For He taught them as One having authority, and not as the scribes. Matthew 7:29 Men were amazed at the authority with which Jesus spoke to them. And well they might have been. (An Editorial)

"There isn't anything wrong with Ranger, it's the people in Ranger that is letting it down," says Elbert Young, manager of the Southern Ice Company. Here's what Young has to say about Ranger. "Ranger hasn't anything wrong with it. I was born in Ranger 54 years ago. I saw it come from a whistle-stop on the T&P Railroad to the biggest and richest little city in the world.

"Then I saw it when the wells quit flowing and the gold quit rolling. I saw men give up and leave here saying, she is all through. "But I still have the faith of my old grandpappy who landed here in 1896 with \$7.50 in his pocket, a wife and five kids. He passed on, leaving hundreds of acres of land and darn little money, but he never lost his faith in our city.

"When the sailing got rough we should have fought a little harder instead of sitting around and cussing our fellow man—but that is what happened. If things go wrong we cuss the mayor or doctor, or the police department. I have even heard our preachers cussed, even the ice man—or the first person who crosses us.

"All Ranger needs is a lot of work and a lot of praying and not so much bellyaching and braying. Then watch her come to life.

"I am supposed to be running a dyeing business, but get up some morning about 6:30 a.m. and come by and watch the ghost walk.

"I believe in Ranger enough to be putting what little I can make into a new business. So I hope the Lord will take a likin' to us all. Let's all do a little reviewing of our own actions and see if we are working for the betterment of Ranger, or griping about what others are and are not doing.

It's so much easier to put the blame for the way things are on someone else's shoulders and say that we didn't have anything to do with how things are now. But when we do this, there is no chance of ever getting anything done to improve things.

How many times have you heard and said things against the city officials, merchants, school system and anyone else who we can blame for our misfortunes.

Don't you think—like Mr. Young said—that it is time we took some action instead of so much verbal criticism?

Hagaman Ranch Home is Landmark of Former Era

The old Hagaman ranch home, which is located north of Ranger on the Tiffin Road, is one of the few remaining monuments of Ranger's pioneer past.

An imposing two-story structure of many rooms, it was built by the late M. H. Hagaman in 1899 for his wife, the former Emma Whittington, whom he had married in 1890 and who lived in it until her death in June, 1960. The house has remained unchanged in structure except for a sleeping porch and sun porch that were added years ago. It was the late Mrs. Hagaman's wish that her home furnishings remain as she left them. Her wish is being fulfilled

by her daughter, Mrs. Ruth Horri-gan, to whom the house now belongs.

Within the house are many antique pieces of furniture, china, crystal, silver, and paintings. A few of the fine paintings were done by Mrs. Hagaman herself. Many of the pieces of furniture are part of the original furnishings. In one corner of the living room, which is kept as a formal living room, stands a beautiful antique pitcher. One item that is seldom seen any more is an old victrola purchased in 1915. Another is an upright piano bought in 1900.

The house has been graced by visits of many distinguished people, such as the late United States President Taft and the outstanding Methodist Bishop H. A. Quar-

This old home has housed one of Ranger's outstanding pioneer families and stands as a landmark and a reminder of a former era.

Assignments Made To Little League Teams

Managers of the Ranger Little League met with League officials Thursday night at the Chamber of Commerce office and made selections for additions to their teams for the coming season.

Over 60 new boys were added to the four teams rosters Thursday night. These boys, in addition to approximately 20 eight year old boys, who are in the minor league program and 40 boys who were already assigned to the four Ranger teams, make approximately 120 Ranger boys between the ages of eight and 12 who will participate in the Little League program this summer. Also included in the Ranger Little League program is a team from Strawn. The Strawn Braves have approximately 15 boys who will play in the Ranger program during the season.

Friday afternoon the managers had a chance to get their new boys separated from the main group and get acquainted with them.

Beginning Monday managers will start work with their groups, including the new boys and the boys who are on the regular roster. Each team will have approximately 25 boys working out during the season.

County Stockmen Seek Brucellosis Control Program

Eastland County stockmen attending a meeting held recently at Eastland, when Dr. J. B. Henderson of the Texas Animal Health Commission discussed the Brucellosis control program, voted unanimously to enter Eastland County in that program subject to the approval of 75 per cent of the cattle owners representing 51 per cent of the stock, as is required.

A sign-up of cattle owners was under way this week with petitions placed in the hands of several county stockmen.

If the required majority approves the state will set up a laboratory in the county for blood testing of cows and technicians will go to each farm and test and tag cattle and give reports to the owners within three days. In the event a cow is found to be infected she will be branded with a "B" on the jaw and the owner allowed 15 days in which to sell her for slaughter. The "B" brand, according to a livestock market report, does not affect her price for beef.

Unless Eastland County is entered in the program it will be a violation of law for a cow to be transported into any county where the program is in effect without an expensive and time-consuming test, it was explained. Most counties in this area have already adopted the program.

Brucellosis is the disease known as Bang's disease and causing undulant fever in humans.

It is hoped to complete the petitions by April 20. About 90 days will be required after approval to set up the program in the county. For further information contact J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Agent, in Eastland.

Junior Track Teams Place in 21 Events

The Ranger freshmen and junior high track teams picked up 21 ribbon awards at the district track meet at Winters Thursday.

