## College Golfers Enter Conference Tourney

Mr. Caze was operating a truck for Mesa Trucking Co. of Lamesa.

## Sunday Devotional

"The Cause of Evil" By Bobby Spross

Pastor of Eastside Baptist Church

As we ponder the world situation; reading of wars and rumors of war, being involved in a society that is not what our own conscience tells us it should be, we may well question, "what causes man to be so evil?" We may give an all conclusive answer by saying, "man is evil because of allegiance to Satan." However we need to be more specific to see how Satan acquires man's allegiance. In the fourteenth Psalm the singer is inspired to say, "the fool hath said in his heart, there is no God." The Hebrew word here rendered "fool" has a moral note and refers to wickedness rather than weakness of intellect. The statement seems to have the meaning that immorality is the outcome of atheism. When, for whatever reason or by whatever method, a man says in his heart that there is no GOD, he becomes a fool, that is a vile person. This is ever so. Wickedness is the result of the denial of God. As long as Satan can get men to deny God there will be evil in the world. This shall be until Christ comes to destroy Satan.

This denial of God which produces wickedness is the denial of the heart. Honest intellectual agnosticism does not necessarily produce immorality. When a man desires to be rid of God, of His government and interference, and out of that desire formulates a denial of God, the process itself is immoral. The heart of the fool says there is no God because that is the desire of a wicked person. When more people have a devout faith in God then the world will be less evil. Even a believer is sometimes tempted to doubt God to cover up for sins. Maintaining a devout faith is important to dispel evil.

### Many Veterans Benefit Checks Undeliverable

More than 250 checks totaling \$25,000 have been undeliverable during March because veterans in North Texas failed to report changes of address, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Dallas said today.

He pointed out that about five million checks go out each month from VA to veterans or their survivors and dependents in the United States for disability compensation, pension, death benefits, training allowances and other benefits.

One of VA's biggest headaches in administering the program is locating veterans or surviving families of veterans who move and do not report their new address. In most cases, VA has to wait until it receives a complaint about non-receipt of benefits before it can do anything about the missing information, Onstot said.

"Veterans should notify their post office before they move from an old address to a new one," Onstot explained. "The post office change of address is a simple form, easy to fill out, just put down the old and the new address and sign it."

The next step to insure delivery of benefit checks is to notify VA of the pending move, Onstot said. Veterans who help VA keep its records up to date will then be sure of getting checks direct instead of having them re-addressed and forwarded.

## Industrialist Speaks To Rotarians Wednesday

B. A. Tunnell announced today that Harry W. Clark, Director of Industrial Development for the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company would be the guest speaker at the Rotary Club's Wednesday luncheon.

Clark is a native of Mississippi. After attending schools in that state, he graduated from the Bowling Green (Ky.) College of Commerce in 1938 and returned to Mississippi where he entered the Chamber of Commerce executive field. He served in several Mississippi communities before entering the Army in 1941 and after four and one-half years of service, he returned to Mississippi. The last two years of his military service was with General Eisenhower's SHAEF staff where he served as Press Liaison Officer with the British newspaper in London. For his work in that connection, he received the American "Bronze Star" and the "Member of the British Empire" decorations for meritorious service.

From 1946 until 1951 he was the New Industries Representative for the Mississippi Power Company with headquarters in Gulfport, Mississippi. During this period he was active in the Junior Chamber of Commerce and served

as state president and later as national vice president of that organization. In 1950 he was recognized as "Mississippi's Outstanding Young Man" for his work in both the industrial development field and in civic work.

In September 1951, he accepted the job of setting up a regional organization known as the North Mississippi Industrial Development Association which served a 28 county area. During his five years with this group, he was able to play a major role in securing 60 new industries in an area previously recognized for its economic plight. He then moved to Wilmington, North Carolina, where he set up that community intensification industrial development program which resulted in the securing of four new industries in 18 months. Prior to moving to Texas in September 1958, he was vice president of Pantus Area Research, Inc. He served as Industrial Consultant with the Texas Power and Light Company from September 1958 to February 15, 1960, at which time he joined The Texas and Pacific Railway Co.

