltage lines which Texas Electric Service Company will build from Fort Worth to the Permian Basin area in West Texas and Texas Power and Light Company will build a new plant site south of the Red River.

These lines will more firmly link together 6,500,000 kilowatts of electric power generating capability of the four companies into one of the nation's largest and strongest reservoirs of power. The four utility companies have a total of 27 steam-electric generating plants.

These projects will provide Texas with a super high-voltage "power highway," stretching some 800 miles from the Permian Basin through the Fort Worth-Dallas area to Houston and from the Red River.

The new lines will benefit service users throughout a major portion of Texas. J. B. Thomas, president and general manager of Texas Electric Service Company, stated in making the announcement in Fort Worth.

Construction of the new super-transmission backbone—a 345,000 volt line extending from Houston to Fort Worth-Dallas area—will begin in 1962.

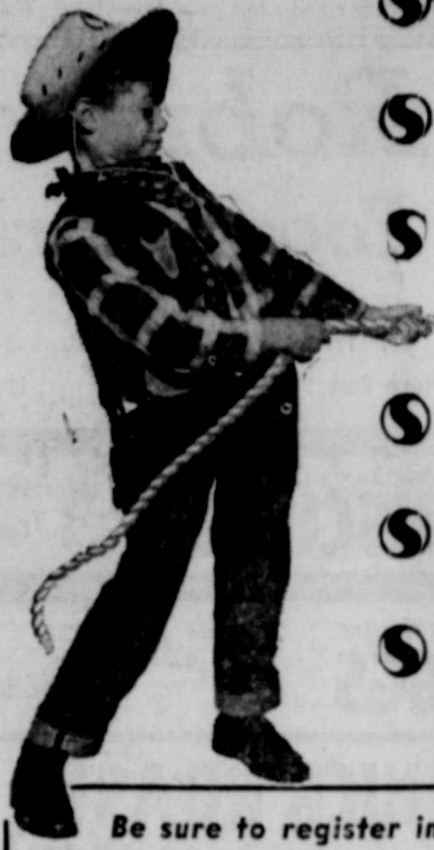

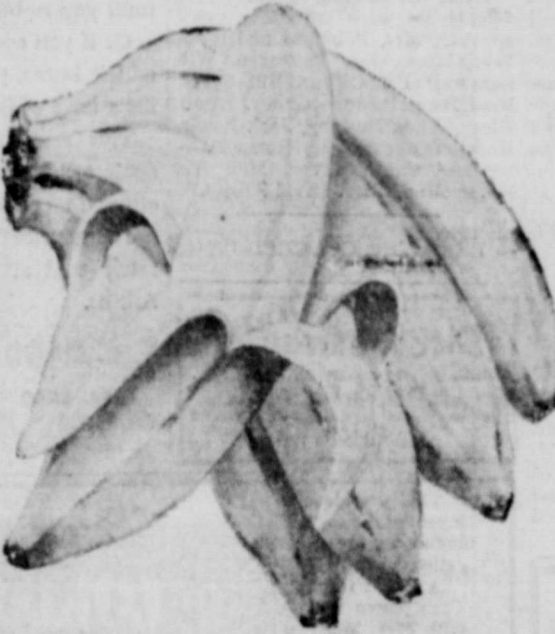

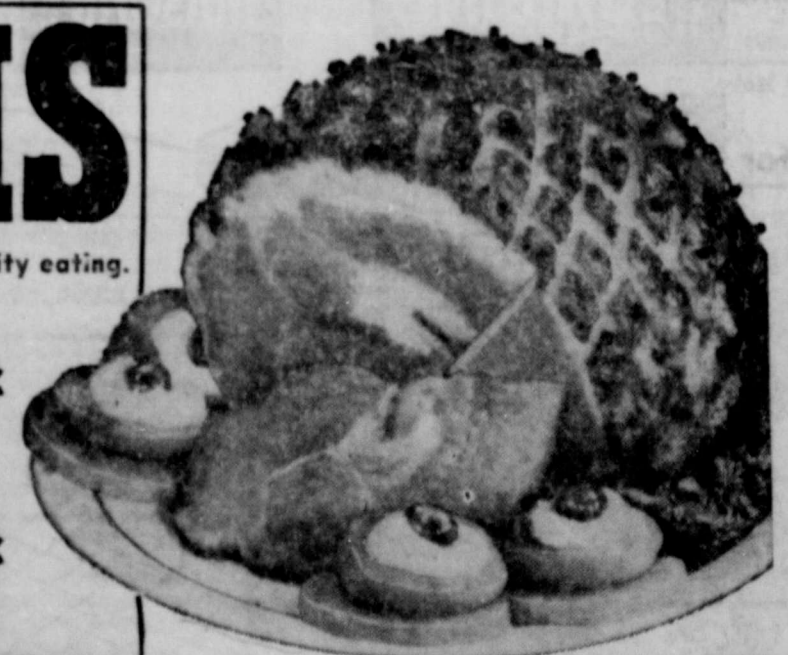

**Fruit with Cereal and Milk Adds Variety to Reducing-Diet Breakfast**



Nutritionists recommend that dieters divide the day's caloric intake into three meals of equal size, starting with breakfast. A good breakfast is the key to successful weight-reduction plans. If you skip breakfast, you are more apt to resort to between-meal snacks or to overeat at the other two meals of the day.