Balling won the freshman team meet and Winters won the junior high events. Ranger placed fourth in each of the meets. Melton Kennedy paced the field in the junior high 330 yard dash with a winning time of 43.8 seconds and I. H. Pounds ran the 600 yard dash in 1:43.5 to take first place.

The freshman 880 yard relay team posted an unproved 1:46.3 time with a ten yard lead on the field for first place. Heading the relay were Arthur Mendoza, Johnny Camacho, Kygo Edmonds and Mike Sanders. Other points won by the freshmen included a second place by the 440 yard relay team made up of Mendoza, Camacho, Edmonds and Sanders in a time of 50.5 seconds.

Mendoza took third in the broad jump with 16' 10 1/2" and fourth in the 320 yard dash with 45.3 seconds. Camacho took third in the 600 yard dash with 1:42.4 seconds. Edmonds took third in the 100 yard dash with 11.3 seconds. The junior high team picked up points with a second place in the 880 yard relay in 1:51.5 with Kennedy, Pounds, Jesse Renteria

and Butch Seymour running. Renteria placed second in the 50 yard dash with 6.2 seconds and third in the broad jump with 16' 3 1/2". Kennedy placed fourth in the shot put with a toss of 35' 11". This meet completed the track season in Ranger.

Plans are complete for the fourth annual County Pecan Budding School to be held Monday in Cisco, J. M. Cooper, county agent, has announced.

The morning session will be held at Cisco Junior College beginning at 9:30 a.m. It will be devoted to information about when, where and how to bud, types of budwood, method of tying, when to cut the string, types of covering, when to force the bud, when not to force the bud and other items pertaining to patch budding of pecans.

The afternoon session will be held at the Kent Wood farm three miles south of Cisco in the Leon River bottom where the group will practice budding on some small trees.

Cooper said a few pecan budding knives for the group's use will be available as well as a limited amount of cold storage budwood. For the most part fresh budwood will be used.

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Gas Discovery Near Dothan Has Been Finaled

Gravidge Corp. of Graham and Breckenridge, No. 1 Houston Unit, section 8, block 3, BFB&C survey, one mile east of Dothan in Eastland County, has been completed as a Lake sand gas discovery.

It is noted, a calculated, absolute flow of 2,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily, through perforations at 3,622 to 3,625 feet. The operation was a workover of a former 4,247-foot failure, plugged Feb. 15, 1952.

School Incentive Payment Bill Is Okayed by Senate

A bill authorizing incentive aid payments to certain independent school districts has passed the Texas Senate and now is up for action in the House of Representatives.

Senate Bill 80, introduced by Sen. Tom Creighton, would allow independent school districts created after the act became law through consolidation to qualify for incentive aid payments by the state for a 10 year period.

The amount of aid payments would equal the difference between the sum of the Foundation School Fund program payments which would have been paid to the several districts included in the (Continued on page two)

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—In a recent message to Congress, President Kennedy said, "We now use over 300 billion gallons of water a day. By 1980 we will need over 600 billion a day."  
The President is moving forward with great energy and initiative under pressures to bring about his legislative program. By reason of the seeming popularity of many of the programs included in the Platform, there is danger that the Congress may postpone the great issue of water conservation. By reason of it being an unglamorous issue, it is no less one of the greatest problems our Nation faces.

There is no question but ways and means must be found to distribute the present water supply. There is no question but the day is at hand when we must be able to convert salt and brackish water to fresh water.

At the present time the Interior Department has less than \$4 million to develop water conversion plants of all kinds.

To carry out their scheduled conversion projects, there is a need for \$15 million through 1962. It would seem that no better investment could be made.

Members of the World Court, located at The Hague in the Netherlands, are elected for a 15-year term. The newly elected Chairman of the Court is from Communist Poland.

A "New Sleep" Electric Anesthesia promises to be a major advance in surgical practice. According to a recent announcement by the Army, the patient can be put into various degrees of unconsciousness with this method. It is reported he recovers quickly without any unpleasant after effects. The technique involves sending continuous electric impulses through the brain. The development was made at the University of Mississippi Medical School under an Army contract.

Speaking of medical matters, Dr. Robert Rubinstein, in a recent doctors' meeting in Washington,

said that a slight heart attack might be helpful to some people. He was drawing on his own experience and explained how it had changed his outlook on life for the better, and that he believed he would live longer by the lesson learned. He warned, however, don't wait, slow down now, live longer and happier.

For 15 years Oxford and Cambridge Theologians worked on a modern English translation of the New Testament. Recently completed, more than a million copies have been sold in Britain and the United States. The recitation of Biblical students generally agree the new version is easier to read, but they find it no substitute for the poetic style of the King James version.

"When all government, domestic and foreign, in little as in great things, shall be drawn to Washington as the centre of all power, it will render powerless the checks provided of one government on another, and will become as venal and oppressive as the government from which we separated."

This may sound like the modern day conservative, but it was written by the founder of the Democratic Party, Thomas Jefferson.

"The American Constitution is the greatest peace document ever produced by men. We have little to learn from the old world in business and economics. America is pioneering in new fields of accomplishment and in the achievement of comfort, security and culture. The blight of Socialism has nothing to add, only discouragement, oppressive taxation and scarcity."