His activities in the industrial development field have been recognized as he was president of the Southern Development Council in 1954 and president of the American industrial Development Council in 1957-58. Currently he is serving as chairman of the Executive Committee of the Dallas Area Industrial Development Association. He has also been active in church and civic work, having served as District Governor of the Lions and

### Proposed Increases On Some Postal Rates

Post Master General J. Edward Day has announced the proposed increases in money order and special delivery fees that will begin on July 1, 1961.

No changes in special delivery fees for first class mail are planned.

Special delivery fees for second, third and fourth class matter will be increased by 10¢ in each of the non-first class fee brackets as follows:

- Up to two pounds, present rate 45¢—proposed rate, 55¢.
- Over two pounds to 10 pounds, present rate 55¢—proposed rate, 65¢.
- Over 10 pounds, present rate 70¢—proposed rate 80¢.

Increases for this service are expected to yield about \$2.5 million in additional postal revenues, based on current special delivery volume.

Money orders up to \$5 and over \$50 will be increased by 5 cents. The new money order schedule

### Proposed Increases On Some Postal Rates

The proposed increases are as follows:

- \$1.01 to \$5, present fee 15 cents—proposed rate 20 cents.
- \$5.01 to \$10, present fee 20 cents—proposed rate 30 cents.
- \$10.01 to \$100, present fee 30 cents—proposed rate 35 cents.

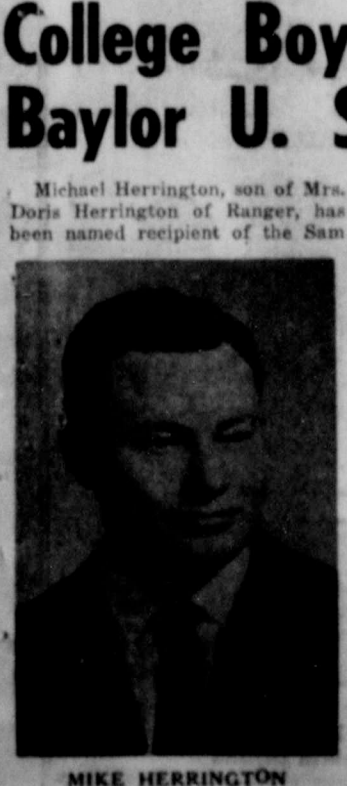
These proposed changes can be put into effect by Postmaster General Day under his existing administration authority. Similar action was taken recently to adjust postal rates for mail going to foreign countries.

These actions are part of the Post Office Department's program to place the Postal Service in a more favorable fiscal position, in accordance with the Postal Policy Act of 1958.

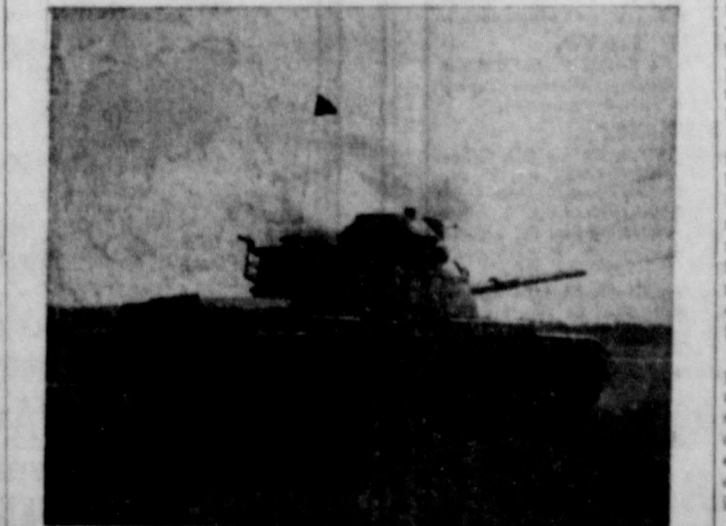
The Postmaster General is also requesting the Congress to take legislative action with regard to first, second and third class mail to eliminate the revenue deficiency gap of \$741 million.