Research at the State University of Iowa has demonstrated that young and old alike not only felt better, but they performed better, especially in the late morning hours, if they had eaten an adequate breakfast. To ensure an adequate breakfast, doctors and dietitians recommend a basic breakfast pattern of fruit, cereal, milk, bread and butter. This breakfast pattern provides 1/4 to 1/2 of the daily nutritional requirements for most people. It is also the basis for an adequate breakfast in a reducing diet. Here is a 400-calorie breakfast which is 1/3 of a 1200-calorie diet commonly recommended in weight-reduction programs.

**400-Calorie Breakfast**  
Corn Flakes (1 ounce) with Sliced Bananas, Blueberries, or Apricots  
Milk, nonfat, 1/2 cup for cereal  
Toast, 1 slice, with Butter, 1 teaspoon  
Milk, nonfat, 1 cup for beverage  
Coffee, black

Wide variety is possible in the fruit, cereal, and milk serving. There are more than two dozen varieties of breakfast cereals, hot and ready to eat, both regular and pre-sweetened types, available at your grocery store. Fresh fruits will soon be in season in quantity. You will find that a breakfast planned according to a 400-calorie basic breakfast pattern is satisfying, inexpensive, and offers variety in your reducing diet.

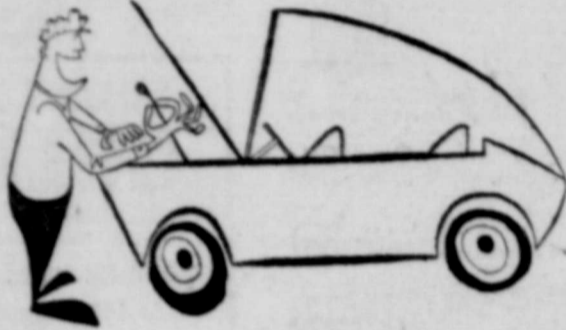

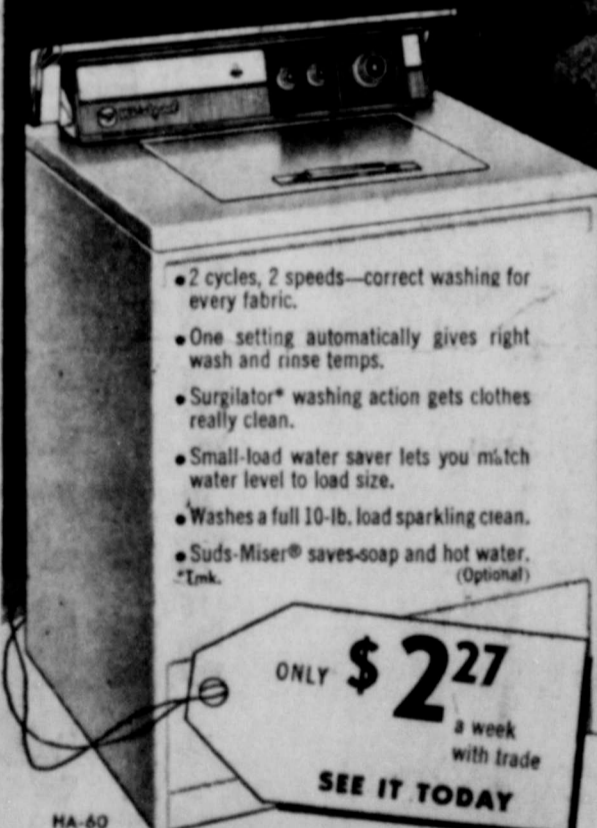
